From Our Pastor

Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted.

Matthew 5:4

Dear Trinity Family,

These are days of mourning and grief. Some of us are mourning the death of someone we know and love. In the past week, three people I know very well have died of COVID-19. On the day I am writing this article, I learned that another friend lost her two brothers in two weeks from the virus. Two other friends of mine have lost family members and were not able to attend the funeral nor to give and receive the hugs and tears that comfort us in times of loss.

Many of us are grieving the loss of our way of living and relating to friends, neighbors, family members and colleagues. Many of us are fearful of becoming ill or of losing our jobs or of losing our financial security.

Many of us are grieving the loss of our physical church community which gives us strength and hope and friendship and purpose. Online worship services are better than doing nothing, but still not the same as being together in person. God has created us as relational beings and our basic way of relating has been disrupted.

Yet Jesus says, "Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted." Where is the blessing? When, where and how will we be comforted?

The blessing is that mourning helps us to feel and know the depth of our love for someone or some aspect of life. Someone (not Jesus) once said, "Grief is love with nowhere to go." When we feel the depth of grief, we feel the depth of the love, and we are led to appreciate that person or people more than ever before. A further blessing is that grieving helps us to understand the pain of others and to be an affirming and healing presence in their lives.

When we are grieving the loss of a way of life that is not possible at the moment, it gives us a greater appreciation for the sweetness of life as we have known it and a deeper appreciation of "normal" if and when something like "normal" returns. When I was a child,

whenever I would complain about being bored, my mother would tell me that there are a lot worse things in life than boring. She had lived through pretty extreme poverty during the Great Depression and boring was a big improvement on that. Boring was fine with her.

When, where and how will we be comforted? Those things are in God's plan and we can be expectant in prayer and trusting in God as we await them. One thing this season of grief has taught me is to trust more in God and less in my own plans and aspirations.

Saint Paul wrote the following words while he was sitting in prison waiting to die:

"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let all people know your forbearance. The Lord is at hand. Have no anxiety about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication make your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which passes all understanding will keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus." Philippians 4: 4-7

During this season of mourning and grief, I invite you to offer your deepest sorrows and worries and anxieties to God in prayer every day. Ask God for the strength and the consolation and the trust to live each day to its fullest potential while we await better days ahead. And then do it again tomorrow and then the next day and the next and the next. When you do that, you will experience a peace that passes human understanding.

Faithfully Living Out Our Faith

My brothers and sisters in Christ,


Jesus asked his first disciples to leave their families and their occupations as fishermen by telling them, "Follow me, and I will make you fish for people." (Matthew 4:19) It was in this way that Jesus cast his net and caught those who would become his followers, and it was His expectation that they too would cast their nets and capture additional followers. This was not a capture by force, but it was one which is accomplished through their teaching and living out the beliefs and faith that Jesus had taught. It is through the casting of their nets that they would attract a new community of the faithful, which would hold a special place in the eyes of the Lord.

It was unlike the Covenant that had been established with the Israelites by God, which brought the expectation of a higher degree of holiness, by God's "Chosen People". The covenant that would be established with the followers of Jesus, as a consequence of His death and resurrection, is one which was and is offered to all who choose to believe in Jesus the Christ, and it comes as a consequence of our faithfully living out our faith!

In these uncertain days, we are reminded of our commitment to God's expectation that we faithfully live out our faith. We've heard a wide range of explanations for the current state of world affairs. Some say it is the earth cleansing itself, while others claim that it is God's punishment for our failures to live as He has called us to live. Still others have identified this as retribution from God for humankind's sinfulness. As Christians we know that the God whom we know, love and worship would not and does not reap such misfortune on us, for our sins have been cleansed and our salvation assured through the death and resurrection of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ! These are not the actions of the God we worship; thus, we must not seek to find reasons for the pandemic in the hands of God.

Sometimes, as trite as it may sound, bad things do happen to good people for no particular reason. We cannot let misfortune or adversity weaken our faith; thus, we cannot allow this pandemic to weaken our faith in our loving God. Instead, we must allow our faith to serve as the means for getting through the current time of fear and trials. In the midst of these days we must continue to cast the nets of our faith in our efforts to draw others into the community of Christ's faithful. Christ walks with us in these days of uncertainty, and we must continue to ask our God to sustain and strengthen us as we seek to live out our faith, confident that by faithfully living as Jesus has taught us to live, all will fare well, and we will live into the reward that has been promised to each of us.

Outreach to Local, Regional and Worldwide Communities

Lenten Project: Sewing Machines for Nana

South Park Inn

Our Syrian American Family

Following the guidelines of the Episcopal Church in Connecticut for COVID-19, we cannot drop off groceries and personal care items. Parishioners have brought cash and items like toilet paper to Marilyn's house and she has been able to safely deliver the items to the family.

Community Dinners at the Cathedral

Hands on Hartford has been updating us about changes to their Community Meals program due to the pandemic. Instead of sitdown dinners, they are offering takeout meals in accordance with CDC and City of Hartford guidelines. They are also continuing to offer unsheltered guests a warm place to stay during inclement weather.

Wethersfield Food Bank

Although we can't donate and deliver groceries to the Wethersfield Food Bank during this difficult time, many of us still want to help feed people who are hungry. Holy Saturday


Grief, remorse, fear haunts, Disoriented, lost way, What can future be?

Beware of Scammers

The Diocese advises that scammers are targeting churches and church members with fraudulent requests for donations.

Scammers have hacked into church office computers and gotten names and e-mail addresses of parish members. They send emails pretending to be the pastor asking for a donation. If you get an appeal like this from one of the clergy, wardens or vestry members, please let us know. And most importantly, *do not send money! We will never ask you for money in this way!*

If you ever have any doubts about requests for funds coming from the church or from the Diocese, please call clergy or a warden to verify it before you send funds.

Evening Book Club


