My computer bogged down the other day, started running slow and refused to run some programs, so I rebooted it. Soon, everything was humming along as it should and I was able to get on with my work. A reboot allows a pause, a reconfiguration and a new start. Things that bogged down the system are removed, things that are working fine are retained and sometimes new programming not only allows the computer to operate as it was designed, but makes it even better at accomplishing new things.

Perhaps you already know where I'm headed with this, a "church reboot"!

As we all know far too well, we are slowly emerging from the worst pandemic in 100 years. During this time, we've had to be creative with how to continue holding services and remain connected as a faith community even while distanced. We figured out how to culture a faithful online community through our Zoom and Facebook services. We worshiped outside in our cars and on the lawn. We returned to the sanctuary, but socially distanced and masked. We are, literally, at a very different place socially and as a faith community than we would have imagined just two years ago. And we all sense, as strong as the tug of nostalgia may be, there really is no going back. Too much has changed.

The people Jesus called to follow were invited into a new understanding of the kingdom of God, something they had never imagined before. The community of faithful people that he gathered were led by a message of boundless love and inclusiveness that was unlike anything they had experienced. But it was a new day and a new way of being, indeed a better way, one that welcomed all ages and genders and races and nationalities, even those of different faiths. The kingdom of God Jesus spoke of created a new vision of what the world should and could be. Since that time, faithful people have been seeking to live out that vision in their lives. The message of Jesus forever changed the world. It was a major reboot.

What is the vision of the kingdom of God for our time? What does it mean to be us, considering what we are experiencing in these days? What have we learned from recent challenges in our church community? How can we be a safe church, a compassionate and encouraging church moving into the future with confidence and hope? What do we need to let go of? What should we keep and grow into? Nostalgia, yearning for something past that can no longer be, is not the answer. A new creation is. Do we not perceive it, that way through the wilderness, the stream in the desert?

I invite the congregation ... you, me ... to begin intentional conversations about these things and I'm hoping that we might gather after worship sometime in the beginning of the new year.

God has big plans for our little church, for who we are and who we can be. We've come through a lot. Perhaps now is the time to take a fresh look at what it means to be Christ's church today and tomorrow.

Trusting God with this is all good of course, because God is good, all the time.

I welcome everyone's thoughts and input on the possibilities!

#### Rev. William Seward chairs donated to the Church

Two chairs that belonged to the Rev. William Seward (1712-1782) have been donated to the church. In 1735, the General Assembly granted permission to form the Second Ecclesiastical Society (now present Killingworth) so residents in the north part of Killingworth did not have to travel as far to attend church. William Seward, a graduate of Yale College, was selected as the first pastor. He was ordained on January 18, 1738 at the first Church in now Clinton. This is the date usually given for the formation of the Church. The ordination was attended by the pastors and deacons of the surrounding towns. Rev. Seward served until his death in 1782. He is buried in the Union District Cemetery on Roast Meat Hill Road. The headstone was taken up to preserve it and is located in the narthex. The chairs are fine examples of early American furniture. They are banister back armchairs of a type made between about 1710 to 1740. They are in excellent condition and do not seem to have been in the church or received much use. Because of their age, it is possible that these were gifts given to the Rev. Seward at his ordination. The chairs were donated by William Seward Littell of Madison, a descendant of the Rev. Seward. The chairs were passed down through the family until William Littell kindly decided to donate them to the church with the condition that they not be sold. The donation was arranged by Bruce Campbell. The Board of Trustees voted to accept the chairs.

# **Preservation 2020 Update**

To the residents of Killingworth,

My name is Mike Wallace, a former Killingworth resident, volunteer fireman- including fire commissioner, Lions Club member, and was active in other town organizations before my wife Joey and I retired to South Carolina in 2000.

I recently visited Killingworth and spent a Saturday helping at the Congregational Church's Fall Fair, then attended service the next day.

Following the service, Charlie Smith gave me an extended tour of the building, including a climb up to the clock and bell tower which provided a view of the 202-year-old construction of the domed ceiling. All I can say is 'wow.'

As you can imagine, the framework, along with the exterior of the building, needed much work to save the structure.

"Preservation 2020" was formed in 2019 to raise the funds to help the church's restoration. I was delighted to learn that the original goal is close to being met.

However, as it always is with centuries-old buildings, additional work and additional costs are still needed.

The beautiful church is a spiritual and visual 'force' that is known to everyone in Killingworth and beyond. The newly repaired steeple stands tall to guide planes toward Chester Airport, plus is a guidepost for boats in the Long Island Sound. I remember seeing the steeple while sailing off the Sound in Clinton.

I could go on and on, but Preservation 2020 needs an extra monetary boost to help finish the restoration and save our town's most beautiful landmark.

Poinsettias will be available through the Flower Committee. The plants in 6-1/2" pots are locally grown and may be designated as memorials or specials. \$10.00 per plant.


