ANNUAL PARISH MEETING MINUTES VIA ZOOM February 21, 2021

- 1. The meeting was opened by the Rev. Tom Furrer, via Zoom with a prayer, at 10:30 AM following the 10 o'clock worship service on Zoom.
- 2. Warren Blessing, Warden, called the meeting to order. The Zoom meeting was attended by 37 parish members.
- 3. A quorum was declared by the mailed return of 69 ballots from the 104 ballots that were sent out to members in good standing. Our by-laws require 1/3 of the members in good standing return ballots which was 34 ballots to be returned.
- 4. Minutes of the Annual Meeting of February 2, 2020 were approved by the return of 69 ballot sheets.
- 5. Pastor's Comments: The Rev. Tom Furrer addressed the participants on Zoom, thanking them for their ongoing support for the work of the parish. He acknowledged the impact of the Covid pandemic on the life of the parish.
- 6. Treasurer's Report: Rob Heath presented the financial picture of the parish which is presented in detail in the financial section of the Annual Report.
- 7. The 2021 budget, passed by the Vestry in December of 2020, was presented and discussed.
- 8. The Nominating Committee report was given and the results of the mail in election were presented.
- 9. Comments from Wardens: The Wardens spoke briefly from their comments in the Annual Report.
- 10. Acceptance of All Printed Reports: The motion on the returned ballot sheet indicated acceptance of all printed reports.
- 11. Other Business: There was none.
- 12. The meeting was adjourned at 11:15 AM.

PASTOR'S REPORT

Dear Trinity Family,

When I think about the past two years, I am encouraged by the words of Psalm 18: "I love thee O Lord my strength. The Lord is my rock, and my fortress, and my deliverer, my God, my rock in whom I take refuge, my shield, and the horn of my salvation, my stronghold."

We have all been through many challenges during the pandemic. And as I write this, the COVID -related challenges are not yet finished. Every time we think it is over and that we can get back to something like "normal", another wave hits us.

We began 2021 with "online only" Sunday and weekday services. Then, beginning on Palm Sunday, we began holding in-person services, both in the Church building and outdoors in the parking lot. By early October, the COVID metrics has become so good that we stopped holding outdoor services and moved back to one service in the Church building. Now, as I write in early January, the metrics are worse than they have ever been, and we have resumed outdoor Sunday worship services again for those who are uncomfortable being indoors. And we will keep doing this as long as necessary.

Despite all of these challenges, we have hung together as a parish community. We have three online prayer and discussion groups that meet each week (Wednesday Morning Prayer, Wednesday Centering Prayer and Saturday Morning Richard Rohr discussion group). These groups offer a way for people to stay connected and praying with each other.

Even though our traditional choir has not been able to meet due to concerns about spreading the virus, we have had a variety of people offering their musical gifts, either as individuals or small groups, in our worship.

We have not been able to do some of the outreach activities as we did in pre-COVID days, but we have done a lot of outreach in different ways. (See the wonderful report from the outreach committee on page 11".) It is not an exaggeration to say that we are touching many people's lives here and around the world. For the relatively small size of our congregation, we are making a big impact: "Small But Mighty"

As we look around the United States, many churches of every denomination are having a hard time. Attendance and donations have declined dramatically and many churches has simply closed down entirely. By way of contrast, our average attendance has held steady and is essentially unchanged from 2019. And our giving has increased dramatically in the same period of time.

This all comes down to the faithfulness of God and the faithfulness of you, God's people in this wonderful Christian community.

A big thank you to all of you who worked and donated and served in so many ways in 2021. Your steady faithfulness helped get us through a very difficult time in our lives and in our world. Even though it doesn't feel good, it has made us a stronger congregation.

As we look ahead to 2022, I hope things will get better with regard to the pandemic and its related consequences. But maybe it won't. Whatever happens, God has called us to be faithful. And God is faithful. And that is where our hope is founded.

WORSHIP AND MUSIC REPORT

As I mentioned above, worshipping together has been a challenge in 2021, as it was the previous year, due to the pandemic. We began the year with "Online only" worship. Then, beginning on Palm Sunday, we went to in-person worship with an indoor and outdoor option. Then, in early October, we went to one indoor service. And then, beginning on January 2, 2022, we resumed both indoor and outdoor services.

Here are a couple of comparative statistics for the past three years in terms of Church attendance.

2019 (Pre-Covid) Total Sunday Attendance 2,859. Average Sunday attendance 54

2020 (10 months Covid) Total Sunday Attendance 3,319. Average Sunday attendance 64

2021 (12 months Covid) Total Sunday Attendance 2,706. Average Sunday attendance 52.

The big difference in 2020 was that it was mostly online for the whole year. During that year, a small group helped to produce these online services. But one person (Leslie Jones) worked diligently to film, edit and upload the online services, which took a large amount of her time every week. When the crisis seemed to be over in the spring of 2021, Leslie decided her movie-producing career was finished. And no one offered to take her place. So, we stopped doing online services. One message from the statistics above is that we can broaden our reach is we have online services. We are currently looking into the possibility of "live streaming" our services for the benefit of those who are not able, for whatever reason, to make it to church on Sunday.

Even though Covid disrupted our worship and our choir, we have begun to develop a team of people who offer their musical talents as individuals and as small groups. We are so grateful that our musically talented people have worked together so well and so graciously. I thank Dorothy LaBelle for her long and steady work as our organist over more than 10 years and our recent arrivals, Heidi, Olivia, Phillip, Clara and Jacob Tummescheit who have worked with

Dorothy to develop a team approach. I also wish to thank J.R Stanko, Sal Basile, Patrick and Hannah Gebhardt for singing solos and Bruce Duncan for organizing an A Capella choir for Lessons and Carols this year, and all of the folks who sang in that choir.

I also wish to thank Carol Jones for her tireless work in leading the Altar Guild through all of the changing worship services we have had over the past year (online, indoors and outdoors). She and her team have responded to every change with grace and enthusiasm. And I also want to thank Nan Heath and Jennifer Gebhardt for coordinating the flowers for the altar each week.

And I wish to thank the "outdoor worship set-up team" Warren and Lynda Blessing, Clark and Joyce Tomlinson, Jerry Stavola for their work of preparing the parking lot each week with chairs, tables, microphones, radio transmitters and speakers.

I also want to thank everyone who volunteered to read lessons and lead prayers at both the indoor and outdoor services. And I want to thank Connie Harasymiw and Rebecca Scruton for coordinating the ushers for the indoor services. And lastly, I want to thank everyone for continuing to support our worshipping community with your presence and you active participation. The last two years have been difficult in so many ways. And yet, we have persevered and gotten stronger in our worship of God and service to our neighbor.

CHRISTIAN FORMATION REPORT

Because of the continuing concerns about COVID transmission, we have been hindered in our abilities to hold in-person teaching, prayer and fellowship opportunities. However, we have continued to hold three different weekly groups via Zoom. The Wednesday Morning Prayer service, organized and led by lay persons has been a well-attended opportunity for Bible reflection, intercessory prayer, mutual encouragement and prayer. The Wednesday afternoon Centering Prayer group, led by Bishop Gordon is also an opportunity for several parish members to gather together for contemplative prayer. And finally, the Saturday morning group, led by Garth Meyers, focuses on the daily meditations of Richard Rohr – a widely read Roman Catholic monastic writer.

As we look ahead to 2022, we were hoping to start an in-person ALPHA course, partnering with St. Andrew's Church in Rocky Hill. And we are hoping to be able to hold an in-person Lenten program and hopefully return to a mid-week Bible study. At the time of this writing, we are experiencing a resurgence of COVID metrics and all in-person plans have been postponed. But, we will do the best we can in the midst of circumstances we cannot control.

MISSION AND OUTREACH REPORT FOR 2021

Mission and Outreach is the heart and soul of Trinity's presence in the world. We have managed to continue our outreach projects and even to increase our efforts in spite of the continuing pandemic. Despite the fact that many of the activities we have supported in the past have not reopened, we have been able to continue support through collections and monetary donations.

The Outreach and Mission account in our operating budget that is funded by parishioners through their pledges and giving began the year at \$9.935 dollars. By vote of the Vestry it was dispersed as follows;

In addition to the disbursement of funds, collections of requested and needed items continued with support of parishioners. These collections supported South Park Inn, Wethersfield Food Bank and Hands of Hartford, Women's Centre and Scholarships in Kafanchan, Nigeria.

ST. VINCENT'S SCHOOL AND MEDICAL CENTER IN HAITI

Trinity applied to the Sustainable Development Grant program at ECCT to aid funding of projects that would benefit St. Vincent's School and Medical Center. We received **\$6,125** dollars in grant money from ECCT and supplemented it with **\$4,625** from our Outreach and Mission account and were able to fund two sorely needed projects. The first is the Backpack Electronic Medical Records project which provided the medical personal with the means to produce and share medical information on their patients. The second is a Solar Panel for the St. Vincent's campus so there is power for lights and ceiling fans which would allow work on wheelchair repair and food preparation to continue.

WOMEN'S EMPOWERMENT CENTRE, DIOCESE OF KAFANCHAN, NIGERIA

Trinity parish members contributed **\$9,000** to purchase 60 foot-operated sewing machines, which were used during a month-long empowerment program to equip 120 widows, orphans, refugees and other disadvantaged women to learn a marketable skill which will enable them to become economically self -sufficient. At the conclusion of the program, the women who successfully completed the seamstress segment were given a sewing machine to start their own small business.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR DIOCESAN SCHOOLS IN DIOCEE OF KAFANCHAN, NIGERIA

For the fourth year in a row, Trinity parish members donated a total of **\$6,000** to provide full one-year scholarships for 60 students in four different diocesan schools. The scholarships go to orphans and others who are poorer than the average student in each school. A \$100 scholarship provides tuition, uniforms, books and meals for an entire school year.

FUND-RAISING CONCERT IN PARTNERSHIP WITH ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH IN ROCKY HILL

On October 23, Trinity members worked in partnership with members of St. Andrew's Church in Rocky Hill to hold a concert to raise funds for Kateri Medical Services. Music for the day was offered by "The Howling Hound Dogs" band and Sal Basile. About 120 people attended the concert and many more sent checks in ahead of time. All together, we raised more than \$40,000 to pay salaries for doctors, nurses, midwives and lab-technicians at the six medical clinics run by Kateri Medical Services, which provides medical care to about 20,000 people each year.

When all of these funds are added together, (budgeted outreach funds + sewing machines, + scholarships + Kateri donations + food collections) Trinity members contributed more than **\$40,000** in 2021 for various outreach efforts. That amounts to more than 25% of the amount everyone gives for plate and pledge income. We are small but we are giving and working generously to show forth the love of Jesus in our world.

SEAN'S CLOSET

The distribution of clothing and household goods from the rooms in Sean's Closet has nearly stopped as the pandemic continues. Social Services in Wethersfield are not able to bring clients over to Trinity. We continue in a holding pattern and hope to resume distribution this coming year.

SOUTH PARK INN

In 2021 Trinity was able to re-connect with South Park Inn to provide more than just financial support. We re-instated baskets to collect needed supplies as well as items for their Welcome Basket project, which provided basics for those moving into permanent homes. Trinity designated September as *Undie Sunday* month with a campaign that resulted in a collection of more than 400 much-needed pieces of underwear for SPI residents. During Advent, Trinity parishioners donated to a *Giving Tree* of gift cards, providing South Park Inn residents 40 gift cards totaling \$960 to brighten their Christmas.

The generosity of Trinity has been overwhelming and is greatly appreciated by everyone at South Park Inn.

COMMUNITY DINNERS AT HANDS ON HARTFORD

We provided these dinners 6 times in 2021 and we have plans to deliver the dinners 6 times in 2022. This program at Hands on Hartford served thousands of meals this past year, and we were part of this effort. Additionally, several times during the year we gave a donation to Hands on Hartford from Trinity Parish. These donations were funded by generous friends at Trinity and were used for the Community Crisis Fund which was established to help the most vulnerable people in the community as they address the impact of Covid on their lives.

REPORT OF THE TREASURER – 2021

Notes to Financial Statements:

A. Trinity Parish 2021 Actual to Budget (pg. 13)

Income was less than budget by \$21.7k because \$29k wasn't withdrawn from Investments.

- Pledges were under by \$2.1k, and Non-Pledge was over by \$9.7k.

Expenses were under budget by \$19.1k

- Music under because none of the special music planed occurred.
- Admin under \$2.6k mainly due to little spent for kitchen/building supplies.
- Church Property under \$11.8k due mainly to lower utilities and cleaning.

Total Expenses exceeded Total Income by \$2.6k.

Nothing was withdrawn from investments to cover operating expenses.

B. Designated/Restricted Account Activity (pg. 14)

The Vestry has defined Designated and Restricted Accounts as follows:

Designated Accounts are those where money was given for a specific purpose and must be used for that purpose.

Restricted Accounts are those where money was given but without a specific purpose. Vestry approves expenditures.

Some designated accounts, such as Outreach are managed by a group within Trinity who disburse funds from the account as appropriate. Other accounts such as Memorial Fund are used with Vestry approval.

The monies for these accounts may be in the checking account or investment accounts. Monies added to these accounts or disbursed from these accounts are not reflected in the Operating Budget. A total picture of Trinity's accounting must include both operating and designated/restricted fund activities.

C. 2022 Budget (pg. 15)

There were 3 goals in creating this year's budget: increase commitment to outreach and mission, enhance our music program, and increase the Rector's compensation budget to start approaching the cost for a $\frac{1}{2}$ rector. We increased our Outreach and Mission to 8% from 7%, towards our goal of 10%. Through a Memorial gift our music program will expand to include an organist along with Dorothy. We added money to the Rector's Compensation account for insurance and pension expense to start increasing this account up to what a $\frac{1}{2}$ time Rector would expect. This money won't be paid to Father Tom, but transferred to a restricted account at the end of the year to be used in the future.

Fiscal Year 2021 accounts were processed using Power Church Plus software.

We do have a number of jobs in the que to be taken on which include plaster repair of ceilings and painting in the sanctuary, along with the repair of the slate roof.

In addition, the following is a partial list of those accomplishments we were involved with this year.

- We take care of miscellaneous jobs from the Wethersfield Family Literacy Program in our church school area.
