SUBJECT: Inspector General Memo #8: Public release of the first Decisions by the Inspector General of Policing with accompanying Findings Reports

I write to inform you of an important development in the work of the Inspectorate of Policing (IoP). On Wednesday, December 17, the IoP will begin publicly releasing my **Inspector General Decisions with accompanying Findings Reports**. These Decisions and Findings Reports flow from the IoP's investigations into public complaints submitted to us under the *Community Safety and Policing Act (CSPA)*. Publishing them is in keeping with our commitment to transparency, accountability and continuous improvement.

Two types of IG Decisions

Under the CSPA, the Inspector General is required to make Decisions and Findings Reports publicly available. These Decisions result from investigations into **Section 106 matters**, which address the conduct of police service board members, and **Section 107 matters**, which examine whether policing services are adequate and effective, comply with the law, and follow policies or procedures set by boards, the Minister, or Chiefs of Police.

Each investigation—whether into board member conduct under section 106 or service delivery under section 107—concludes with a **Findings Report** that sets out the evidence and analysis gathered by the IoP. Based on this report, the Inspector General issues a **Decision** confirming whether or not provincial policing laws and standards have been met. If a board member is found to have committed misconduct, the Inspector General can issue a formal reprimand, suspend the board member and remove the board member from their position. If a police service is found to be in non-compliance with Ontario's policing laws and standards, the Inspector General may issue **Directions** to address the gaps, and if those directions are not followed will **Measures** be imposed to ensure compliance.

Without reference to specific organizations or cases, early Decisions underscore sector-wide compliance requirements and expectations: boards must discharge governance mandates while not directing specific operations, and exercise caution in public communications; services should demonstrate risk-based response and strong dispatch/communication standards; the interpretation of specific requirements for the deployment of specialized equipment; and, professionalism in public engagement is essential.

Importance of an organizational process for Decision review and application

Moving forward, these Decisions and Findings Reports **will be posted regularly** as batches of complaint investigations are completed. As these Decisions are legally binding and will serve as precedent for future matters, **I strongly encourage each police service and board to build in a process to ensure these Decisions are reviewed and, where necessary, integrated into your operations** to avoid future compliance concerns and to improve overall performance. My goal is to support a culture where accountability and excellence go hand in hand.

I want to reiterate what I have consistently emphasized during our engagements with you over the past two years: this next step in the IoP's work is aimed at providing the policing sector with meaningful opportunities to learn from practical examples and to collectively strengthen performance standards. By sharing these Decisions openly, **we aim to provide clarity on how standards are applied, highlight areas of strength, and identify opportunities for improvement in the sector.** This transparency benefits everyone—police services, boards, and the communities we serve—by reinforcing trust and demonstrating that oversight is fair, evidence-based, and focused on strengthening police sector performance across Ontario.

SUBJECT: Inspector General Memo #9: Province-Wide Inspection on Police Integrity
and Anti-Corruption Practices

On February 5, York Regional Police announced the results of Project South, a complex criminal investigation into organized crime and corruption. The investigation identified serious allegations and resulted in the arrest of several current and former members of the Toronto Police Service and has prompted broader concerns about the integrity and public confidence in policing.

It is essential that these concerns are addressed directly, examined independently and handled in a manner that strengthens public trust. This is a responsibility the Inspectorate of Policing takes seriously.

After considering a request from the Toronto Police Service and the Toronto Police Service Board, I will be initiating a province-wide inspection on police integrity and anti-corruption practices. While the scope of the inspection is still to be finalized, it will focus on five defined areas, with the ability to examine additional areas should they arise:

- Supervision and span of control, including how officers are supervised and how effective that supervision is;
- Screening and vetting of police officers both at recruitment and on an ongoing basis;
- Access to police databases and information systems, including permissions, controls and clearances;
- Evidence and property management practices; and
- Substance abuse and fitness for duty.

Given the scope of this inspection and the importance of it being conducted in a timely manner, I will appoint an individual external to government to serve as lead inspector. Upon completion, the inspector will submit a report outlining their independent findings. I will review the report to determine whether there has been any non-compliance with the *Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019*, including a failure to provide adequate and effective policing. If there has been non-

compliance, I will determine whether to issue any legally binding Directions to ensure compliance and improve performance across Ontario's policing system.

As the Inspectorate of Policing's work moves forward, I encourage you to evaluate your policies, procedures and practices as they relate to the five issues identified. To the extent you may identify vulnerabilities and approaches to address them in your own organization, please continue to engage the Inspectorate of Policing through your Police Services Advisor for support and guidance as needed. As always, our Police Services Advisors are there to help you navigate emerging issues, provide guidance, and support your compliance with the *Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019*. Finally, and importantly, as this work unfolds, my team will be careful and thoughtful in both our planning and execution to avoid compromising any ongoing criminal or other proceedings. I will keep the policing sector apprised as planning for this inspection evolves.

I take seriously our shared responsibility to maintain public confidence in the strength and integrity of Ontario's policing system.





Message from the Detachment Commander

I am pleased to present the 2026-2029 WEST PARRY SOUND Detachment Action Plan. This action plan has been prepared and adopted per the *Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019 (CSPA)* and in alignment with the Ontario Provincial Police 2026-2029 Strategic Plan.



The 2026-2029 WEST PARRY SOUND Detachment Action Plan outlines commitments, actions, and desired outcomes for the detachment over the next four years. It addresses how we will provide adequate and effective policing in our area and will meet the needs of the communities we serve. To reflect these priorities, the plan is organized in three sections:

- Crime
- Roadways, Waterways and Trails
- Community Well-Being

The plan also includes qualitative and quantitative performance objectives and indicators so we can appropriately measure the outcomes of our actions.

The 2026-2029 WEST PARRY SOUND Detachment Action Plan was created in consultation with relevant stakeholders.

- We met with our OPP Detachment Board - West Parry Sound OPP Detachment Board and incorporated the objectives and priorities they determined for the detachment.
 - Community Well-Being: Foster stronger relationships and public trust through enhanced police engagement within local communities and educational institutions.
 - Social Issues: Promote greater awareness of societal challenges by educating the public about the experiences of unhoused individuals and the services available to support them. Collaborate with partner organizations to implement coordinated, effective strategies aimed at addressing and mitigating social issues.
 - Crime: Engage with communities and schools to design and implement proactive, evidence-based strategies that disrupt illicit drug activity and reduce instances of property crime.
 - Roadways, Trails, and Waterways: Enhance public safety by educating the community regarding legal responsibilities when traveling on roads, trails, and waterways, while simultaneously increasing police engagement and executing targeted enforcement initiatives.
- We attended meetings with the municipal council(s) in our area to understand their concerns and priorities.
- We engaged with the First Nation Band Council in our area to understand their concerns and priorities.
 - Henvey Band Council and their priority of zero tolerance for trafficking in persons and drug related incidents.
- We also met with school boards, community organizations, businesses, and other members of public to inform this plan.

- To ensure this Action plan aligns with the needs and priorities of our community, a targeted survey was distributed to key stakeholders, including school boards, hospitals, detachment board members, mayors, and municipal councillors. The survey results demonstrated strong engagement and a shared commitment to community safety. Feedback highlighted a desire for a reduction in illicit drug trafficking, increased traffic enforcement, additional police patrols, foot and trail patrols, and a more visible presence at community events. Additionally, concerns related to intimate partner violence, drug-related activity, and property crime were consistently identified as top public safety priorities

The 2026-2029 WEST PARRY SOUND Detachment Action Plan is the first action plan prepared under the CSPA. Detachment Board Annual Reports will continue to be enhanced to reflect the updated reporting requirements.

I am proud of the work we do and the relationships we have built at WEST PARRY SOUND Detachment, and I look forward to our growth and achievements in implementing then 2026-2029 WEST PARRY SOUND Detachment Action Plan.

Our Detachment

The West Parry Sound area has a year-round population of approximately 19,867 residents, which swells to over 100,000 during the summer months due to tourism—our region’s primary industry. Key attractions include Georgian Bay, Provincial Parks, the Bobby Orr Hall of Fame, a scenic fitness trail, and the West Parry Sound District Museum, among others.

Our detachment serves seven municipalities—Seguin, Carling, McDougall, McKellar, Parry Sound, Whitestone, and the Archipelago—as well as a large portion of unincorporated territory, primarily around Still River. We also work closely with four First Nations communities: Wasauksing, Shawanaga, Magnetawan, and Henvey Inlet.

West Parry Sound is renowned for its extensive waterways, including Georgian Bay, the French River, Muskoka, and numerous inland lakes. The area continues to attract a steady flow of new residents as seasonal cottages are converted into permanent homes and waterfront properties undergo ongoing development. This growth, combined with a well-established commercial tourism industry, significantly boosts the population during the summer months. These trends are expected to continue as the four-lane expansion of Highway 69 progresses toward Highway 400.

The West Parry Sound Detachment encompasses some of Ontario’s most popular recreational areas. Its waterways and surrounding landscape support a variety of activities, including fishing, boating, hunting, snowmobiling, ATV riding, and other outdoor pursuits, drawing both locals and tourists throughout the year.


Community Development and Growth

West Parry Sound continues to experience significant residential and commercial development:

- **Senior Population Growth:** The 65+ demographic continues to rise, prompting economic development in the seniors’ sector. Since 2021, three retirement residences have opened, a Personal Support Worker program has launched at the local college, and additional pharmacies have been established in Parry Sound.
- **Residential Projects:** Multiple new condo developments are underway, including the proposed *Nest Egg* on Oastler Drive, and projects on Forest Street, River Street, the waterfront, and Joseph Street (80 units).
- **Commercial and Hospitality:** A new Marriott development is planned near the waterfront.
- **Community Infrastructure:** The town has invested in a new recreation centre with an indoor pool, a new high school, and plans to redevelop the town dock area, including a plaza, parking, walkways, and expansion of the Bobby Orr site.
- **Economic Expansion:** The Town of Parry Sound is experiencing growth with new businesses—both chain and independent—enhancing employment opportunities and access to services, which is expected to attract more residents and visitors.
- **Traffic Safety:** With major highways (400, 559, 124, 518, 141) running through the region, directed patrols remain essential for public education and enforcement to ensure roadway safety.

These developments will likely increase population density, traffic, and community activity, creating both opportunities and considerations for policing and public safety planning.



- TTY 1-888-310-1133 or agent 511 for registered subscribers may be used for individuals in the Deaf, Hard of Hearing and Speech Impaired (DHHSI) community to contact police

#KNOWWHENTOCALL

9-1-1 is for emergencies only: If there is an immediate risk to someone's life or property.

Dialed 9-1-1 accidentally? #Be911Ready. Don't hang up, stay on the line and speak with an OPP Communicator to confirm there's no emergency.

The misuse of 911 ties up emergency lines, communicators and officers, which can result in a slower response to a real emergency and risks the safety of people who may need urgent help.

It is against the law to call 9-1-1 as a joke. Prank 9-1-1 calls can be dangerous and waste valuable emergency resources.
