From Our Pastor

Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep. For as by a man came death, by a man also has come the resurrection from the dead. For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive.
Corinthians 15: 20 - 22

Dear friends in Christ,

As you all know, there are many religions in the world: Christianity, Judaism, Islam, Buddhism, Hinduism, Shintoism, Confucianism, Animism, Pantheism and so on. And there are many ideologies which compete with religion in trying to explain the ultimate meaning of life: Nationalism, Communism, Socialism, Consumerism, Utilitarianism, Nihilism, Go-To-The-Gym-and-Have-A-Perfect-Bodyism and so on. If you try to compare all of the truth claims of all of these various ways of defining reality, you can give yourself a very big headache. But sometimes, it is worth giving yourself a headache to try to weigh up the competing truth claims and decide which makes the most sense.

Later this month, we are going to celebrate again the central truth claim of Christianity. This central truth claim has six parts, each of which builds on the other:

- 1) that the God who created us is seen most clearly in the human life of Jesus of Nazareth
- 2) that Jesus devoted his life to proclaiming and demonstrating the purpose and love of God
- 3) that Jesus suffered and died a horrid death to demonstrate God's presence and love in the midst of the worst of human cruelty
- 4) that Jesus defeated the power of sin and death when he rose from the dead
- 5) that Jesus appeared to his disciples after he rose from the dead
- 6) that Jesus is alive forevermore and promises eternal life to those who believe in, love and follow him

This is the central truth claim of Christian faith. This is the promise of Christian faith. This is the life-changing power and hope of Christian faith. We live in a world messed up by human sin ("as in

Adam all die”) but while we are living in this messed up world, we have the presence and power and hope of redemption (“so also in Christ shall all be made alive”).

In the final weeks of Lent and in Holy Week and Easter, we retrace the steps of Jesus. It is a pilgrimage of faith and hope. It is a time to reconnect – as if for the first time – with the God who has loved us so dearly in Jesus of Nazareth. I invite you all to enter this pilgrimage in expectation that God will show you the depths of His love for you and for our world.

You may have heard many sermons about the Resurrection of Jesus. You may have read the Bible or other books about the Risen Lord. You may have heard people talk about Jesus being alive. You may have heard about having a relationship with Jesus. But ultimately, there is only one way to know if any of this is true. And that is to experience it yourself. To pray that Jesus will show himself to you alive. That Jesus will enter into your life and give his life and love to you. Many years ago, someone challenged me to test out the truth claims of Christian faith for myself. And I did. And I am happy I did.

I invite you to invite Jesus, the Crucified and Risen Lord, to show Himself to you.

Expanding Local Outreach

Over the last three years, Trinity has recognized the desire of parishioners to have a more meaningful presence in meeting the needs of the less fortunate in town. After meeting with Erica Texeira, Assistant Director of Wethersfield Social and Youth Services, we came to realize that Trinity could offer space and volunteers but needed to interface with the town to identify people in need and also help in the distribution of clothing and household goods which we could collect and store in our rooms downstairs.

Earlier this year Sean Lawrence, an Eagle Scout from Troup 85, formulated a project to convert space into a very nice storage and

distribution center. Along with nearly a dozen fellow scouts, Sean cleaned, painted and refurbished three of our classrooms so that we can move ahead in our effort to offer clothing and household goods to people in need. At this time we envision one room to be home furnishings, one room for men's clothing and one for women's clothing. As our program evolves and gathers momentum, we may change those designations as needs become more defined.

As more concrete plans are made we will keep you all informed so you can step forward with your strengths and passions and help in whatever ways you feel you are called. Trinity people have always had great and generous hearts and we are opening yet another avenue in which they can help make a difference in their community.



Many of our committee members along with other parishioners are involved in community programs and ministries. Outreach is making a difference in so many ways, not the least of which is filling the bins in the Parish Hall nearly every week for Wethersfield Food Bank, South Park Inn, and our Syrian family. This is a wonderful ministry to which everyone has responded so willingly. Please don't forget the Wethersfield Social Services Backpack Program which students take home over the weekend to supplement their meals. Crackers, breakfast bars, granola bars, and other healthy snacks go into the Food Bank bin.

DINNER FUNDRAISER AT ST. ANDREW'S, ROCKY HILL

This dinner will raise money for the Neighbors Feeding Neighbors project which will enable us to provide food packets for about 1,000 people. St. Andrew's has extended an invitation to us to join them at 6 pm on April 12. The meal will consist of mac 'n' cheese with kielbasa, vegetables, bread and brownies. The cost is \$10 per person, \$15 per family. We hope to have a good crowd going from Trinity. NEIGHBORS FEEDING NEIGHBORS

We're excited to be participating with St. Andrew's in Rocky Hill in a new outreach program called Neighbors Feeding Neighbors. We will work together to package 10,000 freeze-dried meals of macaroni and cheese that will be distributed to the Wethersfield Food Bank, South Park Inn, and Cornerstone Shelter in Vernon. In Wethersfield, students who participate in the weekend Backpack Program will take home these easy-to-prepare meals on Fridays to provide them with hot food while they are away from the free meal program offered through the school system.

The packing, which is open to public volunteers, will take place on Saturday, May 4, at St. Andrew's from 9 am to noon. Volunteers will

work assembly line style to package the ingredients and can give an hour, 2 hours, or 3 hours of their time. Families are encouraged to bring children.

Donations will be accepted to allow us to package an additional 1,000 meals of oatmeal. These meals will be distributed through the food bank and multiple food programs to residents in town. Forty meals can be supplied for every \$10 donation.


