A Note from FAS President, Dr. John Daly

It certainly has been a rainy season in Fallbrook and here at the sanctuary it has been raining cats and dogs. We have been at full capacity with a new flood of hungry and needy puppies and kittens coming in as fast as the happy adoptees leave to their furever homes. With this influx of course there has been increasing veterinary costs, food and supply costs, and workload. Without the generosity of our donors and the hard work of the volunteers and foster families we would be washed away. Yet we are still here and staying relatively dry.

Much has been accomplished in the past few months. Our partnership with the SNAP spay and neuter program has thrived and, due to the generosity of our kind donors, we are able to sponsor 6 free spay/neuter events this year. This vital program will help to decrease the numbers of stray and abandoned animals in the future.

We now have much needed new fencing in the large and small dog exercise areas, and new gates on the feline building. The gates will allow for open air ventilation in the warm weather and provide a healthier environment for our felines. These improvements were made possible through a special donation made specifically for this purpose. There will be future infrastructure improvements including expansion of the feline infirmary and further upgrades to our feline housing facility as funds become available.

The cost of medical care for our sick and injured animals is an ongoing challenge and I want to thank all of you that have contributed to our appeals for funding of special needs situations and for contributions to the Winslow Warriors fund. Many lives have been saved by these contributions.

Though the skies may clear with the spring and summer, the flood of needy cats and dogs will continue to come through our doors. It is because of you, our donors, volunteers, and community that we can weather the flood. We could not do it without YOU!

Puppies and kittens can be spayed/neutered as young as 8 weeks old. Don't delay.

Advantages

- Spayed females won't experience the physical and behavioral issues associated with going into heat.
- Neutered males are generally better behaved and less likely to roam away from home.
- The risk of certain cancers is lowered and, in some cases, eliminated.
- Over 32,000 kittens can potentially be born from one unspayed female cat and her offspring in seven years. Spaying significantly reduces pet overpopulation.

The new space we were fortunate to acquire made the 2022 Christmas Store truly exceptional. As it was almost three times the size of our previous location, we were able to



display to best effect the scores of donations the community generously gives throughout the year. With two large and six small rooms to play with, as well as storage and wreath-making areas in the back, it was possible to organize our wares into categories, with linens in one room, dishes and household in another, gift wrap in a third, and so on. One room was devoted entirely to pet supplies. Our shoppers loved it!

We cannot thank the Coen family enough for stepping in at the last moment (when we feared there would be no store at all) and providing us with the best possible space we could ever have imagined.

As always, heartfelt thanks go to the volunteers who devote numerous hours throughout November and December every year. Pulling the Christmas Store together and staffing it takes a huge amount of work, time and energy, and the willingness of volunteers to devote their time is a testament to how important the Fallbrook Animal Sanctuary is to our community.

Here's Rhett's story:


