Wild Rivers Habitat for Humanity Receives \$100,000 Grant for Home Repairs

Wild Rivers Habitat for Humanity has been awarded a \$100,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Rural Development's Housing Preservation program to provide essential home rehabilitation and repairs in Washburn County and the surrounding counties of Ashland, Bayfield, Burnett, Douglas, Polk, Price, Taylor, and Rusk. The funding will help income-eligible homeowners in rural areas by making necessary improvements to their homes, such as exterior painting, accessibility upgrades, window and door repairs, weatherization, and roof maintenance. This initiative is part of the Biden-Harris administration's broader effort to ensure that rural communities have equitable access to essential infrastructure and economic resources.

With major holidays coming up kitchen safety is important now more than ever.

With two major cooking holidays coming up, kitchen safety is more important now than ever. It's essential to keep your kitchen safety knowledge up to date to prevent accidents and keep your home safe.

First, make sure you have a working smoke alarm near your kitchen. Test it once a month and replace the batteries at least once a year (American Red Cross, n.d.). When cooking, avoid wearing loose clothing or jewelry that could catch on objects or pose a fire risk (American Red Cross, n.d.). If you're frying, grilling, or broiling food, never leave it unattended and keep children and pets out of the kitchen to avoid accidents (American Red Cross, n.d.).

Keeping your cooking area clean is also crucial. Make sure it's free from grease buildup, and keep flammable items like potholders, oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, paper bags, towels, or curtains far from heat sources (American Red Cross, n.d.). If you're using the oven, set a timer to remind yourself to check on your food regularly (American Red Cross, n.d.).

In case of a grease fire, don't panic. Fires need three elements to form: oxygen, heat, and fuel. Grease fires occur when the oil you're cooking with gets too hot and ignites (Weiss, 2016). To put out a grease fire, never use water, as it will cause the grease to spread and make the fire worse. Instead, carefully cover the pan with a lid to smother the flames, pour salt or baking soda over the fire, or if you have a fire extinguisher, aim it at the base of the fire and use it as directed (Weiss, 2016). Interestingly, if you don't have much salt or baking soda but have a cat, you can use cat litter to smother the flames.

Following these tips will help you stay prepared and keep your kitchen safe this holiday season!



Leaves are falling, and it's time to get your lawn ready for winter!

While raking is the traditional go-to for clearing leaves, a leaf blower can be a more efficient way to gather them in one area. But the real challenge often comes with getting rid of the piles afterward. Luckily, there are some easy and even enjoyable ways to handle leaf disposal.

If you live near a wooded area, you can blow the leaves into the woods, giving them a natural place to decompose (Houselogic, n.d.). This approach mimics nature's own way of recycling organic matter and adds nutrients back into the forest floor. A shop vac can also be handy for vacuuming up the leaves and then emptying the collection bag (Houselogic, n.d.). It's a great option for those who prefer a more controlled and contained method of leaf removal.

For a more eco-friendly approach, composting your leaves in a bin provides nutrient-rich material for your garden (Houselogic, n.d.). The decomposed leaves, known as "leaf mold," can improve soil structure and increase moisture retention, benefiting your plants in the long run.

Lastly, if it's safe and allowed in your area, having a bonfire is a fun way to dispose of leaves while enjoying the crisp fall weather (Houselogic, n.d.). Not only does it clear your yard, but it also creates a cozy atmosphere for gathering with friends or family.

These tips will help make leaf cleanup less of a hassle and leave your lawn ready for the first snowfall!
