Viva la France Submitted by Marla Castillo

Most people recognize the contributions the French made to architecture in the iconic structures of the Eiffel Tower and the Statue of Liberty. However, architecture is just one area that French ingenuity influenced. The French were masters of hot-air balloon flight nearly 100 years before the Wright brothers took flight. In addition, the French were integral in the development of the parachute as early as the 800's. The modern parachute was also a French invention in 1797.

French ingenuity helped create life-saving inventions. Imagine a medical office visit without the ubiquitous use of the stethoscope. The first rudimentary stethoscope was a paper tube created by Rene Laennec. Although the first human to human blood transfusion didn't occur until the 20th century, the first successful animal to human blood transfusion took place in 1667, by French physician, Jean-Baptiste Denis.

Some great inventions are accidental. French chemist, Edouard Benedictus, dropped a celluloid coated glass flask that did not shatter. He patented this new invention, realizing how it could reduce serious injuries in vehicle accidents. Today, laminated glass is used in car windshields everywhere.

One French invention changed the Entertainment industry: cinema. Louis Le Prince is considered the Father of Cinematography. He created a 1.66-second moving picture using a single lens motion camera and paper film. *Roundhay Garden Scene* is considered the oldest surviving film. Modern cinema is also a French invention. The Lumiere Brothers patented the Cinematographe in 1895 and showed several short films to France and then the world.

Another invention changed the way we communicate. French engineer Philippe Kahn is given credit for the first digital camera phone in 1997, using a digital camera, laptop, and cell phone. A modern phenomenon was born.

If you were at our January meeting you were reminded to be wearing your Red Dress pins this month to heighten awareness of heart disease in women. Heart attack and other cardiovascular diseases are America's No. 1 killer. "As with men, women's most common heart attack symptom is chest pain or discomfort. But women are somewhat more likely to experience other common symptoms, particularly shortness of breath, nausea, vomiting and back or jaw pain. Learn the signs, but remember if you're not sure it's a heart attack, have it checked out. Minutes matter!!"

Inspired by the true stories of real women impacted by heart disease, the American Heart Association's Go Red For Women movement and Emmy-nominated actress Elizabeth Banks created the short film, "Just a Little Heart Attack," to educate women about the realities of heart disease and encourage them to put their health first. The short film, directed by and starring Ms. Banks, chronicles one woman's experience ignoring her symptoms and putting herself last. Go Red For Women hopes the film, "Just a Little Heart Attack," will engage and inspire women to put their health first and take care of their heart. 
