Hi, I am Ilona.


It was one of the foggy days when I received an e-mail and there was written: "Do you want to become a volunteer in JRP-India?"

Volunteering


EVS is programme ran by European Comission, which provides young people to travel and get experience, especially in some of the Europe countries. It is all supported by sending and hosting organization.

So we danced a lot, drew and painted lot of pictures, competed in quizes, sang and did sports.

The goal of MHM was, by the way, tell girls that despite periods the can do whatever they want. They have that right.











Girls were amazing. I took a while for them to be brave to speak about periods loudly, but it happened. Mission completed.

From teacher to lecturer

I really want to do something in India so I joined MHM (Menstrual Hygiene Management) project.

I was giving advise how to manage menstruation in order to be proud and without shame and in the same time avoid health risks.

My audience increased from one small class to big hall, so I tried to have a speech in front of hundreds girls and I loved that – it was meaningful. For them, but for me too. I learnt a lot about Indian culture.





From a lecturer to officer

Not only MHM was connected with that cursed word, paper work. I needed to realize that field work can't be done without office work.

Communication about MHM with our partners as well as organizing other related projects or helping with writing proposals, editing documents etc. were such a valuable experience for me.

And when I found some free time in office, I helped JRP and created new promotional materials or preparing new official documentation. So, do not forget laptop!



From office to the world, again

The circle of my tasks was almost at the end when I was organizing and planning my activities but JRP activities too.

I was cooperating on Personal Development Week for foreign students, planning trainings for local volunteers and teachers, for other Eramus+ projects and then I was able to run my own crowdfunding project.

That was the best thing for me in India. It is not enough to have good ideas once you are not ready to turn them into reality.

Delhi – Rajasthan - Punjab




20 days on travel through ten milion city, desert ad lakes just to be so close to Pakistani border – alone with my backpack.

Delhi. People, people, people.










Jaipur, pink city in desert.
