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Message from the Detachment Commander

I am pleased to present the West Parry Sound Detachment - 2025 Detachment Board Annual Report. This report includes crime, traffic enforcement and community well-being data, and highlights initiatives and successes from the past year. 2025 was the last year of the 2023-2025 West Parry Sound Detachment Action Plan and this report will provide a final update and progress results from that plan.



I am proud of the work undertaken by our detachment.

In 2025,

- The West Parry Sound Detachment remained committed to protecting the people of Ontario by upholding the law, preserving public safety, and responding to the needs of the communities we serve. Through proactive enforcement, strong partnerships, and community engagement, members worked to enhance safety, trust, and well-being across the detachment area.
- Traffic safety remained a priority in 2025. Members focused on impaired driving, aggressive driving behaviour, and compliance with provincial legislation on roads, trails, and waterways. Through targeted enforcement initiatives and high-visibility patrols, the detachment supported the OPP's continued commitment to protecting lives and improving road and marine safety.
- The detachment responded to major and critical incidents throughout the year, including serious collisions and complex investigations. Members worked collaboratively with emergency service partners to manage incidents effectively, prioritize public safety, and ensure coordinated responses.
- In response to community feedback and local data, West Parry Sound Detachment implemented enhanced community patrol and focused enforcement initiatives in identified areas. These initiatives increased police visibility, supported early intervention, and strengthened relationships with residents, businesses, and visitors.
- West Parry Sound Detachment continued to leverage policing technology to support investigations, enhance transparency, and improve officer and public safety. Tools such as body worn cameras, in-car cameras, and Automatic Licence Plate Recognition (ALPR) contributed to evidence collection, accountability, and operational effectiveness.
- The detachment worked closely with policing partners, including municipal, regional, and First Nations police services, to support cross-jurisdictional and coordinated enforcement initiatives. These collaborations enhanced information sharing and collective responses to community safety priorities.
- Community partnerships remained central to policing efforts. West Parry Sound continued to collaborate with community-based organizations through co-response models, including the Mobile Crisis Response Team (MCRT), to enhance responses to mental health-related calls and connect individuals with appropriate supports.
- Members maintained a victim-centred approach by working with community partners and service providers to ensure victims were connected to local resources and supports, promoting recovery and reducing the risk of re-victimization.
- Throughout 2025, members actively engaged with community groups, organizations, and stakeholders. Engagement included participation in community events, recognition of days of

significance, public safety presentations, and ongoing dialogue to build trust and promote community safety and well-being.

- West Parry Sound supported the professional development and wellness of its members through training, learning opportunities, and wellness initiatives. Leadership continued to prioritize member well-being as a key component of effective and sustainable policing.

In 2026, we will release our new 2026-2029 West Parry Sound Detachment Action Plan. This is the first action plan developed under the *Community Safety and Policing Act* (CSPA). We are working closely with our West Parry Sound OPP Detachment Board and engaging with community members to ensure the needs of our communities are reflected in the commitments we make for the next four years.

Development of the 2026-2029 West Parry Sound Detachment Action Plan will coincide with the creation of the 2026-2029 OPP Strategic Plan creating organizational alignment.

As we look ahead to emerging challenges and new opportunities in policing and community safety, our detachment members remain committed to our mission to serve our communities, protect our citizens, uphold the law, and preserve public safety.

Members worked collaboratively with emergency service and policing partners to manage incidents effectively, prioritize public safety, and ensure coordinated and professional responses. Initiatives such as online reporting, the Mobile Crisis Response Team (MCRT) program and the CAMSafe initiative are key examples aimed at ensuring appropriate responses, while enhancing overall community safety and service efficiency. The detachment worked closely with policing partners, including municipal, regional, and First Nations police services, to support cross-jurisdictional and coordinated enforcement initiatives. Collaborative efforts included: • Community Street Crime Unit (CSCU) warrant execution. • Offender Management and Apprehension Program (OMAP) support. • Bail management facilitated at the detachment. • Use of qualified breath technicians and Drug Recognition Experts (DRE) to support investigations. These partnerships enhanced information sharing and strengthened collective responses to community safety priorities.

Members actively participated in provincial traffic safety campaigns, supporting province-wide initiatives focused on impaired driving, aggressive driving behaviour, and compliance with traffic legislation on roads, waterways, and trails. In May 2025, West Parry Sound Detachment participated in a commercial motor vehicle (CMV) and speed enforcement initiative focused on CMV compliance and roadway safety within the detachment area. Enforcement activity during this initiative included stunt driving, criminal and provincial offences. Throughout 2025, members also continued to investigate impaired driving offences, utilizing approved investigative tools and techniques to support impaired operation investigations and charges. Provincial Offences Act (POA) enforcement remained a consistent component of traffic safety efforts, contributing to compliance, deterrence, and public safety. These activities supported the detachment’s year-round focus on addressing the “Big Four” causal factors of fatal, personal injury, and property damage collisions.

Ensure our communities have service delivery that is focused on: 1) Investigative excellence 2) Mutual trust and respect	Members maintained a victim-centred approach, working with service providers to ensure victims were connected to local resources, promoting recovery and reducing the risk of re-victimization.
To provide support and liaise with First Nations communities.	Members of the West Parry Sound Detachment and our First Nations policing partners provided mutual support to one another by attending calls for service and providing back-up when required. We continue to enjoy an ongoing mutually respectful policing relationship. Members of the West Parry Sound Detachment are deployed to support our northern First Nations communities with every opportunity that presents itself, while still ensuring operational needs are met in the detachment area.

Other Community Updates

Based on current crime trends and in response to concerns identified through community feedback and local data, West Parry Sound Detachment implemented enhanced community patrols and focused enforcement initiatives. Direction was communicated to members through daily shift briefings and detachment-wide communications, ensuring awareness of emerging issues and priority patrol areas.

Identified areas of focus included:

- School bus pickup and drop-off zones (morning and afternoon)
- High school area and Circle K intersection
- Fitness trail from the Seguin River to the Stockey Centre
- Downtown core during summer months

These efforts maintained consistent police visibility, supported early intervention, and strengthened relationships with residents, businesses, and visitors.

Members also attended and participated in key community safety groups, including:

- Parry Sound 911 Committee
- Parry Sound Downtown Quality of Experience Committee

The detachment oversaw and coordinated a complex joint training exercise with the Canadian Armed Forces on Georgian Bay, integrating OPP Marine Unit resources with Royal Canadian Air Force aerial operations. The exercise involved the timed recovery of Air Force members parachuting into open water and required extensive operational planning, risk management, and inter-agency coordination. This initiative strengthened emergency response readiness, joint-force interoperability, and operational proficiency in marine rescues.

The West Parry Sound Detachment demonstrated commitment to community engagement and youth wellness by supporting the Parry Sound Public School “Breakfast Club.” OPP officers regularly volunteered to serve breakfast to students each Tuesday morning, fostering positive police-youth relationships, supporting student well-being, and strengthening community trust.

Officers regularly attended local schools to deliver education and awareness to youth regarding the risks associated with illicit drugs and alcohol misuse, supporting early prevention and informed decision-making. This proactive engagement strengthens positive police-youth relationships and builds community trust. The consistent, visible presence of officers in the community enhances approachability and accessibility, which is recognized and appreciated by community members.

Policing Hours

The OPP has developed a Service Delivery Model (SDM) in response to several reviews and audit recommendations. The SDM is designed to:

- Promote officer wellness through balanced workloads
- Determine adequate staffing levels at each detachment
- Ensure the continued delivery of adequate and effective policing services in accordance with the *Community Safety and Policing Act (CSPA)*

To support SDM implementation, the OPP is undertaking a multi-year staffing strategy to address required increases in detachment personnel. This model supports the OPP’s ability to:

- Respond effectively to increasing calls for service
- Maintain safe communities through proactive patrols and community engagement
- Meet municipal expectations for police visibility

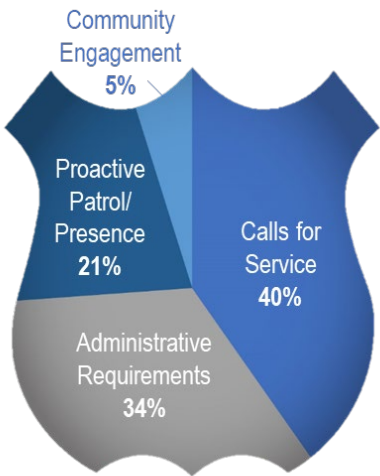


Figure 1: Service Delivery Model Provincial Target

To monitor progress and guide detachment-level planning, the OPP has established time allocation targets for provincial constables (Figure 1). These targets reflect how time should ideally be distributed by the end of the SDM staffing strategy.

The targets are based on a provincial average, and variations are expected between detachments due to differences in geography, operational structure, recruitment and leave of absence rates.

Detachments may face challenges in achieving these targets, but progress is expected as scheduling, data quality and strategic deployment continue to improve.

All members of a municipal police service board who will be running in the upcoming municipal elections in October 2026 should review [O. Reg. 408/23: Code of Conduct for Police Service Board Members](#).

Likewise, members of an Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) detachment board should review [O. Reg. 409/23: Code of Conduct for O.P.P. Detachment Board Members](#).

The ministry advises that a board member should disclose to the police service board or OPP detachment board their decision to be a candidate in a municipal election as soon as possible. Police service board members appointed by Lieutenant Governor in Council (LGIC) or Minister, as well as OPP detachment board members appointed by the Minister must inform the ministry as soon as possible. Please contact Gita Ramburuth, Appointments Officer, Training Strategy and Development Unit, Public Safety Division at gita.ramburuth@ontario.ca and Minister.SOLGEN@ontario.ca.

Board members who are candidates in the October 2026 municipal election should also consider whether being a candidate creates a conflict of interest as defined in O. Reg. 408/23 and O. Reg. 409/23. "Conflict of interest" is defined as a situation in which the board member's private interests or personal relationships place, or may reasonably be perceived to place, the member in conflict with their duties as a member of the board. If a board member does have a conflict of interest, they must promptly disclose this.

In addition, they must not participate in discussion of or voting with respect to matters at board meetings if they have a conflict of interest in the matter.

A police service board or OPP detachment board may have its own rules and procedures related to the political activity of its members that should be reviewed. Police service boards and OPP detachment boards may develop rules or procedures pursuant to s. 46 (1) and s. 67 (6) of the [Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019 \(CSPA\)](#).

Should a board member be elected to local office, the board member should consider notifying their police service board or OPP detachment board immediately, to determine next steps. Should a police service board member appointed by LGIC or Minister, or OPP detachment board member appointed by the Minister be elected to local office, the board member must notify the ministry immediately.

Inspector General of Policing (IG), Ryan Teschner, will be issuing an Advisory Bulletin in the coming weeks outlining key statutory obligations for police service board members and OPP detachment board members under the CSPA and its regulations, with a particular focus on board accountability and compliance requirements, as well as other applicable legislation.

Advisory Bulletins constitute the IG's advice pursuant to section 102 (4) of the CSPA and are intended to serve as a resource for the sector by offering the IG's general interpretation of various provisions of the CSPA. This Advisory Bulletin will be distributed by the Office of the Inspector General.

WHEREAS Highway 69 is a critical transportation corridor serving Northern Ontario, connecting communities, supporting economic development, and providing access for residents, emergency services, and tourism;

AND WHEREAS the long-promised four-laning of Highway 69 between Parry Sound and Sudbury has been ongoing for decades with repeated commitments from successive provincial governments, yet remains incomplete;

AND WHEREAS the current configuration of Highway 69 presents ongoing and significant public safety risks, including an increase in serious and fatal collisions in recent years;

AND WHEREAS collision data provides that 820 collisions, 18 fatalities, and 125 injuries have occurred on the single lane stretch of Highway 69 between French River and Highway 559 between January 1, 2018, and April 15, 2026;

AND WHEREAS specific urgent safety concerns have been identified, including:

- **unsafe lane transition areas where two lanes expand to three (e.g., several locations, most notably at Woods Road), where current dotted line markings permit opposing traffic to enter the passing lane, creating a serious risk of head-on collisions; and**
- **the absence of a dedicated turning lane at the SN Gen 7 Gas Station, requiring vehicles to stop in a live traffic lane and creating a high risk of rear-end collisions, particularly during peak seasonal traffic and winter driving conditions;**

AND WHEREAS these issues represent immediate, low-cost opportunities to significantly improve road safety while longer-term infrastructure work continues;

AND WHEREAS there is increasing public concern and advocacy from families of the deceased, municipalities, and elected officials across Northern Ontario calling for urgent action;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Council of the Municipality of McDougall formally calls upon the Province of Ontario and the Ministry of Transportation to take immediate action to

improve safety on Highway 69, including:

- the urgent repainting of lane markings at transition zones to prohibit unsafe passing movements (eg. several locations, most notably at Woods Road); and
- the installation of a dedicated turning lane at the SN Gen 7 Gas Station (49 Beckanon Road, Britt);

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Municipality of McDougall calls on the Province of Ontario to commit to and publicly release an accelerated and fully funded timeline for the completion of four-laning Highway 69 between Parry Sound and Sudbury;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT Council requests that collision and safety data from the West Parry Sound OPP Detachment be reviewed and incorporated into ongoing planning and decision-making.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Municipality of McDougall further requests that Rural Ontario Municipal Association (ROMA) prioritize Highway 69 safety improvements and four-laning completion as a priority advocacy issue in its ongoing discussions with the Province of Ontario; and

BE IT FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED THAT this resolution is to be circulated to Doug Ford, Premier of Ontario; Prabmeet Sarkaria, Minister of Transportation; Local Members of Provincial Parliament and Members of Parliament; The City of Greater Sudbury and neighbouring municipalities; First Nations leadership along the Highway 69 corridor; the West Parry Sound OPP Detachment Board; the District of Parry Sound Municipal Association; and the Rural Ontario Municipal Association.
