Due to feedback from Barefoot Bay residents at a recent Town Hall, some of the discretionary fees published on the cover of the July issue have been reduced by the BOT. The

revenue lost required approximately \$40,000 worth of repair/capital projects to be canceled for the upcoming fiscal year. We will publish the changes in the fee schedule in the next issue

#### **CVO OFFICERS**

Another summer is coming to a close, and events and important information are forthcoming!

With all the rains we have had this summer coinciding with our insurance plans increasing, I have heard many complaints regarding the need for Flood Insurance in Barefoot Bay for our homes. One of our residents, Ian Riley, has done his homework on this subject. So listen up, people.....This information is about removing your property from the Special Flood Hazard Area (SPHA) with the FEMA flood plan!

Basically, Ian is willing to help anyone that is interested in doing so. The form can be found on the FEMA website. Here are the steps to take.

- 1. Fill in the Application Form
- 2. Submit Plat and County Tax Maps
- 3. Obtain an Elevation Survey from Cecrle Land Surveying, 10749 U.S. 1, Sebastian, FL. 772-388-0582.
- 4. Cost of the survey is \$175 and includes all State and Federal Reports
- 5. Copy and send to Brevard County Flood Plain Administrator

They will review and issue a certificate stating your property is not in Flood Plain

There is no charge for a Letter of Map Change

- 6. Keep ALL originals, including certificate
- 7. Submit copies of documents to FEMA Copies can be made at the CVO Office, 935 Barefoot Boulevard, Barefoot Bay. 772-663-0633

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#### A Word From Your **Recreation District Chair**

Happenings at the BOT meetings...

July 25th meeting—The board awarded the 1-year fire inspection and monitoring lease for Building A, the Lounge, and the Shopping Center to 1st Fire Security Inc., waived kid swim badges at Pool #2 on August 6, 2023, from 1 pm-4 pm for the Back-to-School Kids Swim Party event. Also approved is the RV storage fee increase from \$46 to \$56, effective October 1, 2023. The RV lot users must be notified 60 days before any price change.

July 27th Town Hall meeting—There was a large turnout. There were many suggestions regarding fees and other issues. Please refer to the minutes of the meeting available on the bbrd.org website.

August 3rd was the final Fee Workshop—The fee structure was firmed up, and when the staff finalizes the estimated income from the fees then the expenditures side of the budget will be modified to meet the income. The fountains at the golf course were moved to FY25 on the five-year plan.

Because of the questions at the Town Hall meeting, I am printing the following statement that I made at the opening of the Fees Meeting on 8/3.

It explains how the Social Membership Fee is applied and lists the DOR rules that pertain to it.

Barefoot Bay was created as an "own your property, manufactured home community." It is a "Deed Restricted" community. Barefoot Bay assesses property owners with non-ad valorem assessments to help fund the many services and facilities the district provides. What does non-ad valorem mean?

Ad valorem is a Latin phrase that means according to value.

Ad valorem taxes are imposed based on a millage rate (that is the same for everyone) but are then multiplied by the value of the property. Non-ad valorem taxes are not based on a millage rate or property value - they are fixed. They apply to each property owner the same. Each property owner will pay the same amount, no matter the value of the property. Non-ad valorem is the method Barefoot Bay uses for the annual assessment that is due on your tax bill. But we also use this on some of our additional charges, such as an additional resident to a property above the two that is standard on the property at purchase. This is the Social Membership fee. We apply the same fee to all properties. There are no exemptions. If you choose to purchase more than one property, you will pay the same for each property. If you then choose to lease your property to someone else, it does not exempt you from any stated

#### DOR Article IV Section 3: Social Membership Fee

Upon the genuine purchase of the property, each new Lot Owner shall pay the Recreation District a social membership fee. The Social Membership Fee shall be a one-time charge upon the genuine sale of the property to a new owner, which is non-refundable and nontransferable from the Lot Owner to any other party. Such a fee shall entitle the Lot Owner to use the common facilities of the Recreation District, except the Golf Course, subject to the Rules and Regulations adopted by the Recreation District for the use of its facilities. No Lot Owner shall be excused from payment of the Social Membership Fee because of (1) non-use of the facilities, (2) non-residency in Barefoot Bay, or (3) by virtue of ownership of more than

The Lot Owner's obligation for the Social Membership Fee accrues upon the genuine sale of a Lot in Barefoot Bay to such Owner.

DOR Article IV Section 4: Recreation District Assessment and/or Maintenance Fee

No Lot Owner shall be excused from payment of such fees or charges by reason of nonuse of the Recreation District's facilities for any portion thereof.

End of DOR statements.

The DOR was created and voted on by the Lot Owners of Barefoot Bay. We have an Ad-Hoc committee that meets every 5 years or so for suggested changes to the Deed of Restrictions. Last year was when the most recent committee sat, and there were no suggestions to change Article IV Section 3 or 4. Note, any change resulting from the committee must be voted on by all the owners.

If your name is not on the deed, or you do not have some other ownership interest in a property in Barefoot Bay, then you are not an "Owner" under the DOR. You are a "Resident" if you live with an Owner at the residence as defined in the Policy Manual descriptions. A lessee has the status of Renter, and there are charges for the Renter's Badge as well.

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
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#### **Fall Prevention Safety Tips**

Every year in September, National Fall Prevention Awareness Month takes place. Fall prevention awareness aims for organizations to share education on effective strategies for increasing mobility and strength while offering practical solutions for safety.

It seems like home should be the safest place on earth, but that is where most accidents and injuries occur. The truth is that most accidents can be prevented if a few precautions are taken. In fact, the home is the second most common location of unintentional fatal injuries (traveling via motor vehicles is number one), according to the National Institute of Health (NIH). And adults 65 and older are the highest risk group for home injury, both fatal and nonfatal, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

Q: I've read that falls in the home are common, particularly as we get older; why

A: As we age, our senses of sight, touch, hearing, and smell tend to decline. Our physical abilities are reduced, and certain tasks such as stretching, lifting, and bending become more difficult. In addition, we also experience a slowing of judgment and reaction time. As a result, we cannot respond as quickly as when we were younger. These normal changes in perception, physical abilities, and judgment make us more prone to accidents. Simple precautions and adjustments can help ensure a safe, accident-free home. Additional factors include:

#### Internal factors

- Medical conditions
- Decreased vision
- Medications
- · Decreased strength
- Foot problems

#### External factors

- Uneven or slippery surfaces
- Poor lighting
- Activity level

#### Q: My parents are in their 80s and want to stay in their home and not move to a senior facility like many of their friends. But I'm concerned about them falling as many of their friends have done. What are some ways I can help prevent a fall in their home?

- A: The Home Safety Council suggests conducting a home safety walk-through to identify potential slipping, tripping, and falling hazards. Follow these precautionary
- Have bright lights over stairs, steps, and
- Install handrails on both sides of the stairs and steps. Make sure handrails go from the top to the bottom of the stairs.
- Use a ladder for climbing instead of a stool or furniture.
- Tape small rugs to the floor or remove them entirely.
  - Keep stairs clear of debris.
- · Have nightlights placed in the bedrooms, hallways, and bathrooms.
- Use a mat or non-slip strips in the tub and shower. Have a non-skid bottom on your bathroom rug or mat.
  - Install grab bars in the tub and shower.
  - Wipe up spills when they happen.
  - Outdoors, fix broken or chipped steps

Q: My husband is 70, and I'm afraid he will fall and seriously injure himself. I've already taken steps to make our house as 'fall-proof' as possible, but is there anything he can do to make himself less prone to

A: Most falls can be prevented. But you are right to be concerned because as we grow older, the consequences of a fall become more serious. Broken bones often result and may lead to lifelong disability. Below are some guidelines to help stop this from happening for your husband - and anyone 65 and older.

- Take care of medical problems
- · Have your vision checked
- · Check with your doctor regarding possible medication interaction which may affect vour balance
  - Take medication as prescribed
- Exercise regularly to help improve strength and balance
  - Take care of your feet
- Install proper lighting throughout your
  - Remove clutter
  - Use a cane, walker, or other device
  - · Reduce fall hazards in the home

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
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

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#### What If You Win the Election for Trustee?

If you happen to be the top vote getter this year, you can expect to be serving a 3 year term rather than a 2 year term. This is part of the migration of the new term limits from 2 to 3 years. You can expect a 6 - 8 hour day of orientation where you get to sit with each Department Head, the Community Manager, the Clerk and the Attorney for Barefoot Bay to fully understand what each department or ancillary support person does to make this all work. You can plan on attending a mandatory session on Sunshine Laws and Ethics.

You will be assigned a laptop or tablet with your Barefoot Bay Recreation District (BBRD) official email address and some brief instruction on the use and your obligation for care and storage of BBRD equipment.

With the introductions, orientation and instructions completed you are ready to start learning what type of Board Member you are going to be versus the one you said you would be. Do you find yourself in a pickle with your supporters because you promised something, without realizing the steps it would take to make it happen? How do you get two other Trustees to vote your way without violating the Sunshine law? Come to the meetings prepared, ready, willing and able to speak to any topic on the Agenda and with facts, confidence and thoroughly researched opinions. If you can make a logical and reasonable argument for the item you are bringing forward, you can usually win the fair thinking minds of the Board of Trustees and besides yourself, you only need two more.

When out socially, expect to be seen as a public commodity that each homeowner feels they can confront with any topic, at anytime, if they voted for you or not. Expect to treat each homeowner with respect and always remember you represent them all, even the ones that are less than pleasant.

Expect to be praised, cursed, inundated and ignored all in the same day. Expect to make many happy with your vote and equally as many unhappy with that same vote. Be prepared when you face an agenda item that has a 50/50 split and make your decision wisely, fairly and in the best financial interest of the community.

Expect to lead each conversation with compassion and work to understand a different side to all situations. Personal preference should never be your lead. Be a person of reason and speak with kindness. Expect the reward of this position to be in direct alignment with your motives for running in the first place. If you are for love of the community and its health, security, financial and social opportunities then your rewards will be great.

Please note that all paperwork, fees, etc. must be filed, no later than noon on Friday, September 1, 2023. 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

#### **COMPUTER CLUB**

I am including a few more reminders for computer and smartphone users that are intended to make life easier and more secure for you.

First- make sure you have set a password, fingerprint, or face recognition on your smartphone. This is extremely important if you use the device to do any financial transactions, including online purchases, health care portals, and Facebook profiles. Anyone picking up your phone can access your information as quickly as you do without this protection. It is simple and generally available through the settings icon and then security. I like the fingerprint recognition system since I don't have to remember another password!

Second- have you stored your important insurance information and photos of your home and contents on your smartphone? Recent fires in Hawaii and severe storms all around us illustrate how quickly you could have to leave your home and belongings to evacuate to safety. There simply is no time to gather your important papers together when the emergency notice or evacuation order is given. Take a photo of the front page with the insurance company name, contact name and number, and policy number. This is the information you would need to file a claim. Auto, House, Life, Mortgage, and other insurance policies are bulky to carry- your phone is probably the first thing you would take with you.

Third- ensure you have fully charged backup storage devices ready to go. Many models on the market are recharged electronically or through solar energy. Charge them now and be ready to go in an emergency. Most devices are small and can easily be packed in a travel bag.

Fourth-back up your computer to a flash drive or an external hard drive as a precaution. With most computers having information stored "in the cloud," this may not be as crucial as it once was, but still, a good idea just in case something happens to your computer or your internet service.

Fifth- plan on coming to the Computer Club meeting on Friday, September 22nd at 6:00 pm at Building D&E. Refreshments are available at 6:00 pm, and this is the time to visit and ask any individual questions you may have about your electronic devices. 

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## Jeff Grunow Running for BOT

Please let me introduce myself and ask for your support on Election Day. Although formally named Jeffrey, I simply go by Jeff. In May of 2017, my wife and I moved to Barefoot Bay after taking early retirement from Weber State University in Ogden, UT. Having served three years on the violations committee, I was honored to be chosen to fill Roger Compton's unexpired BOT term in 2020. Again, I'm honored to be serving out Mike Mainos's term.

I've always contributed to public service. I was active in our rural volunteer fire department and rescue squad in my collegiate days. Having gone to school to be an RN, I taught numerous first aid courses to the Boy Scouts and the community. As a volunteer mobile intensive care nurse, in 1982, the state of NJ allowed me to test out as a National Registry paramedic. Until retirement, I built paramedic education programs in Central NJ, Eastern KY, Charlotte, NC, and Intermountain West (ID, WY, UT, NV). I estimate over my education career, I've led to the certification of nearly 1000 paramedic students. In addition to teaching, I served 22 years in the USAF Reserve as an aeromedical evacuation flight nurse, retiring as a Colonel. I presently serve as the commander of Barefoot Bay American Legion Post 366.

I'm pleased to say that I make every effort to communicate with the residents. If you e-mail, phone, mail, meet me on my screen porch, and yes, I'll visit your home. I respond to all concerns. If you ask a question, I will be brutally honest with an answer.

Upon election, I will continue to serve ALL residents and the interests of the Bay. As we go forward, the greatest challenge for

the District will be our aging infrastructure, which is approaching 50 years of age. As a board member, I will prioritize infrastructure projects in our five-year plan. I'm not afraid to question the status quo. I also like the consistency of operation. During my first term, I was keenly interested in reviewing the Bay's COVID-19 status at every BOT meeting. I was a champion in changing BOT terms to 3 years on a 2-2-1 election cycle. This change, up for referendum in 2022, passed and will allow for greater efficacy of new board members and never allow a majority of the BOT to turnover in any election. Another initiative I successfully supported was to raise our capital spending limit to \$50K, allowing our Neighborhood Revitalization Program to better compete with developers and "flippers."

I've enjoyed serving the Bay by finishing Roger Compton's and Mike Maino's terms as a trustee. If elected, I will continue to serve the Bay's residents with the ethical and due diligence expected.

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
