3 MORE Reasons I Want to Go to Heaven

I never tire of dreaming of heaven. Daydream with me a little more. What is so great about heaven?

I WANT TO GO TO HEAVEN TO MEET THE PEOPLE OF THE BIBLE.

I have studied and preached about Bible characters so often, I feel that I know them. You have likely read and heard sermons about them so much that you feel the same way.

Have you considered that you may live across the street from Abraham? You may be a next-door neighbor to Matthew, and pass Peter's house on the way to see Paul. You may have Sunday lunch with Job, Joshua, John, and Jeremiah. You may sit next to Sarah, Solomon, Samuel, Stephen, and the Samaritan woman in a worship service.

Jesus said, "Many will come from east and west, and sit down with Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob in the kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 8:11; cf. Hebrews 11:16). Think of seeing the names from Hebrews 11 on the mailboxes on your street: Abel, Enoch, Noah, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Sarah, Joseph, Moses, Amram, Jochebed,

Rahab, Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, David, Samuel, Isaiah, Ezekiel, and Daniel.

Think of having conversations with all the New Testament characters such as Matthew, Barnabas, Luke, Silas, Cornelius, Nicodemus, the thief on the cross, and the widow who gave two mites. For years we have read about them, and when we get to heaven, we will finally meet them. We will have time to get to know every one of them on a first-name basis. We will get to:

- Ask Adam what he thought when he first laid eyes on Eve (Genesis 2).
- Ask Noah what it was like living in that floating zoo for a year with all those animals—and what it was like to turn them loose and see them scamper away on the refreshed earth (Genesis 6–9).
- Ask Abraham and Isaac to show us how the knife was poised before God stopped the human sacrifice (Genesis 22).
- Ask David to demonstrate how he slung the rock that killed Goliath (1 Samuel 17).

- Ask Moses to show us again how he parted the Red Sea. Perhaps we can even get the Israelites who were there to reenact the entire scene.
- Ask Daniel about what the lions' den smelled like, and Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego what the fiery furnace felt like.
- Request that David lead us in "The Lord Is My Shepherd."
- Have Jonah lecture to us about what his experience in the fish's belly taught him, and have Paul tell us about the stoning at Lystra.
- Ask Mary what it was like to carry the Son of God in her womb for forty weeks, and then what went through her mind as she saw Him hanging on the cross.
- Ask blind Bartimaeus to tell us how Jesus healed him, and what it was like to see Jesus' face as his first sight.
- Ask the Christians from Pentecost to describe the day the church began; perhaps Peter will even preach that sermon again!
- Wouldn't it be interesting to hear Paul lecture on faith, law, love, and works from Romans? And, John, could you

please go through the symbolism in Revelation for us?

I WANT TO GO TO HEAVEN TO BE FREE FROM TEMPTATION.

God has given me a wonderful life here—far better than I deserve, and easier than most (especially from the worldwide perspective). Still, I know what it feels like to cry, hurt, toss and turn, and be stressed out over deadlines and pressure. I well know the tug of temptation and the guilt that comes from sin. One day these will all be "former things" (Revelation 21:4). That will be a good day.

I WANT TO GO TO HEAVEN TO CLAIM MY INHERITANCE.

This may seem shallow, or even selfish, but I am looking forward to receiving the inheritance my Father has promised. This is a scriptural desire, for Jesus said, "Lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Matthew 6:20–21).

Those who remain loyal under persecution are told that their reward in heaven

will be great (Matthew 5:12). The rich young ruler was foolish not to place his interest in eternal treasure instead of earthly riches (Luke 18:18–23). Moses was much wiser, "for he looked to the reward" (Hebrews 11:26). Paul declares that our hope is laid up for us in heaven (Colossians 1:5). Poor people can look forward to the time when they become "heirs of the kingdom which He promised to those who love Him" (James 2:5). The apostles used future inheritance as an incentive to remain faithful (1 Peter 1:3–4). It is proper, even required, that we "seek those things which are above" (Colossians 3:1–2).

Heaven is a place where God rewards His children. What will the inheritance be? The Bible mentions a crown and a mansion, but much of it is shrouded by mystery. It is like waiting to open a wrapped gift; you know it is something good, and you can hardly wait to see what your Father has for you. God loves to give (John 3:16; James 1:17), and He can give gifts that no one else can (Psalm 50:10–12; Philippians 4:19). Heaven will be wonderful because we get a remarkable inheritance (2 Timothy 4:8).

Do you have hope of heaven?

It is said that this event will be a “secret rapture,” when the Lord will appear and take away his faithful saints secretly, leaving the rest of the world searching for an explanation of what has happened. The Bible, however, says that the second coming of the Lord will not be a secret, but rather that “every eye will see him” (Revelation 1:7). Paul describes Christ’s coming this way: “The Lord Himself will descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of an archangel, and with the trumpet of God” (1 Thessalonians 4:16).

Friends, the second coming of the Lord will be anything but a secret!

Beating Back Boredom

Consider some ideas to combat boredom and refresh our relationships.

- **Date.** Once a week, go out on a date. It does not need to be fancy or costly, but try to do new things. Check for local events happening in the area. Often these events will be inexpensive and enjoyable, which makes for interesting conversations.
- **Have a family night.** Choose one night of the week to play games, cook a meal together, look at old pictures, or get ice cream. The goal is to make memories to tie the family together. Sharing an event is more important than the event itself.
- **Hobbies.** If the two of you share a mutual hobby, make some time to do it together. If you don’t have one, consider checking with your local high schools, art schools, or colleges. Many offer evening courses for things from painting, to pottery, to wood carving.
- **Work out.** Many of us need to be more physically fit, and our partners can help us. Take walks, go to the gym, go jogging, or use a workout video series at home. You will feel better and have time to talk.
- **Sports.** Learn more about your spouse’s favorite sport. If possible, play it with

them. If not, watch it on television or go to a game together.

- **Give up some of yourself.** If you have a hobby that takes up a lot of time and energy, scale back. Remember that you are married to your mate, not the TV, the lake, the garage, the lawn, or the iPad/computer.

No relationship should be all fun all the time, but we should all make it a priority to tackle boredom. Boredom is the waste that is left after apathy or resentment steals the fruit of joy from our relationships, so focus on keeping the foxes out of your relationship (Song of Solomon 2:15).

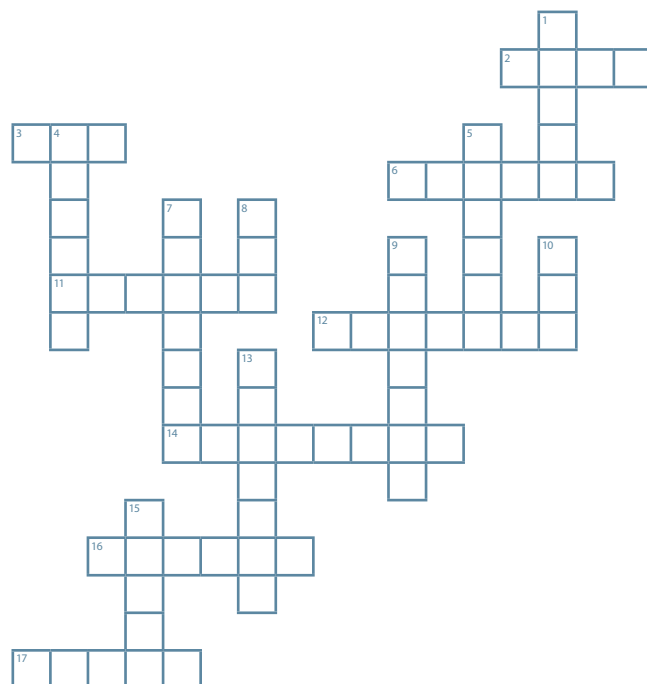

A TRAVELER'S GUIDE to Heaven

Accommodations: Arrangements for accommodations must be made in advance (John 14:2).

Passports: Persons seeking entry will not be permitted past the gates without having proper credentials and having their names registered with the ruling authority (Revelation 21:27).

Departure Time: The exact departure date has not been announced. Travelers are advised to be prepared to leave on short notice (1 Corinthians 15:52).

Tickets: Your ticket was purchased by a Friend named Jesus. It should be claimed by learning the gospel, believing in Christ, repenting of sins, confessing Jesus, and having sins washed away in baptism (Romans 10:17; Acts 2:38; 22:16; Matthew 10:32). Reservations: Booking is now open. Since departure time is unknown, you should apply at once. If you wait, it may be too late (2 Corinthians 6:2).

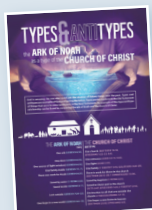

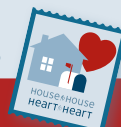

Chapter to Chapter RUTH & ESTHER

This chart is part of a memory system for learning the key people, events, topics, and verses of all 929 Old Testament chapters.

INTRODUCTION

Though separated by time and circumstance, the books of Ruth and Esther both emphasize the vital role of faithful women in God's unfolding plan. Both highlight the faith and courage of women. Ruth shows quiet loyalty and devotion, becoming part of the lineage of David, while Esther displays bold courage in saving her people. Together, they reveal God's providence at work through both humble faith and decisive action—even when God is unseen.

Ruth: Likely written shortly after David became king, and attributed to Samuel, Ruth is a short yet powerful narrative of loyalty, providence, and redemption. The story follows Ruth, a Moabite widow, who chooses to follow her mother-in-law Naomi to her homeland and accepts the God of Israel. Through her faith and integrity, she becomes the great-grandmother of King David, placing her directly in the Messianic lineage. The book demonstrates that God's grace extends beyond Israel and highlights the beauty of ordinary faithfulness. It was likely written between 1030 and 1000 BC.

Esther: Written during the Persian period, and often attributed to Mordecai, Esther records how God preserved the Jewish people from destruction while they were in exile. Though God's name is never mentioned, His providence is clearly seen throughout the events. The book centers on Esther, who becomes a queen, and Mordecai, her cousin, as they oppose Haman's plot to annihilate the Jews. It explains the origin of the Feast of Purim and highlights themes of courage, divine providence, and deliverance. It was likely written around 460–400 BC.

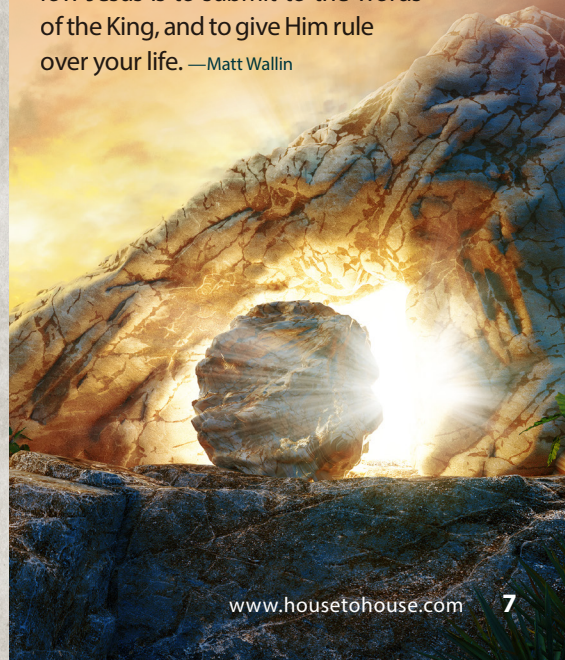
VERSES

The Authority of Jesus

Jesus exercised authority over nature (Mark 4:39), illness (Matthew 8:3), and death (John 11:43). He also exercised spiritual authority—He forgave sins, which drew controversy because only God can forgive (Mark 2:10–11). That is why Jesus came! "For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world through Him might be saved" (John 3:17). After the resurrection, He declared, "All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth" (Matthew 28:18).

Scripture places unparalleled authority on His words and actions (Matthew 7:29). Thus it makes sense that to follow Jesus means that everything we do must be done "in the name of"—by the authority of—Jesus (Colossians 3:17).

Understanding Christ's authority affects daily life: His commands shape ethics, His promises give hope, and His lordship determines allegiance. To follow Jesus is to submit to the words of the King, and to give Him rule over your life. —Matt Wallin

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Will God Forgive Me? **How Do I Forgive Myself?**

Guilt has a way of clinging to us long after we have said we are sorry. We replay the words we wish we had not said, the choices we wish we had not made. Even when we believe God has forgiven us, we often struggle to extend that same grace to ourselves.

But Scripture is clear: “If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness” (1 John 1:9). God’s forgiveness is not partial or hesitant—it is complete. When He forgives, He does not put us on probation. He removes our guilt “as far as the east is from the west” (Psalm 103:12).

The harder part is learning to live in that forgiveness. Self-forgiveness is not about excusing what we did; it is about believing what God has done. When we refuse to forgive ourselves, we are saying His mercy is not enough. But it is. Christ’s cross is proof that no sin is too deep for His grace.

Forgiving yourself means accepting God’s verdict instead of your own. It means replacing “I will never be free from this” with “I am redeemed.” It is an act of faith—to trust that His word is truer than your feelings.

If God, who knows every hidden thought, has chosen to forgive you, then you can choose to walk in that freedom. Let His grace have the final word. —Matt Wallin
