Nikolaustag (Saint Nicholas Day, December 6th)

Name: The Lehnert Family, Audrina Lehnert, Children's Garden Tradition: Children in Germany set out their freshly cleaned boots or shoes on the night of December 5th in the hopes that St. Nicholas will fill them with treats and small gifts overnight, provided that they were well-behaved throughout the year. St. Nicholas is associated with Nicholas of Myra, a bishop known for miracles and giving gifts secretly. In Germany, St. Nicholas is different from the Weihnachtsmann (Santa Claus) who comes on Christmas Eve. However, the American Santa Claus is derived from St. Nicholas.

Hanukkah

Name: The Russell Family, Ava Russell, Two's Classroom **Tradition:** Our family loves celebrating Hanukkah during the month of December. We light candles, eat donuts, play dreidel and open gifts eight nights in a row! We usually spend this holiday with extended family but this year we won't be able to do that but we will still make the best of it!

Baba Marta: Celebrating Grandma March Day in Bulgaria



Name: The Blandin Family, Paulina Blandin (Horizons) **Tradition:** In Bulgaria, Baba Marta Day (also called Grandma March Day) is a unique holiday associated with the beginning of spring, and can last all through the month of March. At its center is the mythical Baba Marta Bulgarian folktale character, who personifies every aspect of the month of March. According to the Baba Marta legend, she is the sister of two other characters, named Big Sechko and Little Sechko, who represent the months of January and February. Baba Marta represents the month of March, as well as the beginning of spring. Therefore, the holiday of Baba Marta is associated with the beginning of a new cycle in nature and with wishes for health and fertility.

Each year, Bulgarians officially begin celebrating Baba Marta Day on March 1, and the holiday can actually last all through the month of March. The most common tradition on Baba Marta Day is that of the Мартеница (martenitsa), which is a Гривна (grivna), or "wrist band," made of бял и червен конец (byal i cherven konets), or "red- and white-colored thread." These two colors are said to represent different things; the red is for blood or life, and the white is purity and happiness.







Name: The Seger Family, Bryce Seger (ABC)

Tradition: Our family celebrates Christmas the entire month of December. We do advent calendars with chocolates counting down to Christmas, our scout elf "Elfie" surprises us each morning, and breakfast with Santa (drive thru this year). We celebrate Christmas with church service, family and presents from Santa. On Christmas morning we hide a pickle ornament on the tree and the finder gets an extra special present. Montessori Minute



During her years of observation and discovery of the child, Maria found that education created peace. In a world full of chaos, Montessori discovered that children were the answer to a peaceful future and their teachers were responsible for providing it. Peace is not taught in the classroom, it is observed. Our environments (classrooms) must be prepared for the children to learn through peace in their education. Nurturing peace is simply incorporating all the people of the world into our daily curriculum. Education on the world's differences and similarities is where inclusion and respect for each other begins. The earlier a child learns to understand and respect all cultures and differences, the more likely they are to grow up to incorporate peace into their adult world and live to be inclusive, respectful, and mindful adults.

"Averting war is the work of politicians; establishing peace is the work of educators." - Maria Montessori

Peace is incorporated into the 3-6-year old Montessori classroom by incorporating works representing all continents. Children in this age group learn outward to inward. They first learn and explore the continents and then the United States. This approach to education provides a global view of life and humanity's part in it.

In a 6-12-year old environment, children continue their journey of peace through education on a broader level. This is the age of reasoning, abstract thinking, and an imaginative state of mind. Students continue their study of people around the world and learning about their fundamental needs as humans. They learn that the fulfillment of these needs varies by not only historical time periods but also by geographic location. With emphasis placed on the family of humankind and the interrelationship of all life, Montessori students begin to realize that they are not separate from the rest of the world but are an integral part of creating a harmonious world.!

Recipe Corner

Honey-Oat Granola Bar

- adapted from "The Little Lunchbox Cookbook" by Renee Kohley

A copy cat of the Nature Valley bars made with whole grains and healthy fats, leaving out the additives and preservatives. You could also add nuts and dried fruit for variations.

Ingredients:

2.5 cups rolled oats

¼ cup coconut oil, melted

¼ cup sugar

¼ cup honey

¼ tsp baking soda



Directions

- 1. Preheat oven 350 degrees. Line 8 x 8in baking pan with parchment paper and spray butter.
- 2. Add oats, sugar, sea salt, and baking soda to bowl.
- 3. Melt together coconut oil and honey. Add to oat mixture. Stir to combine
- 4. Press into pan. Bake 20 minutes until golden brown. Cool for 10 minutes before cutting. Store in air tight container.
