
### Trinity Episcopal Church | Wethersfield, CT

#### **From Our Pastor**

Dear Trinity Family,


November is a month of thanksgiving.

It begins with All Saints Day, a time to give thanks for all of the holy ones in the family of God who have shown, and still show, us the way to live as faithful followers of Jesus. It is followed immediately by All Souls Day, in which we remember all of our loved ones who have gone before us in faith and who await us in the Kingdom of God.

Next is Veterans Day, when we remember "the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month" in which the Armistice that ended Wold War I was enacted. And we give thanks for the soldiers who paid the ultimate sacrifice to bring peace and justice to our world.

Next is November 22, Stewardship Sunday, in which we remember all the ways that God has blessed us and we express our gratitude by offering our pledges of support for our church community here at Trinity. In our Sunday communion liturgy, we often say these words when presenting the offering to God: "All things come of Thee, O Lord. And of thine own, have we given thee." Everything we have and everything we are is a gift from God: every breath of life, every beat of our heart, every minute of every day is a precious gift from God. When we offer our money (which is a product of our time and energy) to God it is our "thank you" to God for the precious gift of life that God has given us every moment of our time on this earth.

Next is Thanksgiving Day. (Not turkey day. Not gluttony day. Not football day. Not get ready to join the shopping mob on Black Friday day. Not argue with my relatives about politics day.) It is a day for giving thanks to Almighty God for the gifts we have been

Lastly, on November 29, we begin the season of Advent, a time to give thanks that God does not give up on us when we have turned away from Him. A time to give thanks for God's greatest gift of all: "God so loved the world, He gave his only begotten Son, so that all who believe in him may not perish but have everlasting life."

November is filled with all of these occasions to give thanks. I invite you all to set aside a time every day in November to write down something for which you are thankful. And share your list with someone else during one of the many times of thanksgiving in November.

Oh, and by the way, — I almost forgot! — we are having an election on November 3. Whatever happens on election day this year, I think it is safe to predict that many millions of people will be very unhappy. We live in the midst of the most polarized environment in living memory. I invite you all to put this event, and however you may feel about the outcome of it, into the bigger context of gratitude to God for all that God has given us. And to share that perspective with people you know who are expressing their extreme unhappiness.

Whatever happens on election day and its immediate aftermath is in the hands of God. God's Kingdom is bigger and stronger and longer-lasting than whatever happens this week, this month, this year or this century in the United States of America. We Christians need to love our country and its people. And we can love our country most helpfully by remembering that this is not our ultimate homeland — the Kingdom of God is. Jesus has gone to prepare a place for us "that where I am you may also be." Our ultimate home is the New Jerusalem, in which there will be "no more tears, no more crying, no more pain any more, for the former things [including partisan politics] have passed away." And for that, we give our ultimate thanks.

## St. Vincent's Center for Children with Disabilities in Haiti

Here's an update from Kenneth Quigley, board president: "There is good news to share about our work in Haiti and our volunteer team in the United States, and I am eager to bring you up to date. First, classes at St. Vincent's began in August on our Santo 17 campus following months of delay because of political unrest and COVID-19. Thanks to an additional bus and new schedules, the bus ride to school was reduced from several hours to 45 minutes. That means more time for academic instruction and extracurricular activities. All of our teachers are beginning to learn sign language as an important step toward full inclusion for our deaf students. Everyone wears a face mask, observes social distancing, and uses the newly installed washing stations for frequent hand washing. Thankfully, we have had no COVID-19 cases. At our downtown medical center, the new x-ray machine, a gift from the Japanese Embassy, officially opened on October 7, meaning that we can now do diagnostic work on site, saving our families timeconsuming trips and expense in finding another location for that work. In the United States, where we have no paid staff, we now have an experienced volunteer development manager and a software system for her to manage! This means that our communications and acknowledgments are timely, prompt, and personalized."

## Jesus is coming

We have a nativity scene coming to the front yard of the church. We have purchased three figures to start it off: Joseph, Mary and baby Jesus. The property committee is in the beginning stage of designing the stable and then will build it. It will be made in such a way that it can be assembled right after Thanksgiving. It will be constructed to allow for easy assembly and disassembly and storage in the garage. With all the pedestrian traffic and automobiles, it should get a lot of attention.

We will build the stable so that there is space to include additional figures next year. It could be a good idea for someone who would like to obtain a Christmas present for the church.

#### **Online Contributions**

An enhancement has been added to our website that allows for online contributions to Trinity. This option is designed to provide everyone, not just parishioners, an alternative way to give or donate to Trinity and the causes we support, especially since our online worship offerings have attracted followers outside of our parish family.

All of the transactions are processed via PayPal. You can use your credit card, debit card or PayPal account to complete the transaction. You do not need to have a PayPal account to make a donation. When making an online donation, you are able to direct it to one of many initiatives, i.e. pledge, Kateri Medical Services, etc., via a drop-down box which includes a write-in option.

The account has been set up as a non-profit operating as a 501c3 so all contributions remain tax deductible. This gives Trinity the ability to establish the best transaction fee rate of 2.3% plus .30 per transaction. So, for a \$100 donation, the transaction fee would be \$2.60. Please note that you will receive credit for your full donation. The transaction fee will be absorbed by Trinity. Contributions can made at trinityepiscopalweth.org/give

Traditionally we have had speakers at each of the four Sunday services. They share their views of stewardship and in what way this parish is part of their reason for pledging.


This year we will do a theme and variation of this sharing. During each of the four weeks of November, a stewardship reflection from one of our parishioners will be sent in an e-blast.

## **Praying Through This Season**

As we journey through this season of intensity and unknown, what we do know is that God is love and that prayer is key for our grounding and for sustaining our hope. God comes to us in ways often unknown to us and others as we pray. What a privilege we have to be prayerfully in the presence of God and to bring others with us through intercessory prayer.

I am offering the following for yours and my daily practice. This comes from The Society of Saint John the Evangelist (SSJE). "In praying for others we learn really and truly to love them. As we approach God on their behalf we carry the thought of them into the very being of eternal Love, and as we go into the being of him who is eternal Love, so we learn to love whatever we take with us there." -Richard Meus Benson, SSTE (1824-1915)

This form of prayer is Intercessory Prayer and I find that, for me, it can be challenging at times, because I'm aware that often I don't know how to pray for another. So what might be a helpful way to engage in this form of prayer? The following is a suggestion from the SSJE.

#### **An Intercessory Lord's Prayer**

Where "N" appears below, substitute the name of the person whom you hold in prayer.

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name in N., thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven for N. Give N. this day his/her daily bread. And forgive N. his/her trespasses, as he/she forgives those who trespass against him/her. And lead N. not into temptation, but deliver him/her from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever and ever. Amen.

Please continue to pray for our parish daily prayer list. May God's kingdom come and God's will be done. Amen.


Along with this time in our history, we also need to be praying for our parish family. I invite you to re-connect with the our Weekly Prayer List and intercede on behalf of the people named.
