Puppies and kittens can be spayed/neutered as young as 8 weeks old. Don't delay.

Advantages

- Spayed females won't experience the physical and behavioral issues associated with going into heat.
- Neutered males are generally better behaved and less likely to roam away from home.
- The risk of certain cancers is lowered and, in some cases, eliminated.
- Over 32,000 kittens can potentially be born from one unspayed female cat and her offspring in seven years. Spaying significantly reduces pet overpopulation.

Your dog's feet smell like corn chips due to a normal combination of bacteria and yeast on their paws. This smell is more noticeable when moisture from sweat or after the dog grooms itself creates a breeding ground for these microbes. While a mild smell is harmless. excessive odor, redness, or your dog constantly licking its paws can indicate an overgrowth or infection that needs a vet's attention.
