Dear Trinity Family,

The beginning of a new calendar year is a natural time to reflect on our lives. How are things going? What am I doing? What will this next chapter of my life be like? What changes do I want to make? Ordination of Deacon Darryl Burke

Our curate, the Rev. Darryl Burke, Deacon, will be ordained as a priest in the Episcopal Church on the evening of February 18 at Trinity. More details will follow soon.

In the Episcopal church, there are two types of deacons: vocational and transitional. Vocational deacons primarily focus on ministries which involve serving the poor, sick, weak and lonely, usually outside the church. Transitional deacons are on the path to becoming priests, being ordained as deacons first after completing all of their academic and other preparation. They remain as transitional deacons for about six months until they are ordained as priests.

Deacon Darryl was ordained a transitional deacon at Christ Church Cathedral last year. We are so blessed to have his ordination to the priesthood in our parish home. And, we'll have the added joy of hosting the ordination with Deacon Darryl's former home parish, St. Monica's, Hartford.

Outreach to Local, Regional and Worldwide Communities

NEWS FROM ST. VINCENT'S CENTER FOR CHILDREN WITH DISABILITIES, HAITI

Marilyn Ford recently received a letter from Ken Quigley, board president of St. Vincent's, with some very sad news. "Blockades, businesses, and schools have been shuttered for three months because of corrupt political leadership. There is no commerce and drastic shortages of food and fuel. Haitian politicians refuse to acknowledge agendas other than their own so there is no simple solution." The downtown area where the Medical Clinic and Brace Shop are located is a center of ongoing protests. It is not safe for the physicians so the clinic is closed. The children are safe, and they continue to pay all faculty and staff. Their monthly payroll is the lifeline for some 100 people and their families. The check which we forwarded from the October cook-off did arrive safely for food and water.

The good news is that their Trustees in the United States have five new braillers and parts for eight broken ones plus wheels for the three drill presses in the Brace Shop. Workers have been trained to repair wheelchairs and braillers. In spite of the upheaval with the government, they are ready to lift St. Vincent's to a new and higher operational level than ever before.

CHRISTMAS TOYS FOR ST. MONICA'S IN HARTFORD

Thanks to all who participated in our Christmas toy drive and to Deacon Darryl for taking the toys to St. Monica's. The Holy Spirit had a hand in making this effort successful this year. Within only two days we had a car full of toys, and more the following Sunday to help give many children a joyous Christmas.

BACKPACK PROGRAM

We continue to support Wethersfield Social Services by providing snacks to over 60 school children who take home backpacks full of healthy, kid-friendly items to keep them going over the weekend. Healthy snacks like granola bars, protein bars, low sugar breakfast bars, peanut butter and cheese cracker packages, and juice boxes are needed. These go to lower income families in Wethersfield.

OUR SYRIAN AMERICAN FAMILY

Thank you for the items you regularly donate. We will continue to provide paper towels, toilet paper, washing machine detergent, dish detergent, liquid hand soap, shampoo, no-tears shampoo, juice boxes for the children, vegetable oil and olive oil.

Right now there are not too many children at the shelter and that's a good thing. But there are still men and women in need.
