Saint John Vianney

On 4 August, the Maronite Church commemorated Saint John Vianney, also known as the Curé d'Ars ("the parish priest of Ars"). Saint John Vianney was born in Dardilly, France (near Lyon) on 8 May 1786 to Matthieu and Marie (Belize) Vianney and was baptized the same day. The Vianney family were devout Catholics who assisted the poor. Saint John Vianney was born during an anticlerical time of the French Revolution, in which many faithful priests were forced to hide to celebrate the Sacraments. The priests would often travel to distant farms to celebrate the Eucharist, and the Vianneys would make the journey to receive Communion. Saint John Vianney realized the risk that these priests were taking and looked upon them as heroes of the faith. It was during this period of persecution that Saint John Vianney received his catechetical instruction from two nuns, in preparation to receive his First Holy Communion in a private home.

Saint John Vianney received his First Holy Communion at age 13 in a neighbor's kitchen. Napoleon Bonaparte re-established religious peace throughout France with the Catholic Church in 1802. Saint John Vianney desired to become a priest, and at age 20, his father allowed him to leave the farm for a "presbytery school" in the village of Écully, which was instructed by Abbé Balley. Since his past education had been interrupted by the French Revolution, Saint John Vianney struggled with his education, especially with Latin. However, he persevered due to both his desire to be a priest and the patience of Abbé Balley. In 1809, Vianney's studies were interrupted once again when he was drafted into Napoleon's army. However, due to an illness, he was delayed in meeting up with his troop. Later, he was separated from his troop again and led by another young man into the Forez mountains, where a number of deserters were hiding at a farmhouse under the care of Claudine Fayot. Here, Vianney assumed the name of Jerome Vincent and opened a school for the village children.

In March 1810, after fourteen months on Fayot's farm, an imperial proclamation granted amnesty to all deserters, and Vianney resumed his studies at Écully. In 1811, Vianney was tonsured and went to minor seminary in 1812. He was sent to major seminary in 1813 at Lyons. However, as Vianney was considered slow, he was returned to Abbé Balley. Balley persuaded the vicar general that Vianney's piety would compensate for his lack of education, and he was ordained to the Subdiaconate on 2 July 1814, was ordained a Deacon in June 1815, and ordained a Priest on 12 August 1815, and was appointed as an assistant to Abbé Balley in Écully. After Balley's death in 1818, Saint John Vianney was appointed as the parish priest of Ars, a town of 230 inhabitants.

Vianney realized that the French Revolution had created a religious ignorance and indifference in the people, and he set out to fix this. Vianney gave homilies in which he preached against the blasphemies he saw the people committing, and especially against profane dancing. Due to his example and his stern homilies, he attracted many to come to Confession and would spend 12 hours in the Confessional in the winter months and up to 16 hours in the summer months. His fame spread to distant places and by 1855, the number of pilgrims had reached 20,000 a year. Saint John Vianney died at the age of 73 on 4 August 1859. His funeral was presided over by the bishop and 300 priests, and more than 6,000 lay people were in attendance.

He was proclaimed Venerable on 3 October 1874 by Pope Pius IX; he was Beatified on 8 January 1905 by Pope Pius X; and he was canonized on 31 May 1925 by Pope Pius XI and made patron saint of parish priests.
