

FROM THE PASTOR

"For I am certain ... that nothing in all creation will ever be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."

-Paul's Letter to the Romans, chapter 8

After a long day, Kay and I often become "couch potatoes", settling in to watch some re-runs on Netflix. I stumbled onto one recently about building "tiny houses", living with less in a more affordable home. The episode was about a volunteer fireman and his wife in northern California rebuilding after a wildfire in 2020 destroyed everything they owned. The tiny house would give them a new beginning. Guess where they chose to build – on the same spot as the previous house, on a landscape that has been turned to charcoal. Now, why in the world would they return to such a place and live with the continued threat of fire (as we are seeing sweep through northern California even now)? Personal connections, family relationships and friendships, many of them deepened by a tragedy shared by neighbors, have bonded them together as an especially close community. The droughts, the risks, the blackened hills – these things don't matter as much as the people they care about and want to remain close to.

Wildfires, earthquakes, floods, pandemics, social upheavals and wars, disasters of natural and human origin – there are ample things to be distressed about, to grieve, to worry over. They remind us of our fragile existence, our vulnerabilities, our fears, our failures. They humble us and the technologies we so depend on. For all our modern advancements and achievements, we are still very mortal indeed.

Weighing the risks, dealing with our personal concerns, Kay and I canceled our trip to Florida. We weren't the only ones. Airline travel has been dropping off rapidly as the Delta variant rapidly rises. So we connected with our families there in an online video chat instead. We watched as our grandsons excitedly tore open the birthday gifts we sent. They held them up for us to see even though we were the ones who sent them. It was a wonderful time. No, we weren't physically there, but it sure felt like it. It reminded us that what matters most of all, come what may, is the love we have for each other.

We can wish life's more difficult challenges wouldn't happen, but personally, I would never wish away how these experiences deepen our appreciation for each other, for the love that makes life worth living and keeps us persevering and gives us hope.

In northern California, Lodgepole pines sprout back up after forest fires. Their cones are tightly sealed and require extreme heat to open and release seeds. It's a natural adaptation to wildfires that bears the promise of new life, even after great devastation.

"Hope springs eternal" they say. It's true, especially when the things we go through deepen our appreciation for one another, especially when we more fully appreciate the love God has given us to share.

Do not despair. There is always the promise of new life. Hope springs eternal. Nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Church Updates

PRESERVATION 2020 – PHASE 2 UPDATES

The church's next preservation effort, Phase 2, focuses on the church's exterior below the belfry. In the meantime, there was a demolition of the deteriorating chimney, which was not in use. That project was expected to be completed in late August.

Other Phase 2 plans are on hold as we have not received close-out information from SHPO. Therefore, we cannot begin Phase 2 until the check for Phase 1 is submitted.

That phase includes all exterior carpentry and painting, window repairs, plus repairs on the center front door hardware and all architectural moldings and trim.

The procedures to apply for a second grant from the State Historical Preservation Office (SHPO) will follow the exact protocols as those for Phase 1.

A grant application will be submitted to the Connecticut's State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO). If awarded the grant, the church will then solicit bids followed by SHPO's review and approval of the bids and choice of contractor. This involves a pre-bid conference and time for bid preparation. Once received and approved, the Preservation 2020 team will award a contract to the successful bidder and begin construction.

We anticipate that comprehensive work on Phase 2 will begin in the spring.






