Christmas in Covid Season: What Good News? What Great Joy?

Dear Trinity Family,

This year has been a tough one for everyone. Some have lost their freedom to move. Some have lost their jobs. Some have lost their businesses. Some have lost their lives. Some have lost their loved ones and not been able to mourn in the way we are used to.

And our church family is not immune to the losses of this past year. Just a week ago, we had the first funeral of a parish member who died of Covid-19. We have had several funerals of members whose family members could not gather with friends in the way they would have wished. Our worship services have been curtailed due to concerns about the safety of the most vulnerable.

And now we are approaching Christmas. I had hoped that we could have had some sort of in-person service on Christmas, even if it was outdoors. But, after much thought and prayer, we have decided to err on the side of caution and safety. So, our services will all be online this year. And yes, that is a bummer for me just as much as it is for you.

But we should not lose sight of the reality of Christmas and the truth about God and ourselves that we celebrate at Christmas.

"Be not afraid" is how the first Christmas worship service began. That's what the angels said to the shepherds. Every time God does something great in the Bible, God sends an angel to tell the people to not be fearful at the nearer presence of God they are about to experience.

In Jesus Christ, God became what we are — took on our human nature, that we might take on God's nature. In Jesus Christ, we see the human face of God. In Jesus Christ, we see the divine potential of humanity.

Amidst all of the hurts and fears and brokenness of life, the love and kindness of God shines through. If we listen with ears of faith, we can hear the message of the angels, "Be not afraid."

Real Christmas is about the blessings bestowed on us by God, not the external trappings we associate with it. This year, many of those trappings, as wonderful as they are, have been taken away. I invite you all to focus on the presence and love of God. And be thankful.

I wish you all a blessed and Christ-filled Christmas.

New Policy for Closing and Re-opening Indoor Services

The decision to close indoor/in-person services is made by the rector in conversation with the wardens. It is to be done on an emergency basis without vestry approval. However, the vestry should be notified that it has occurred and should be kept up to date.

The following criteria are to be considered relevant:

- A parish member who has been in the building reports a positive Covid test
- A parish member who has been in the building reports an exposure to a positive Covid person
- Any outside group reporting an incidence of Covid or exposure to Covid
- Any vendor, employee or person involved in programs renting the lower level who reports having a positive test after being in the building

Also to be considered:

- Reports and recommendations from the governor's office and the CDC pertaining to positivity rates in the state and in Hartford County and Wethersfield
- Recommendations from the Episcopal Church in Connecticut (ECCT) and its bishops

If any of these occur and the decision is to close, the following will occur:

- The building is closed to all church services and all groups for a 14-day quarantine period.
- An e-mail blast will go out immediately to inform the parish of the occurrence with recommendations. The privacy of the Covid positive person must be maintained.
- Any programs renting the downstairs should be notified and consulted concerning their protocols and whether they choose to remain open.
- The Tri-Town Health Officer shall be notified and provided with the names and phone numbers of everyone who has been in the building for contact tracing.
- The ECCT and the insurance company shall be informed.
- Depending on where the infected person was in the building, the building shall be professionally disinfected.


At the end of the 14-day quarantine, if no more cases occur, the rector in conversation with the wardens shall determine whether to open for indoor/in-person services.

If the State mandate for safety puts Wethersfield in the red zone, the Church will be closed immediately to all indoor activities. The closure will last until Wethersfield returns to the orange zone for four consecutive weeks.

The CDC guidelines and the status of the local schools (in session or not) will be part of the decision making process. All these areas will be considered prior to making a final decision.

If a parishioner's town, e.g. Newington, remains in the red zone and Wethersfield is in the orange zone, the parishioner will please consider that information and their possible exposure before returning to indoor/in-person services.



Brother, Give Us a Word

Monasticism began when a few faithful men and women went into the desert to seek God and live a life of prayer. These Desert Fathers and Mothers were spiritual beacons whom others sought out for their wisdom in the ways of God. The seekers would ask, "Father (Mother), give me a word."

The brothers at St. John the Evangelist in Boston have adapted this ancient tradition for today, offering online a daily "word" to all who seek a deeper knowledge of God. Here's an example:

Tithe – Tithing is an Old Testament principle, giving ten percent of what we have and hold to God. If you were to ask me if tithing is an important principle for today, I would say no. I think the invitation is not for 10 percent but for 100 percent. We are trustees of 100 percent of the life entrusted to us by God. The question then becomes how we should spend our lives, being the gifts that they are. -Br. Curtis Almquist
