

## **Transition Plans**

First and most important, save August 28 on your calendars. That will be Father Tom's last Sunday service with us. We are planning a celebration/potluck brunch for Tom and Maryjane after the service. More information will be coming.

The wardens are prayerfully searching for supply clergy who can assist us at least through January. The diocesan policy is for ECCT to assess a parish's financial status and then decide how many hours the parish can afford to pay the next priest, thus determining the hours of the priest's involvement with a parish. We will then have their assistance in finding the best available clergy for our situation. It is our hope to have a priest-in-charge in place early next year. There are many challenges and bumps in the road ahead. The one thing we can promise, we will keep you as up-to-date as possible. At this point, any questions or thoughts can be directed to one of the wardens. Please keep this whole process in your prayers.

## **Property Update**

Our sanctuary ceiling and walls have been repaired and painted and are now complete. This work was approved by the vestry last year but the painter discovered new leaks in the slate roof. We had to retain the services of the roofing company to handle the slate work. When that was done, we brought the painter back in to finish the job. So finally, it's all done and looks great.

Based on parishioner input, additional projects are being considered, e.g. ADA (Americans with Disability Act) issues; repairing windows in the Seabury Room; roof leak off the old sanctuary; and streaming services. Our ADA compliance committee needs additional members who may be advocates or have special knowledge in the area. Please let one of the wardens know if you can help out.

## From the Vestry and Wardens

In the June 2022 Belfry, we began a discussion about our opportunity to redefine who we are and what we are. Our desire is to be as transparent as possible about the status of Trinity in its various areas. This transparency includes the positive movements being made as well as the areas of need.

We shared about the workings of the Finance Committee, Mission and Outreach, and the Building Committee. Orientation for Lay Eucharistic Ministers, Lay Eucharistic Visitors, and Lay Preachers has begun. As we are now worshiping in the sanctuary and following the seasons of the church year, a new Worship Committee under the leadership of Garth Myers is being formed to support and guide our worship, liturgy, and music.

The following are some areas that need volunteers and co-leaders.

• Christian Formation: Bible studies, Sunday forums, and small groups for spiritual deepening

- Special Events: Oversee setup for receptions and special parish events
- Kitchen Maintenance: Oversee cleanliness of counters, refrigerator/ freezer, other appliances; keep supplies stocked (plates, napkins, cups, glasses, coffee, etc.)
- Hospitality: Welcoming all; ushers/greeters
- Outdoor Beautification: Weeding, trimming, planting as needed
- Sexton Duties: Since we have a cleaning service but not a sexton, there are several tasks to attend to: setting up tables and chairs in the Parish Hall as needed and putting the trash/recycle containers out each Sunday and returning them to their proper place on Tuesdays.
- Media Liaison: Connecting with our area news sources about who we are, what we are doing and when.
- Social Events/Fellowship: Whatever leaders/co-leaders envision with regard to dances, travelogues, game nights, movies, pot-lucks, etc.

So dear friends, these are some of the areas that need leadership, support and, in some cases, re-visioning. Please connect with any of the wardens or vestry with questions, ideas and willingness to help.

## **Meeting Chief Medina**

Chief Rafael Medina of the Wethersfield Police Department recently met with the wardens and Father Tom. He is focused on getting to know the community and getting the community to know of the police's positive presence and availability. He described the various ways this is being effected. We were able to ask questions and he answered candidly and collegially. Our conversation was very positive and important given the times in which we are living. We are fortunate to have him heading our police department.

## **Refugee Resettlement Update**

Our coalition with First Church in Wethersfield, St. Andrew's in Rocky Hill, and Church of Christ in Newington started in December. By March, we had raised \$15k, 40 volunteers were trained and background checked, and we secured an apartment in Hartford that was accessible to medical facilities, recreation areas, and public transportation. The arrival of a refugee family was imminent and we were organized into 14 different committees to help with employment, education, healthcare, transportation, etc.

Regrettably, according to IRIS, refugee arrivals have decreased dramatically. Therefore, we're planning to forgo the apartment and wait for various government agencies to begin allowing additional refugees into the United States through the federal refugee resettlement program.

In the meantime we'll continue to do as Jesus commands his disciples in Luke 12:35, "Be dressed for action and have your lamps lit..."

This is my last note about scholarships for the students in the Diocese of Kafanchan, Nigeria.

For the past three years, we have asked Trinity members to provide a scholarship of \$100 per student. This pays for tuition, school uniforms, books and lunches for one academic year. In the Diocese of Kafanchan, everyone is poor by American standards but some families are poorer than average in that context. These scholarships help the families that are most economically disadvantaged.

I hope you will continue to give to these scholarships after I have left you. The need remains even though I am not here to remind you. Cheryl Chadsey, who has had a long career in educating young people, has agreed to lead this effort in years to come. I hope that you will respond to her appeals as generously has you have responded to mine.
