Parents began to beg us to start an elementary school. We had some parents in the school who were willing to help in major ways. So, in 1977 we finally found a building for our school. It was the officers club which was a compilation of 4 barrix buildings complete with a fireplace. The fire marshal grandfathered us into the building as it had previously been a truck driving school. She said," it was a 'school', you are in."

People such as Art and Bobbi Kroot helped with the financing. Dr. Michael Free made the shelves, most of which are still in use. Interior designer Mona Wirth laid color coded carpet squares for wall to wall carpeting throughout the building. This began our subject color scheme. Contractor Gary Wirth painted the outside of the building.

Tom Carmichael along with several high school cedar workers, installed fire resistant walls around the furnaces, child sized rest rooms, painted the entire interior with parent help and rebuilt some walls. They also installed several new windows. We purchased thousands of dollars of materials. My older children mimeographed, cut and colored to help prepare learning materials. We now had formed a board, an Executive Committee and an Advisory Group. Dr. Ed Probst was our first board president.

The elementary school opened with 55 students in grade levels 1 through 6, many of whom had previously attended the pre-school. We hired three new elementary teachers that summer and all was good. The school was truly non-graded as we had three, four large rooms for the elementary school and children could freely travel from learning area to learning area. We called ourselves, ABC Alternative School. Then when my Mom passed away, the board decided to name the elementary school Stewart School after my Mom. Later it became ABC-Stewart School.

I asked parent Linda Becker, a classroom volunteer, if she would organize the spring picnic. She did such a terrific job that I asked her to be our Administrator. She and her daughter Kathryn then worked here for 40 and 30 years.

John Johnson, recent coach Kevin Johnson's Dad, started our first basketball team. The children ran across the field at lunch time to practice. We held our programs in the IUPUC auditorium and also held movie night fund raisers there. We started trips. Our older students started paging at the state house the in 1977. That year we also started taking the children to a three or four day science opportunity at a summer camp each year, finally settling on camp Bradford Woods. We took our students to Washington DC for the first time in 1984, then added the Space Camp trip.

Our first year classroom provides a compassionate, thoughtful, and unique environment during the tender years a child transitions from kindergarten to elementary. The self contained classroom is taught by team teachers for the last 22 years: Miss Lynn, an Indiana University graduate, and Miss Lane, a University of Southern Indiana graduate. Both of whom have completed graduate courses at Butler University. The first year teachers do a wonderful job welcoming the students lovingly into their classroom and guiding them through personalized growth.

The individualized environment has been prepared with a diverse set of Montessori based materials. Each child is assessed weekly and given work based on their needs and abilities. Weekly homework assignments include a math packet, a reading book with writing activities, and spelling words. Two book reports are given during the year.

> The structured day starts out with group exposure to new concepts in the morning followed by Independent Study in the afternoon.

During Independent study, students choose works between science, math, reading, and culture based on their ability level to appropriately challenge them. The teachers are facilitators during this time observing and aiding children when needed. They also record each students' growth on a log sheet. The students take responsibility from their learning and achievements by plotting their weekly achievements on a graph.



A child's experience in the first-year room is a special one. The teachers do an outstanding job preparing children for the rest of their educational path at Stewart. Students are given the tools to become confident, independent, and enthusiastic learners while building the foundation for their future academic endeavors.

I began my education at ABC Stewart starting in pre-school when the school was located on Grissom Street in one of the buildings at the old Bakalar Air Base. I have vivid memories of my time there from pre-school through 1st Grade and can still remember exactly how the building was laid out.

The school moved from Bakalar to the old Kent School, where it is still located, when I was in 2nd Grade, and I stayed at ABC Stewart through 5th Grade. When we moved to the new building, we couldn't believe how much room there was and that we had our own gym! Attending ABC Stewart was a family affair for me, as my brother Mike, who is four years older, also attended school there, and my mom taught there. Needless to say, I spent a LOT of time there before school, after school, and in the summers.

Some of my fondest memories at ABC Stewart include the snow sculptures, a haunted house in one of the storage rooms off the gym, getting bottles of Coke out of the machine in Mrs. Carmichael's office, portraying Rudolph The Red-Nosed Reindeer (complete with light-up red nose) in the holiday program, representing the school in the Bartholomew County and Indiana Spelling Bees, playing on the basketball team, and attending the Valentine's Day Tea, which I see still lives on!

Academically, ABC Stewart gave me a love for learning, which I am grateful I still have. One of my favorite times during the school day was independent study time because I could choose which subjects I wanted to pursue on a given day. I also liked that ABC Stewart introduced me to diversity at a very young age—everyone was treated the same there.

I graduated from Columbus North High School in 1994 and from Franklin College in 1998. Nowadays I am a financial advisor and have my own business, DeArmitt Financial Group, in Franklin, where my family and I reside. Many of the life lessons I learned at a young age at ABC Stewart are still with me today.


Teacher Feature: Susie Signorino

Miss Signorino has been educating young minds at ABC Stewart School since 2004. She started in the Two's program when her daughter, Georgia, now 18, was just two years old. She taught in the Two's class for eight years before moving over to the ABC classroom. Miss Signorino is currently the art teacher in ABC. She earned a bachelor's degree in Fine Arts, specializing in painting and drawing, from the School of the Art Institute in Chicago. Miss Signorino is a talented, inspirational, and caring teacher. This truly shines through when you observe her in the classroom with her students. The children love to spend time in her room creating, sculpting, and exploring their senses through art education.



Before moving to Columbus, Miss Signorino was living in Chicago. She was presented the opportunity to help illustrate a children's book, "May There Always Be Sunshine". Recently the book has surfaced back into the spotlight when the Chicago Symphony Orchestra musicals featured it in a performance as a part of its CSO for Kids video series. The project encourages children to imagine and express their own wishes, following the example of wishes collected from children nationwide. Miss Signorino was happy to hear the news of her illustrations coming back to life. "It's so exciting and so unexpected, because the book was done a long time ago," she said. "I've not illustrated another kids' book, or any book for that matter."

Freezer <mark>Bean Burritos</mark>



As the weather warms and our schedules become busier, it is nice to have a healthy lunch prepared and waiting in the freezer. Using different add-ons makes each one slightly different, so kids do not get tired of the same thing.

Ingredients:

Pinto Beans:

- 2 cups dry pinto beans
- 5-6 cups water
- 2 bay leaves
- 3 garlic cloves
- 1 pinch of salt

Burritos:

• 3 cups cooked pinto beans

Recipe adapted from livesimply.me

- 1tsp ground cumin
- 1 tsp chili powder
- 1 tsp salt
- ½ tsp garlic powder
- 12 tortillas
- 1-2 cups shredded cheese
- Optional Add-ons: Leftover steamed/ roasted vegetables, frozen vegetables (corn, peas, etc), cooked quinoa/ brown rice
- 2. Drain beans saving ½ cup water and return to large pot. Use immersion blender to puree beans adding reserved water as needed. Mix in cumin, chili powder, salt, and garlic powder.
- 3. Assemble burritos: Add cheese, additional add- ins, and 2 TBS bean filling to each burritos. Roll burritos. Wrap individually in wax paper taping ends down. Wrap in aluminum foil. Freeze.
- 4. Pack frozen burrito directly into with lunch with instruction to remove both wrappers and microwave for 1 minute.

Instructions:

1.Soak beans overnight in plain water. Drain beans. In large pot, add beans, water, bay leaves, garlic, and salt. Bring to a boil. Reduce and simmer until soft about 1-2 hours.
