Saturday, February 4, Day 2: Arrival in Tel Aviv. Transport to Bethlehem. Meeting representatives from the organizing institutions for an overview and discussion of the program. Dinner and overnight in Bethlehem.

Sunday, February 5, Day 3: Guided tour of Bethlehem: sightseeing, introduction to the town, wall, refugee camp tour, old city, and Church of Nativity. Dinner and overnight in Bethlehem.

Monday, February 6, Day 4: Half-day tree planting at a selected field, followed by presentation on refugee questions and ongoing displacement with BADIL Resource Center for Palestinian Residency and Refugees' Rights. (www.badil.org) Dinner and Overnight in Bethlehem.
