## Daspalla Bee Wax and Honey Cluster - A SFURTI Programme under MSME, GoI

#### **Project Goal:**

Reduce extreme poverty amongst 550 numbers of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes villagers in Odisha especially in Daspalla, Nayagarh district through Bee Keeping, Honey processing and Marketing of Honey and Honey By-Products.

#### **Project Objective:**

- 1. Formation and strengthening of SPV/Beekeepers Producers Group mobilizing 550 women beekeepers' members and increasing numbers of members trained on scientific management and production of honey for livelihood improvement.
- 2. Common Facility Centre (CFC) established for backward and forward market linkages specifically for honey and allied products.

#### **Project Outcomes:**

- 1. We continued to promote 550 beehive colonies through 25 women self Help Groups (SHGs) consisting of 550 beekeepers which provided them additional income and additional crop production due to pollination.
- 2. The project produced simple and pictorial and honey processing related resource materials and taught the women beekeepers simple technique of beekeeping.
- 3. The project organized a series of capacity building trainings for 550 women beekeepers, provided training and other information materials, arranged the provision of guidance documents and ongoing and on the spot supervision.
- 4. The presence of beehives in forest areas has lowered the risk of deforestation and has increased the crop production in the area.

Some SHGs have said that "For us beekeeping is a gift from God. There was nothing but hopelessness in our lives; the bees have brought us hope for the future, even if they sting us five times a day, we have come to ignore that and nurture them as if they were our very own children".



## PROMOTING SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOOD

### **Smart Farming Solution**

#### **Project Objective:**

Double the income of marginalized and small land holders/ farmers through employment generation through agro-processing and value addition including strengthening, storage, packaging, transportation and marketing of produces.

#### **Project Outcomes:**

- 1. Two Farmer Producer Groups (FPGs) were formed and strengthened, and 100 FPGs members were trained on cold chain management.
- 2. Two number of solar powered cold storage was established in 2 villages involving 2 Farmer Producers Group (FPGs) i.e 5 MT cold storage was established in Janisahi village and another 10 MT cold storage was established in Odasara village where more than 1200 marginal farmers are keeping vegetables to reduce distress sale and doubled their incomes.
- 3. 62 farmers adopted organic farming, 5 numbers of vermin compost pits were promoted. One-week organic cultivation campaign was organized covering 5 villages.
- 4. Farmer producer groups have earned the amount of Rs. 50,000 this year from cold storage activities, and this income has been deposited into the FPG's bank account.
- 5. Totaling 96.78 MT of vegetables harvested and stored this year from over 100 farmers' fields, then sold at competitive prices.

#### **Water Security for Improved Rural Livelihoods**

**JeevanRekha Parishad –JRP** with the support from **Jeevika Trust** and **Waterloo Foundation**, **UK** is implementing **Water Environment and Livelihood (WELL) Program**, in 03 villages of Daspalla block in Nayagarh district of Odisha. Spring Water availability from Ratnagandha Spring for agriculture and access to clean drinking water has been at the heart of the program's numerous activities. In this series, we're taking a look back at these initiatives and the benefits we've brought to the tribal people especially women and marginal farmers.

Water tanks installed in 03 villages have enabled the villagers, especially women, to have access to clean drinking water from Ratnagandha Spring. Apart from drinking; this water is also used for maintaining kitchen gardens, bathing, washing utensils, and during festive times. The water supply from the water tanks has also been extended to 60 households through a pipeline. In these households, our teams also installed water taps. 5 acres of land has been irrigated and about 34 farmers have started cultivating vegetables in the area using stream water provided through the pipes.

# ENSURING ACCESS TO CLEAN WATER AND SANITATION



**Project WELL** (Improving Water Resources, the Environment & Local Livelihoods for Indigenous Tribal People in Daspalla, Odisha, India)


#### **Project Objective:**

- 1. To provide access to a safe & sustainable water supply by rejuvenating existing sources of water in springs, rivers & ponds, and to restore the use of existing sanitation facilities with Government support.
- 2. To develop a sustainable farm management system which will apply natural resources & appropriate technologies to strengthen livelihood opportunities to improve farming techniques for livestock, aquaculture, and horticulture, aggro-based and related products.
- 3. To work with target villagers to address general health & hygiene issues, especially those related to sanitation & other safe-water practices, including raising-awareness among women & adolescent girls of reproductive health issues & the use of JRP-produced sanitary napkins (SNAPS).

#### **Project Outcomes:**

The WELL Project completed its work with 500 Tribal villagers from 150 families including 150 farmers (50 women farmers) living in a remote, hilly, impoverished villages (Mitukuli, Bandarsahi and Harijansahi) in the Daspalla mountain region of Odisha in collaboration with the Govt. of India's Depts. of Rural Water & Sanitation and Horticulture & Agriculture to deliver a sustainable farm management system together with safe-water supplies from Ratnagandha Spring, improved sanitation facilities & health practices so that the villagers can develop sustainable agri-based livelihoods, generate income and improve their quality of life.

## ADAPTING CLIMATE CHANGE AND DRR

### Climate Resilient Green House Farming

#### **Project Objective:**

To promote organic farming practices by integrating greenhouse and drip irrigation technologies among women farmer producer groups to educate and empower 1200 marginal small farmers in the face of climate change crisis in 5 rural villages in Daspalla block of Nayagarh district in Odisha.

#### **Project Outcomes:**

- 1. One women farmer producer group formed and strengthened.
- 2. 12 greenhouses have been installed and fully operationalized with drip irrigation facilities.
- 3. 150 farmers trained on organic farming, greenhouse management, crop diversification and pest management.
- 4. 12 women SHGs earned Rs. 75,000/ each from year-end harvesting through cultivating high value vegetables through cover crops approach.
- 5. Doubled the income of 1200 marginal small farmers.

#### **Project Impact:**

- 1. Reduced up-to 5% of the the resource consumption valued 35% of total investment each harvest throughout the year.
- 2. Enhanced organic farming practices to ensure healthy and nutritious foods to the society.

### Chilika Sustainable Eco-tourism Project

#### **Project Objective:**

Promoting community development and providing carbon credit through sustainable tourism to improve quality of life for marginalized groups while also securing marine and environmental conservation in Chilika.

#### **Project Outcomes:**

- 1. Developed an environment friendly women led eco-resort with setting up of 4 bamboo cottages with necessary facilities inside the resort.
- 2. More than 200 fisher-women sensitized and participated in zero plastic campaign, 10 quintal plastics collected.





# PROMOTING QUALITY EDUCATION AND CHILD RIGHTS

### **Happy Kids School Project**

An Initiative towards improving Slum Children Education and Life Skill Development

#### **Project Objective**

Ensuring right to education to 50 deprived urban street school dropout children including 05 children with disability (CWDs) in Saibanafulla slum under Bhubaneswar (Odisha) through integration of support system, mainstream education and responsive community action.

#### **Project Outcomes:**

- 1. 50 school dropout slum children identified and successfully enrolled into the KIREA Happy Kids School.
- 2. 50 slum children were kept and educated in the school.
- **3.** 47 parents, especially mothers trained on different vocational skill training programs such as financial and digital literacy.
- 4. 23 slum dropout children were brought back to school with a 95% attendance reached.
- 5. 90% of mother's interest increased in sending their school dropout children back to government school regularly.
- 6. Reduced 40% hunger and food insecurity in the slum.
- 7. Improved attendance and participation from 64% to 95%.
- 8. 50 slum children trained on vocational skills including computer training, digital and financial literacy, mobile photography, and videography, and participated in a song and dance competition.
- 9. 50 slum children created for the cultural troop as their vocational options in a cultural tour program.

## STRENGTHENING LOCAL GOVERNANCE

## Induction Training and Capacity Building Program of Newly Elected PRI Members

#### **Programme Objective:**

To strengthen local governance by enhancing the capacity and orientation of newly elected PRI members on matters pertaining to democracy, government schemes and programs, Panchayati Raj system, 5th SFC, 15th CFC, Grant Allocation, Gram-sabha, and Pallisabha across all the GPs within the Daspalla block under Nayagarh district in Odisha.

#### **Programme Outcomes:**

- 1. Over 200 local PRI members from 10 GPs across the block, actively participated and received training on various aspects of the Panchayati Raj system, Gram Panchayat Development Plan (GPDP), grant allocation, budgeting, and various government schemes and programs.
- 2. A total of six batches of three-day training sessions, each consisting of over 35 members, were conducted.
- 3. Six GPDPs were developed as a result of the training and subsequently presented in the Gram Sabhas.
- 4. Enhanced involvement of women elected-leaders in the implementation of various government schemes and programs.

#### **School Digital Literacy Project**

#### **Project Objective:**

To promote digital self learning practices among 12000 underprivileged children across Bhubaneswar city by establishing digital platform (web page).

#### Project Impacts:

- 1. A web page called 'OTTO' has been created to facilitate ICSE and SBSE students' learning experience, offering diverse pedagogical approaches and syllabus content tailored to their respective standards.
- 2. Over 10,000 underprivileged students have actively engaged with and integrated into this web page, benefiting from diverse learning approaches.
- 3. Fostered self-learning practices among students alongside their regular school and specialized tutoring sessions.
- 4. The project interventions have encompassed over 50 CBSE and ICSE medium schools, both private and government institutions across the Bhubaneswar city.



JRP facilitated two batch of students where each batch 12,500 students coming from NCERT background and in class IX, X, XI, XII across the Bhubaneswar city and provided OTTO to support learners with all NCERT content for class IX, X, XI, XII apart from most of mathematics and few selected chapters.

# STRENGTHENING INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION AND EVS PROGRAMMES

### **Project FuSION**

(Inter) cultural Heritage Education for Social Inclusion

#### **Project Objective:**

To promote inter-cultural heritage education by ensuring social inclusion among youth.

#### **Project Outcomes:**

- 1. 12 Youth Volunteers were selected and engaged in the project.
- 2. Orgnised project Kick-off meeting among all the project partners.
- 3. 12 Youth volunteers were trained through a local training on Cultural Heritage and Gamification methodology. They were divided in to three groups namely- Kalinga, Mahanadi, Jagannath.
- 4. The Heritage cultural Tour has been published in social media and many young people are joining the tour.
- 5. The Local Training cum Festival was orgnised on November 14, 2022 attended by all three three group members along with JRP volunteers and juries. During the training, the members were again oriented on different issues relating to culture and tradition.
- 6. Selection of team for International meeting and Festival at Palermo- Each team presented their games and video relating to cultural heritages which were very interesting and educative. However, Group on called KALINGA was selected to represent India on behalf of JRP in March 2022 at Palermo. Their video and games were selected for presentation during the international meeting cum festival. Following three youth members from KALINGA Group were selected for representing India.
- 7. JRP orgnised the International Awareness Raising Programme on Cultural Heritage campaign in collaboration with YMCA, Bhubaneswar involving all the 12 group members and about 70 other youth volunteers on November 15, 2022 at YMCA, Bhubaneswar.
- 8. 7 youth volunteers participated in international final meeting cum Festival at Palermo in March, 2022.
- 9. The video and games developed by three groups were presented.

## **'ACT for Green and Community Sharing' Campaign**

#### **Project Objective:**

To enable 25 senior citizens,25 Youths, 25Women and 25 Students in Bhubaneswar (urban areas) to combat isolation and depression due to the Corona virus Pandemic and to lead a healthy and productive life through sustainable eco friendly community sharing activities such as organic roof top, Kitchen gardening and beekeeping.

#### **Project Outcomes:**

- 1. 25 senior citizens and 75 youth women and students are engaged in organic farming and beekeeping and are now able to keep them engaged and active in daily life.
- 2. 50 organic roof top gardens developed with beekeeping and production of organic vegetables for consumption by family members and neighbour started.
- 3. About 25 kg organic seeds, one quintal organic manures, 250 vegetable samplings and about 50 kg organic vegetables were shared during the special community sharing campaign.
- 4. 25 local youths trained on organic cultivation, bee keeping and crop pollination besides circular economy.
- 5. Knowledge and skills increased among 25 senior citizen and 50 members of City farmers Group on Circular economy, sustainable consumption, crop pollination etc.





Participation of senior citizens, household men, women and children in the horticultural activities in kitchen gardens results in better engagement and acts as passive meditation leading to mental peace.

# **IMPROVING COMMUNITY**

## **HEALTH**

### **COVID Vaccination and Awareness** Campaign

#### **Project Objective:**

To promote accessibility to Covid vaccination and achieve equity among marginalised dalit communities in two remote tribal villages within the Daspalla region through advocacy and awareness campaign.

#### **Project Outcomes:**

The campaign concluded last month in the Indian state of Odisha after fully vaccinating 876 tribal people in two villages, Baberi and Mitukuli. Before the pandemic, both villages were inaccessible by road and were rarely visited by government health workers.



### **Eradicate malaria from ten tribal** villages in Odisha

#### **Project Objectives:**


- 1. To understand the threat and identify beneficiaries
- 2. To prepare the program will well manage and proceeds according to a clear plan.
- 3. To check, treat and refer 3,000 EVIs.
- 4. To educate and prevention for the 7,000 beneficiaries
- 5. To Engage with, and empower, the government.
- 6. To engage community, including fish and water management.

#### **Project Outcomes:**

- 1. Identified 3000 target beneficiaries, including children, pregnant women, lactating mothers, elderly, and PwDs across the 10 tribal target villages in Chandaka region.
- 2. More than 1000 target community people were aware, educated, and practiced to eradicate malaria through different awareness campaign like multi-media PALA, community meeting, health camps etc.

Employability linked Vocational Education and Skills Training of Dalit and Tribal School Dropouts of Odisha

#### **Project Objective:**

To empower 300 plus disadvantaged and unemployed school dropout tribal boys and girls of socially excluded communities through market led vocational skills trainings and enterprise development.

#### Project Outcomes:

- 1. 300 unemployed school drop outs adolescents from disadvantaged and marginalised communities were undergo market aligned skills trainings, which enabled them to be self-employed and earn a sustainable income.
- 2. 35 No's community need assessments have undertaken on skill development and vocational trades.
- 3. 60 No's adolescent girls and boys trained on soft skill and computer literacy and engaged in self employment /employment in market.
- 4. 30 No's dalit harijan children on bamboo craft and 30 boys on carpentry trained and self employed.
- 5. 50 No's poor youth members trained on plumbing and self employed under Water Mission of Govt. of India.
- 6. 50 No's poor boys and girls trained on beekeeping, honey processing and engaged as Beekeepers at their household level, earning Rs. 1000 to Rs. 2000/ per month.
- 7. 20 No's of Girls trained on Sanitary Napkin Production and Marketing and self employed, earning Rs. 1000 to Rs. 2000 per month.
- 8. 30 Girls trained on candle making and self employed with decent income per month.
- 9. 30 Girls from the Vegetable villages having Solar Powered Horticulture Cold Storage trained on Vegetable and Fruit Processing and markets the products like tomato puree, earning Rs. 1000/ per head per month.
- 10. 80% trainees from Computer Education, Plumbing, Vegetable and Fruits Preservation placed in various industries and companies.
- 11. 300 No's Micro enterprises established for income generating activities.
- 12. 60% migration among 300 families controlled.
- 13. The programme created a cadre of social entrepreneurs, enabled to initiate micro enterprises that are local and sustainable and in the process rejuvenate the economic status of their communities.

#### **PROJECT ROTI GHAR ODISHA**

#### **Project Objective:**

It aimed to combat hunger, malnutrition, and inequality within the Dalit untouchable community by delivering daily cooked meals, elementary education, and vocational skill training to 100 underprivileged children and their parents in an isolated island village in Chilika.

#### **Project Outcomes:**

- 1. Distributed over 35,000 cooked meals to marginalized community members and their children.
- 2. Established a community kitchen.
- 3. Established a community education center.
- 4. Provided elementary education to more than 70 children, incorporating a range of recreational activities and skill development training.
- disadvantaged 5. Trained 50 women in various development and income-generating activities like dry-fish processing and marketing training, bamboo-craft training etc.
- 6. Trained 50 male members of the community in tourist management, guiding, and biodiversity conservation practices.
- 7. Orchestrated 2 community-level cultural programs, involving more than 500 people, fostering unity between general caste groups and untouchable community to mitigate inequality.
