From Our Pastor

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

November begins with All Saints Day and ends (almost) with Thanksgiving Day. On All Saints Day, we remember and celebrate our interconnectedness with all of God's family throughout time and space and eternity. When you and I were baptized into the Body of Christ, we became members of a world-wide family.

For most of the month of October, we have been blessed with the presence of Bishop Markus Dogo and his wife Nana from the Diocese of Kafanchan in central Nigeria – where we are sponsoring 48 children to go to primary school. It is also the home of one of the medical facilities that Kateri Medical Services has built and funds and runs in partnership with the local Christians. Our "small but mighty" church here in Wethersfield is making a big impact on the lives of many people there through education and health care. During their visit, we raised additional funds for school scholarships and other school related expenses – all together, just in the last three months, Trinity members have contributed about \$7,000 toward scholarships and other expenses. This also is an expression of the interconnectedness we celebrate on All Saints Day.

And the great thing about forming friendships and partnerships with Christians from around the world is that we get to see a wider dimension of how God works in our world. Many have told me how inspired and touched they were by the testimonies and sermons and prayers of Bishop Markus and Nana Dogo. This experience of family in Christ is what we celebrate on All Saints Day.

Also, in October, we began our 150th anniversary celebration, remembering that we are standing on the shoulders of those who have gone before us – and offering our own shoulders to those who come after us. At that service, we welcomed new members and confirmed young people and welcomed members of Good Shepherd Church in Hartford who helped to start our parish and also from St. Andrew's in Rocky Hill whose parish we helped to start about (I think) 40 years ago. Again, this is the interconnectedness that we celebrate on All Saints Day.

As you read this newsletter, I will be in Nigeria with seven

other folks from different Episcopal churches here in Connecticut. We will be working on two different medical outreaches in two different places: Port Harcourt and Gusau. We will be working alongside 40 or 50 volunteers from Nigeria to help thousands of people with medical care – extending the love of Jesus to hurting people.

Whenever I participate in one of these medical outreaches, I try to look into the eyes of hurting people and see the face of Jesus. And when you look, you see. When you seek, you find. This also is the interconnectedness in Christ that we celebrate on All Saints Day.

At the end of November, we set a day apart to give thanks for all that God has given us. This year, we will be celebrating with members of other faith groups here at our church on Tuesday, November 26. At a minimum, we will be including several local Christian congregations as well as the Jewish community a few blocks from our church and a Muslim community from Meriden. Our theme for this service will be *Gratitude and Love* — gratitude to God for all God has blessed us with, and to love our neighbors as ourselves. I encourage you all to join us for this service. This too is an opportunity to reflect on a deep interconnectedness that we share with all people created in the image and likeness of God, even those who do not share our Christian faith.

Just writing about these different events and opportunities gives me a deep sense of gratitude for all that God has given us. November is gratitude month. And I am grateful.

Annual Convention Update

The Annual Convention of the Episcopal Church in Connecticut (ECCT) took place in Hartford on October 26 and 27. Trinity sent two lay delegates, Ray Colburn and Rose Riley, to represent Trinity and vote on ECCT resolutions. On Saturday, there was also opportunity to meet in workshops with other delegates to discuss important issues. Our delegates chose to participate in discussions about how small churches could make disciples and how to reach out and retain our young people in the years following confirmation. Honest Conversations with Muslim Neighbors

Who are our Muslim neighbors? What do they believe? How do extremist actions worldwide affect them?

In an effort to build bridges and educate ourselves, we will sponsor "Honest Conversations" on Sunday, November 17 at 1pm in the Parish Hall. The program was developed and supported by the Connecticut Council for Interreligious Understanding (CCIU), the Muslim Coalition of Connecticut and the Hartford Seminary.

The format of the presentation involves attendees writing questions on cards. The questions are given to three speakers who take turns responding. The speakers are Muslims who live in our community and have their own unique view of the world based on their varied experiences.

Soup Sale to Support Children in Honduras

November 10 is the day Ginger Smith will sell her famous homemade soups to help raise funds for Copprome Orphanage in El Progresso, Honduras. There will be 28 different kinds of soup available for purchase after church in the Parish Hall. Eleven will be vegetarian!

Ginger has been visiting the orphanage twice a year for the past 18 years. While there, she organizes and sponsors field trips, movies, birthday and pizza parties, and responds to specific needs such as shoes, athletic equipment, clothes, education and computer needs. The greatest need at this time is food so Ginger will use her soup money primarily for food for the children.

Our 12th cook-off last month was a fun evening with 15 cooks participating from Christ Church, Middle Haddam; St. Andrew's, Rocky Hill; St. James', Glastonbury; and our parish. The recipes (eleven chili and five rice & beans, some old and some new) were all delicious. Parishioners from all four churches attended; there was special music by Father Tom, Sal Basile, and J. R. Stanko; Bishop Marcus Dogo spoke on *Educating Children in Third World Countries*, and we celebrated our successful Nigerian scholarship fund drive which raised enough money to send 48 children to primary school in Kafanchan Diocese, Nigeria.

Jimmy LaBella (St. Andrew's), Doug Scott (St. James'), and Tom Traue (Trinity) served as judges. In the Judged Category, here are the winners: for Rice & Beans, first place went to Connie Harasymiw (Trinity) with her Bean and Avocado Salad. Second place went to Yaman (our Syrian friend) for Rice and Beans with Lamb. For Chili, first place went to Mark Rodbourn (St. Andrew's) for his Rowdy Con Carne and second place went to Peter and Sheila Dewberry (Trinity).

Here are the winners in the People's Choice Category: for Rice & Beans, first place went to Yaman (our Syrian friend) for his Rice and Beans with Lamb and second place went to Connie Harasymiw (Trinity) with her Bean and Avocado Salad. For Chili, first place went to Blake Crevoiserat (St. James') for Rick's Sunday Night Chili and second place went to Mark Rodbourn (St. Andrew's) for his Rowdy Con Carne.

The cook-off continues to take on a life of its own and has now become a multi-community event. A check for \$1,005 was sent to St. Vincent's Center for Disabled Children in Haiti to provide whatever these children most need. Thanks to all who participated in any way and some in many ways to make this a real success. Three of the cooks from other churches indicated they want to come back next year. The feedback is that this was the best cook-off of all!

BACKPACK PROGRAM

We continue to support Wethersfield Social Services by providing snacks to over 60 school children who take home backpacks full of healthy, kid-friendly items to keep them going over the weekend. Healthy snacks like granola bars, protein bars, low sugar breakfast bars, peanut butter and cheese cracker packages, and juice boxes are needed. These go to lower income families in Wethersfield.

WETHERSFIELD FOOD BANK

Your response has been amazing. Thank you for your generosity. Please continue to bring canned chicken and tuna in water, jelly (plastic containers), pasta, rice, peanut butter, cans of fruit in 100% juice, low sodium soups, pasta sauce, no-salt-added canned vegetables, and cereal.

OUR SYRIAN FAMILY

Thank you for the items you regularly donate. We will continue to provide paper towels, toilet paper, washing machine detergent, dish detergent, liquid hand soap, shampoo, no-tears shampoo, juice boxes for the children, vegetable oil and olive oil.

We have updated our South Park Inn shopping list to include the following items: socks, gloves, hats, sweatshirts, thermal underwear, hand-warmers and toe-warmers, chapsticks and hand lotion. 
The baked goods table is very profitable and we thank you for helping out.
