In this issue's Volunteer Spotlight, we have decided to highlight Jim Brande, a volunteer who has been with us for over a year. How to Donate

Apply for Current Projects

The deadline for projects to be completed yet this season under the Wild Rivers Habitat for Humanity's Home Repair program is quickly approaching. If you are a low-income homeowner struggling with improving and maintaining your home for any number of reasons, consider applying. Repairs that the program can help you with are related to poor structural conditions, safety, landscaping and painting, as well as special needs. Projects can include porch and deck, window, roof, gutter, siding and trim, and wheelchair ramp and railing repair or installation.

2019 State of Home Affordability in Wisconsin



In Wisconsin, one in eight households spend more than half of their income in housing. The wage required to afford fair market rent for a two-bedroom apartment in Wisconsin (\$872), working 40 hours per week, is \$16.77 weekly or \$34,884 annually. Nearly 30% of all households in Wisconsin cannot afford this. With more than 18 million severely cost-burdened households in the U.S., the importance of advocating for home affordability for homeowners and renters cannot be overstated.

36th Carter Work Project

Carter Build

A Week-Long Endeavor

One former president, one former first lady, three country music stars and 21 future Habitat for Humanity homeowners swung hammers and rose walls for new homes in Nashville during the weeklong 36th Jimmy & Rosalynn Carter Work Project. Building alongside hundreds of other volunteers, the former president and first lady assisted the construction of 21 new Habitat for Humanity homes. An additional 12 new single-family homes and 26 new townhomes will be constructed by 2021 with support of funding raised for the project. In total, funds raised through the 2019 Carter Work Project will serve 59 Nashville families.

Committed to Habitat

The Carters were warmly welcomed to Nashville by Trisha Yearwood and Garth Brooks, who built at the Carter Work Project for their 12th year. They first volunteered together with Habitat in 2007 in New Orleans to help build post-Katrina Habitat homes on the Gulf Coast, and since then, have lent their names and support to numerous Habitat events and projects. Along with the Carters, Yearwood and Brooks were recognized as Habitat Humanitarians in 2016. Since beginning their work with Habitat for Humanity in 1984, just years after leaving the White House, President and Mrs. Carter have helped to build, renovate and repair 4,331 homes in 14 countries alongside more than 103,000 volunteers.

Just hours before traveling to Nashville to kick off the first day of the build, Carter suffered a fall in his home while getting ready for church.

"I fell down and hit my forehead on a sharp edge and had to go to the hospital. And they took 14 stitches in my forehead and my eye is black, as you've noticed," he said. "But I had a No. 1 priority and that was to come to Nashville and build houses."

Project was generously supported by more

Donation Highlight

Pyrene "Copper Pump Tank"



With all of the interesting and vintage items that come through the ReStore on a daily basis, we have decided to launch a new segment of our quarterly Habitat Happenings called "Donation Highlight". This page is dedicated to examining the history behind some of our donations, and for our debut article we are taking a look at a 2 1/2 gallon, copper pump tank fire extinguisher made by the Pyrene Manufacturing Company.

About Pyrene

The fire extinguisher appears to be from the early to mid 1900's, based on a model extremely similar to it appearing in an advertisement the company put out in The Toronto Daily Star on March 13th, 1930. Another clue to its age is the material it is made of; during World War II, copper became scarce and brass was generally used. The Pyrene Company was first established in 1909, when Scottish engineer took his idea for a fire extinguisher to the US after he was unable to get financial backing in the UK. The company would become one of the world's leaders in the manufacture of fire fighting equipment.

Pyrene made a name for itself for the small extinguishers it made to fit public transport, commercial and private vehicles throughout the western world between the 1920's and 60's. Pyrene pioneered the use of Carbon Tetrachloride, or CTC, to extinguish fires. The liquid would be vaporized by the heat of combustion and extinguished flames. At the time it was believed that the gas simply dispersed oxygen in the area near the fire, but later research found that the gas inhibits the chemical chain reaction of the combustion process. However, under high temperatures in air, CTC forms the very poisonous phosgene—a colorless gas used as a chemical weapon during World War I. Because of this, ironically many CTC extinguishers were potentially more hazardous than the fires they were meant to put out, and have since been phased out of use.



Autumn Home Tips


Wild Rivers Habitat for Humanity knows the importance of improving and maintaining a home on a tight schedule. That's why we've put together five helpful tips to keep your home in top shape as the weather starts to get colder and we prepare for winter.

- Before you start the heater, furnace or fireplace in the fall, complete this checklist: Replace batteries in all smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors, and make sure your fire extinguisher has not expired.
- Before winter comes and it's still a warm fall day, put the summer garden hose on an outside deck to soften in the sun. Then the hose will curl easily for storage until you need again come spring.
- Seal around windows and doors in the fall to keep out the cold. Need help finding where air is coming in?
 Look for spiderwebs. Spiders love to place their webs near moving air, so if you find one, it's a pretty good sign you've got an air leak there.
- Remove screens and wash them with a hose and store them for winter. Your windows will let in more light, then they are ready for spring.
- Don't forget the attic space. Check it at least twice a year and look for water staining, properly connected exhaust hoses and ensure your soffits and air chutes are not blocked.

Habitat Ready: Winter Weather

The dangers of winter weather are often overlooked. From extreme cold to ice storms to blizzards, winter weather can knock out heat, power, communications and transportation networks, and can immobilize entire regions. In order to protect your home and family, it is important to be prepared before winter weather strikes. Before winter weather:

- Review your family preparedness plan.
- Establish a family communications plan.
- Assemble a disaster supply kit.
- Insulate walls and attics, caulk and weatherstrip doors and windows, and install storm windows or cover windows with plastic.
- Learn how to shut off water valves.
- Clear rain gutters, repair roof leaks, and trim tree branches that could fall on your home.
- Maintain chimneys and heating equipment by having them cleaned and inspected.
- Insulate pipes with insulation, newspaper or plastic to keep from freezing.
- Hire a contractor to check the structural ability of your roof to hold heavy weight from snow accumulation.
- Know the difference between an ADVISORY, WATCH and WARNING.
- ADVISORY: Inconvenient winter weather is possible.
- WATCH: Hazardous winter weather is likely within 36 hours. Stay tuned to a TV or radio for more information, and be prepared.
- WARNING: Dangerous winter weather is expected or occurring. Take shelter immediately.
