#### Large Clubs

1st Place-Munster Junior Woman's Club - An ongoing project for the Munster Juniors is the Women's Association of Northwest Indiana Symphony Society (WANISS) "2024 Festival of Trees" which is held at the Center for Performing Arts in Munster from the end of November through December 31st. The Munster Junior Woman's Club entered a tree featuring collected toys to be donated to Samaritan's Purse Operation Christmas Child. The club was motivated to contribute after hearing the a representative from the organization speak at one of their monthly meetings. Visitors could vote for their favorite trees by casting votes for \$1 each. Donations went to WANISS. Our beautiful tree and its message about MJWC continue to educate others about charities that need help in the area. MJWC donated approximately \$2,500 in-kind from 717 toys turned in!! The Munster Junior Woman's Club purchased 1,000 heavy duty lunch bags for Meals on Wheels, which they decorated individually. When MJWC members deliver Meals on wheels in our colorful bags – it is so special to see the smiles it brings to our clients. Many clients save those bags and display them on their walls. The MJWC members also colored bags with students at the Grade school Snow flurry event. The Munster Juniors support the Muster Band program by donating \$500. They also gave Top 20 Inc. Dance Group a \$200 Donation. The club also donated \$250 to The Towle Theater, which supports the arts with grants and donations.

**2nd Place – GFWC Northwest Indiana Woman's Club** – Meals on Wheels was the lucky recipient of beautiful made hand-made Valentine's Day cards that were given out on Meals on Wheels deliveries – to each family/house. The club purchased construction paper and supplies for the cards. Members brought glue sticks, markers and colored pencils to create the cards. Members donated stickers, ribbons, stamps and more for 15 members to create these personalized cards. The recipients of the cards were overjoyed to receive a beautiful card with their meal.

**3rd Place – GFWC Fayette County ESO Club -** The members of the **GFWC Fayette County ESO Club** dedicate a portion of each meeting to discuss their current projects. They all report some sort of crafting or creative project at least monthly. One member made 19 teddy bears that were sold at the Whitewater Valley Arts Association, with 20% of the sale price donated to the WVAA. She also makes bears for friends out of clothing that belonged to deceased friends and family. Two members continue working with stained glass, making and selling an ever-growing assortment of glass ornaments and magnets. One member is constantly putting together puzzles. She always has at least one in progress, and they 1,000 plus pieces. Themes vary from flowers to reproductions of the Masters to Frank Lloyd Wright designs. One member spends time painting and making crafts from recyclable household items. These ladies are a creative bunch and are very busy keeping their creative juices flowing. They are each other's cheerleaders! Members report at meetings about their memberships and leadership positions in various organizations that are involved in the arts.

#### **Small Clubs**

1st Place- Lowell Woman's Club – The club handcrafted over 200 cards throughout the year for our Veterans and for those receiving meals through the Meals on Wheels program in our area. Cards were created and delivered for Valentine's Day, Easter, Veteran's Day, and Christmas. At the end of the Summer Reading Program at the local library, the children are asked to draw a picture of their favorite book read that summer. A few members donated their time to help during the art show after the Summer Reading Program and helped with setting up, serving refreshments, and clean up. The club created and donated coloring sheets for the local Pumpkin Fest. Members of our club also spent the day making ornaments with children at the town's Winterfest celebration. The club hosted a guest speaker, Michael White, who wrote a book about the history and empowerment of women at the local level, state level, and national level. The public was invited and refreshments were served. He distributed free copies of his book as well. The club made its annual donation to the IFC Arts and Music Scholarships. The club also participated in the drive for Riley's at IFC Convention. They purchased rocks, paints, brushes and other items for their project.

**2nd Place - The GFWC/IFC Progress Club of South Bend** - The club presented a \$1,000 donation to a local university, Bethel, which would be awarded to a special music student based on their ability to serve the community. This recognition took place at a Spring recital, where the GFWC/IFC Progress Club of South Bend was honored with a public announcement and featured in the program book. All Club members support the effort. The Progress Club also donated \$50.00 to the GFWC Indiana Federation of Clubs for scholarships in Art and Music.

**3rd Place – GFWC/IFC Regional Readers Club** – The GFWC/IFC Regional Readers Club tries to make the IFC Music and Art Scholarships go a bit further by asking members of the club to include additional money with

their club dues. This money is donated to the state's Music Scholarship and Art Scholarship of \$1,000.00 each. Because the GFWC/IFC Regional Readers Club is small, and are not able to have their own scholarship, they have chosen to donate to the state's scholarships to help make a difference in two student's lives. Members appreciate the benefits of Music education Art education and happily support this long standing State Scholarship. Some members attend local school musicals, town band concerts and various art festivals. Club members feel it is a good way to show support to family, friends and local artists.

#### Large Clubs

#### 1st Place- GFWC Fayette County ESO

This club of 16 members reported on 17 Projects, with \$8,725 donated dollars, 3,575 donated hours and \$462 in-kind donations. The club continues to award scholarships. Recognizing that there is no PTO for the senior high school, one member organized a parent group. The club continues to sponsor the "Kind News" by Red Rover. One member is the vice-present of the local Every Child Can Read program. The club partnered for the second time with a group in their 3<sup>nd</sup> Annual Celebrate Women event. As a result of this partnership, the club was able to co-present four \$1,000 scholarships to local female high school seniors. One member serves as the state ESO Chairman and Administrator. The club's November meeting guest was Lynette Ecklund, a Connersville native and resident. One member maintains a scholarship at the Jennings County Foundation, The Todorovich Family Scholarship.

#### 2<sup>nd</sup> Place – Munster Junior Woman's Club

This club of 57 members reported on 8 Projects, with \$2,250 donated dollars, 6 donated hours and \$650 in-kind donations. During the club monthly meetings –members were educated by quest speakers from NWI Action Agency, Silverstray, Shelter 91, La Rabida, Hair for All, Operation Child, and Operation Charlie Bravo. The club has been a longtime supporter of Tradewinds, an organization that serves people with special needs by empowering them to realize their full potential. Another club project is The Indiana Dunes Learning Center. In October, the club participated in book drive and collected 576 books!! The club also supports Planting Possibilities, a registered 501(c)3 with the mission to provide employment, job skills training, and fulfilling volunteer opportunities for adults. Another organization the club supported was The Blind Social Center (TBSC) that provides a meeting place where blind and visually impaired individuals come together in a supportive and inclusive environment. One member's personal connection to the Little People Community and their special needs prompted a club donation. The club also supported Project Loose Change out of Evergreen Park, IL.

# 3<sup>rd</sup> Place - GFWC Northwest Indiana Women's Club

This club of 23 members reported on 5 Projects, with \$2,750 donated dollars, 425 donated hours and \$450 in-kind donations. The club offers five \$500 scholarships to graduating high school seniors from local high

schools. Service to others is the theme of the scholarships. Five club members attended the 2024 State Convention. They learned new information about GFWC and its hierarchy, the CSPs, the Advancements, special projects and Affiliates. The club's book club is in its second year and is going strong. A Club Member works at the Tri-Town Learning Center, assisting those pursuing their high school equivalency diploma. She educates the graduates on job skills and career readiness skills, resume building, and job search tactics. She also speaks publicly to community groups about adult education, goal-setting, job search strategies, interview skills, and promotes educational opportunities for lifelong learning. She came to the club with a need. The club donated graduation caps with tassels, a small individual gift for each graduate containing inspirational goal journals with a pen, and cake and supplies for a party. One club members is a teacher in a contained special education classroom. She maintains a "Treasure Chest" out of her own pocket that contains learning and behavior incentives for the children to pick from with "money" they have earned throughout the week for good behavior and actions. She put in an appeal to the club for help to purchase more items for the Treasure Chest. At the clubs Christmas Party, members voted to each bring \$20 for this teacher to have an opportunity to purchase additional items she needs for her classroom. The Treasure Chest teaches budgeting to the children, as well as money management, saving money, counting money and anticipation.

#### Honorable Mention- GFWC IFC Progress Club of South Bend

This club of 17 members reported on 3 projects, with \$3,875 donated dollars and \$364 in-kind donations. The club holds a Book Club Meeting every month, each participant has the option of reading the chosen club book or one of their own selection. They were surprised to find some difficulty in locating some of the more esoteric books that were recommended, despite the plethora of digital and loaner libraries available. This challenge often sparked additional conversations about the accessibility of rare or specialized literature, and members would exchange tips on how to find these elusive titles. Members have donated books to Better Books and charities. Better Books facilitates donations with bins placed in convenient spots around town, you can fill up with gas and donate your books in one stop. Club Crawl is a program designed to increase awareness and engagement within the community, giving members a chance to interact with the public and share the club's mission and activities. The interactive setting of the library provided a lively atmosphere, conducive to conversations about the club's ongoing projects and initiatives.

#### Small Clubs

#### 1<sup>st</sup> Place –GFWC IFC Lowell Woman's Club

This club of 13 members reported on 6 Projects, with \$370 donated dollars, 277 donated hours and \$720 in-kind donations. This club continues to provide a \$250.00 scholarship to a graduating senior from a local high school. The club co-sponsors a Dr. Seuss birthday party with their local library and its sister branches. The club donated magazines and books to be sold at the local library's book sale. The proceeds were given to the Friends of the Library. They also donated items to support The Friends Rummage Sale and donated a cookie tray during National Library Week. The members donate to the North West District Healthcare Professional Scholarship as well as also donating money collected during fundraising efforts at 2024 Northwest District Convention. Annually, the club donates to the county 4-H group for their "Exploring Through Books" competition. The club was contacted by their local trustees' office regarding the need of a family who was unable to purchase school supplies for their two children. The club was provided a list and was able to help by purchasing everything needed on their list.

#### 2<sup>nd</sup> Place – GFWC IFC ESO Regional Readers

This club of 7 members reported on 5 Projects, with \$388 donated dollars, 12 donated hours and \$150 in-kind donations. Because this is an ESO club they have many members who love reading and some members submit their list of books to the state ESO Chairman for certificates they receive at the State Annual Convention. Many members are "Friends of the Library" and members who read hardback books share with others or donate their books to local libraries. Club members support the District's Healthcare Professional Scholarship. One lucky high school senior or person returning to further their education in Healthcare receives a \$1,000.00 scholarship from the District. Some members donate to their local Public Broadcasting Company to help them continue to share educational programs. This past year the club was approached by one member who knew of a first grade class at local Elementary School that was in need of school supplies, such as new books, activities and learning tools. The items were purchased on the class Amazon page. The club also sponsored the grandson of one of its members, who had entered the school "Read-a-thon".

#### 3<sup>rd</sup> Place – GFWC Highland Woman's Club

This club of 5 members reported on 1 Project, with 15 donated hours and \$30 in-kind donations. Members wanted to help their local branch of the Public Library. For National Libraries week the created bookmarks to be given out to different age groups. They had florals for the ladies and solids for gents, with beading and tassels and images for youth. The 140 bookmarks were placed on a raffle table for anyone who entered the raffle to take. Along with bookmarks they donated 80 pencils to be used at the computer stations. They put together several treat bags, filled with snacks, juice boxes and a small toy, to give to the children who came and entered into the library activities.

#### Large Clubs

#### 1<sup>st</sup> Place- GFWC Northwest Indiana Women's Club

This club held a Garden Party meeting in which the guest speaker gave a compelling talk about Monarch butterflies. The program explained their migration patterns and general habits, as well as how important the monarch is to our environment. This club has been collecting and crocheting plastic grocery bags to make mats for the homeless. This year they make about 15. They had a speaker at one of their meeting to discuss many different ways to conserve resources. They collected 44 pounds of pop tabs and over 52 pounds of plastic bottle caps to donate for different causes community projects. Members celebrated Earth Day by wearing green to their meeting. They donated biodegradable sponges and earth friendly cleaning products and gave a demonstration on how to crochet the plastic mats. Members drink water from a dispenser and bring reusable cups to their meetings to avoid the use of plastic water bottles.

#### 2<sup>nd</sup> Place – GFWC Fayette County ESO

14 club members recycle. They report spending about 2 hours bi-weekly preparing, sorting and putting items out for collection. Several members support their local humane society. At our December meeting we voted to donate \$100 to the local shelter in Fayette County. Two members support the NWF, \$125; one the WWF, \$75; and one the Galapagos Conservancy, \$100; Nature Conservancy, \$50; Arbor Day Society, \$50; Audubon Society, \$50. One member met twice with an attorney from The Nature Conservancy of Indiana. They discussed the many programs within TNC and the advantages of her continuing her twenty-four-year membership. He viewed her property and they talked about her conservation efforts and

the possibility of donation of her woods to TNC. During his visit, another club member had a celebration of life that evening, so the attorney helped make sandwiches. She turned him into a volunteer. Two members are now the coordinators for collecting plastic bottle caps for recycling. One collects caps in Connersville from other club members, her church, and her sorority. The two members coordinate getting them to Richmond, where the other member delivers them to the newly established RE Hub. The club used to weigh the bags of caps, but since so many are collected, we no longer bother. Each bag weighs between ten and fifteen pounds and they take more than four bags a month. The hub takes not only caps, but many other items that are not recycled by cities. The club members distribute information about the items they take and any donations are delivered to the Hub. The Hub was established by the leader of two high school Green Clubs and is now a not for profit. We are doing everything we can to spread the word about the Hub. The Hub is often donated useable items. One member purchased 5 used three-ring-binders to use with organizing GFWC Materials. Again this year we continued to collect broken Christmas lights for recycling. They are taken at the RE Hub! Several members donate items to Goodwill and St Vincent DePaul to keep them out of landfills and to provide money for their many programs. Another member donates puzzles, household items and clothing to the Senior Center Thrift Store. Several members collect plastic grocery bags and gives them to another member. She then meets with a group at her church and they cut the bags into strips and weave them into water resistant mats to be used by the homeless. Reusing bags that will never decompose in the landfills serves two purposes.

#### 3<sup>rd</sup> Place – GFWC Munster Jr Woman's Club

Members collect aluminum cans and take them in for recycling. It is not only good for the environment; it is an easy project that pays! This year we had 13 members turn in cans and one member took them in for processing. We received \$120 for the cans which we donated to Humane Indiana. Our club collects can tabs with proceeds going to Riley House. Pop tabs are collected instead of the entire cans for two reasons. First, the tabs are cleaner, and they take up less space than an actual can and second, the tabs are made of a higher quality, high-grade aluminum and are worth more. This year we collected tabs and turned in 10 pounds at the GFWC convention. All our members participated.

#### **Small Clubs**

#### 1<sup>st</sup> Place- GFWC IFC ESO Regional Readers

Our members are from a generation where recycling wasn't a fad, it was a way of life. We recycle plastic grocery bags at stores with receptacles. And all members recycle cardboard boxes, glass and plastic bottles and other items that their trash pickup company will allow. We even recycle electrical items at our town designated areas. Members choose to go paperless whenever possible. Each choice is a tree saved and a street less littered. With raising grocery prices some club members plant gardens. Some members added to the previous year's plantings, while some started with starter plants from local nurseries or made their own starters from seeds they collected from the past year. They shared the "fruit of their labor" with neighbors and family members. Club members enjoy their Butterfly and Hummingbird gardens. When we have our Annual Flower sale, we try to choose flowers that are "fluted" and grown with the Butterflies and Hummingbirds in mind. Some members set out bird feeders, bird baths and Hummingbird feeders filled with sugar water. During the hot summer months the bird baths are a welcome site for squirrels and birds. Money raised from the Club's Mother's Day flower sale is divided so that half is donated to a local Humane Society.

#### 2<sup>nd</sup> Place – GFWC IFC Lowell Woman's Club

Our club supports "Light the Night," which is a fundraiser hosted by the Lake Dalecarlia Women's Club. Our club maintains an annual membership with the Lake County Soil & Water Conservation District. We disperse any new literature the district composes and volunteer to help with projects or events held. We are also published in the sponsorship section of their newsletter. Some members of our club volunteered at our local library for "a day full of all thinas nature." Members also volunteered bv posting advertisements/posters throughout the community. Our club recognized National Recycling Day and went out in nature for walks to pick up trash and items left behind. Our club donated \$100.00 to two different humane societies, in Hobart and Crown Point. A hazardous waste drop-off is conducted at our local middle school. Several members brought items such as old batteries, motor oil and paint.

#### ESO Chair-Tric Heepe

## 1<sup>st</sup> Place-<u>GFWC Fayette County ESO</u>

One member serves as the state ESO Chairman and Administrator. She prepared the 2023 Reading List, (by searching the NYT Best Sellers List, Amazon list, new books listed in the COSTCO magazine, and using recommendation from the state readers) had it printed and distributed it to members by snail mail and electronically. She maintains the records for all state participants. She receives reports from readers, tallies their number of books read and points earned. She then figures the number of certificates earned and mails them (unless it is close to the State Convention so certificates will be presented in person). For readers whose total number of books read reaches a century mark, she purchases the corresponding century awards from GFWC Marketplace and presents them annually. Her expenses include the century awards, large envelopes, printing of the Reading List, and postage.

She prepared 130 certificates for 23 participants.

Our club chose books for discussion during the club year. We read and discussed "The Maid by Nita Prose. The discussions were lively. Some members enjoyed it and others, not so much. The club also read "Poldark". Three members liked it well enough to read" Demzela", the second in the 9-book series.

**Healthy Fayette County Project:** This club continued with this project from last year and made improvements and additions. There is a proven link between a healthy community and a prosperous community. They have incorporated a monthly Art Stroll in their downtown area ending at the Whitewater Valley Art Association. Members man the registration desks and wear their GFWC shirts at the Art Stroll. They arranged for entertainment and displays and did chalk art on the sidewalk near the art association. They encourage walking, dancing, and any other type of physical movement. They also wrote a grant proposal for \$2000 to pay for ten hours from Healthy Places in Design. They have had two Zoom meetings with them and are planning a community wide workshop for early in 2025. They are getting their name out there and leading an effort to build a coalition to improve their community health. **Breast Cancer Project**: Club continues to take advantage of talented ladies who cut, sew and stuff heart-shaped pillows for breast cancer patients. Colorful patterned cotton fabric was donated, and more than 125 pillows were constructed, stuffed and donated to the Pink Ribbon Society in Northwest Indiana. This Society delivers them to hospital patients that have undergone breast cancer surgery. These pillows help relieve pain from pressure in the surgical area. The smile on patient's faces is more than words could express. The pillows are decorative as well as useful and provide a pop of color to otherwise sterile chemo bays and hospital rooms. This club's continued work on this project shows creativity, great concern and is most impactful to those affected by breast cancer.

# 3rd PLACE: Munster Junior Women's Club

**Chicky Project:** Was initiated as a heartfelt response to support a member of their local community, a long-time Panera employee, affectionately known as "Chicky". She tragically lost her home and car in a devastating fire. During September and early October Club members wrote personal notes of encouragement and many included donations such as gift cards or cash. When club members delivered the gift, Chicky was moved to tears and reminded of how much others care. This project had a significant emotional impact on members and working on it strengthened the bond among members as well.

#### HONORABLE MENTION: GFWC/IFC Progress Club of South Bend Breast Cancer Awareness Project:

One member was deeply concerned about Breast Cancer and made the decision to raise awareness. She planned an event over three months "Honoring Those We Have Lost, Celebrating the Survivors, and Supporting Those Still Fighting." Pink was the dominant color for all the table decorations and attendees wore a bit of pink. The bling was everywhere. It all contributed to making it a joyous occasion amidst the sadness of those lost. Speakers provided information, and a nurse was especially helpful in detailing symptoms and new

treatments that many were unaware of, medicine has made progress but there is much left to do. This project showed creativity. It also impacted the attendees by providing Breast Cancer awareness information and remembering those who have fought the breast cancer battle. 4 members \$2105 donation in-kind
