18 JANUARY 2026 – 2ND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Mission Statement: The parish of St. Mary Magdalene is a Catholic community of Christian faith with three churches – Saint Paul's in Glenrothes, Saint Mary's in Leslie and the Chapel Royal in Falkland. We are centred on the Word of God and the Eucharist.

Today's Gospel begins with John the Baptist's bold proclamation: "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world" (Jn 1:29). But John goes on to confess twice that at first he did not know him. Even though the whole reason he called on people to repent and be baptized was to prepare for the Lord's arrival, he himself did not recognize Jesus for who he is as Messiah until he saw the Holy Spirit come down upon him like a dove. We all likely visualize Jesus somewhat differently. We may picture him the way renaissance artists portrayed him, or from an image used on a holy card, or an image we've seen developed by forensic anthropologists or even one recently created by AI. But no matter which image we are picturing, we too would probably not recognize him in a crowd. We know him from what he does. As John testified, he "takes away the sin of the world."

Many expected that the Messiah would take away sin by defeating it or driving it out, much as a general would

lead an army to do. But defeating or driving out an enemy does not finish that enemy off forever. Sin would always return to wreak destruction and death. To truly overcome sin, Jesus had to suffer from the sins of others, like Isaiah's suffering servant, as the Lamb of God, the innocent who is sacrificed, to overcome sin and death and open the door to salvation.

Once John witnessed the Holy Spirit descending like a dove upon Jesus, he gave witness, pointing him out and testifying that he is the one God sent to take away the sin of the world. We witness Jesus, but in other ways. Here, in the Eucharist, in each other gathered in his name, and in the priest celebrating Mass. We may also witness him in the person in need, the least of our sisters and brothers, and in an act of forgiveness. We, like John, are called to give witness, in words and in deeds, to his presence in our lives.
