During the weekend of August 24-26, 1972, 109 Black police officers representing 13 Black police organizations met in St. Louis Missouri and established the National Black Police Association. The following organizational objectives were adapted:

- To improve the relationship between police departments as institutions and the Black community;
- To serve as a mechanism to recruit Black and minority police officers on a national scale
- To work toward police reform in order to eliminate police corruption, police brutality and racial discrimination
- To educate police officers so that we perform with professionalism and compassion.

Pastor Oscar D. Epps, Sr, Community Missionary Baptist Church, Desoto, TX

Oscar D. Epps, Sr. is the founding Senior Pastor of the Community Missionary Baptist Church of Desoto, Texas, named and organized on February 14, 1993. He is the youngest and only son of eight children born to the late Oscar W. and Pearl Northcutt Epps. He accepted his call to preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ in November of 1987.

Pastor Epps' educational journey includes a 1985 graduate of Justin F. Kimball High School (Dallas, TX); studentship at Ranger Junior College (Ranger, TX) and Pittsburg State University (Pittsburg, KS); a four-year diploma from Southern Bible Institute in Biblical Studies (Dallas, TX); a Bachelor of Arts in Christian Counseling from The School of Scriptures (Dallas, TX); and a Bachelor of Arts & Sciences Degree with concentration on Christian Ministry from Dallas Baptist University (Dallas, TX). He subsequently received an honorary Doctorate in honor of his service to ministry.

His service includes: President of The BGCT (Baptist General Convention of Texas) African American Fellowship which is comprised of over 800 churches as well as the Moderator of The Dallas Baptist Association inclusive of over 500 churches. He currently serves on the Board of Trustees for Dallas Baptist University and as Chaplain for the Desoto Police Department (Desoto, TX) being the first African American chosen for this position.

Pastor Epps' demonstrates and validates the gift of preaching and ministering in worship and has preached and taught the Word of God throughout the United States. He possesses an infectious personality and demonstrates an unequivocal love for people. Throughout his ministry Pastor Epps has displayed a firm commitment to worship, discipleship, fellowship, and stewardship. This high level of commitment and integrity in ministry has resulted in the realization of the vision to start Community Missionary Baptist Church Cedar Hill location on June 3, 2017. He has also been instrumental in the planting of five churches throughout the DFW metroplex.

Under his visionary leadership CMBC continues to see membership increase that now spans many states in North America, India, the Caribbean, South America, and several countries on the African Continent. In keeping with his outlook on excellence empowerment of His congregation and CMBC constituents, in March of 2021 Pastor Epps birthed the Extraordinary People Providing Services School of Ministry (EPPS SOM) where he serves as president.

Pastor Epps is the husband of his lovely sweetheart, Belenthia whom he took to be his bride on February 14, 1988. They are the very proud parents of three children: Destany, Oscar II and Aderius; and blissful grandparents to Desman, Aerington, Aderius II, Aeron and Anise.



Richie Butler, Memorial March Speaker



Richie Butler is a multi-faceted leader who builds people, builds community, and solves problems. He is committed to finding solutions to society's most daunting problems. As a business leader, he has over 25 years of experience in private equity real estate investment, development and institutional asset management that has resulted in nearly \$1 billion of urban development and workforce housing in 23 U.S. metro markets. He currently leads an impact investment team actively seeking investment opportunities in real estate and strategic growth enterprises.

As a faith leader, Richie Butler is Senior Pastor of the historic St. Luke "Community" United Methodist Church in Dallas, where he is leading the congregation in a multimillion-dollar strategic expansion to multiply its current \$6 million annual community impact. As a community innovation leader, he is the founder of Project Unity. Under his visionary leadership, Project Unity offers community building and societal problem solutions through its "Together We" programs including Together We Ball, Together We Dine, Together We Learn, and Together We Sing.

Examples of Richie's innovative leadership include the launch Together We Test and Together We Vaccinate, two community health initiatives that helped address the lack of COVID-19 testing and vaccinations in low- income communities over the span of two and half-years. With his leadership and community partnerships, these programs tested and vaccinated over 10,000 individuals. In 2020, he co-launched the Together We Can initiative to address the question many people had of "what can I do" in response to the death of George Floyd. The Together We Can program attracted Fortune 500 companies, universities, foundations, and grassroot organizations as partners.

As a civic leader, in response to the five Dallas police officers who were ambushed in 2016, Richie launched the Year of Unity in 2017, a community wide initiative to help bridge racial divides in Dallas. The initiative include support from the 43rd President of the United States, George W. Bush, who served as the Honorary Chair. Current board appointments include Southern Methodist University Board of Trustees, Communities Foundation of Texas Board of Trustees- Immediate Past Chair, Texas Methodist Foundation Board of Trustees, and an Independent Board of Director of Brookshire Grocery Company. He is a recipient of the Dallas Business Journal's Leaders in Diversity Award and the Collin County Business Alliance Leadership Award. He is also a past recipient of the SMU Distinguished Alumni Emerging Leader Award, the Minority Business Leader award from the Dallas Business Journal, National Bar Association Heman Sweatt Award and the Dallas Bar Association Martin Luther King, Jr. Justice Award.Richie is a proud graduate of Southern Methodist University and Harvard University with extended studies in Urban Planning at MIT.

He is happily married to Neisha Strambler-Butler who is an accomplished corporate executive. They are the proud parents of two young adults, Emily and Ford.

Eric Pettus,


Malik Aziz, Former National Chair, Chief of Police (Ret.)




