2014 ANNUAL REPORT

The Brain and Spinal Cord Injury Advisory Council (The "Advisory Council") is charged by the New Hampshire Legislature with investigating the unmet needs of New Hampshire residents with brain or spinal cord injuries. See NHRSA 137-K. The Advisory Council has been holding public hearings for seventeen years, since its establishment by statute in 1997.

In 2014, two public hearings were held: On May 21, 2014, at the Krempels Center in Portsmouth; and on October 8, 2014, at Northern Human Services. Testimony at the hearings indicated that significant unmet needs persist in the State, including the following.

Transportation. There is a lack of public transportation for a population that is frequently unable to drive. Survivors describe numerous impacts including difficulties getting to medical appointments, difficulty accomplishing basic life responsibilities, and isolation from activities in the community.

Employment. Survivors describe loss of employment and lack of supports needed to return to work, misunderstanding about their abilities and deficits, and difficulty finding employers receptive to their disabilities.

Community Programs. Post rehabilitation programs, such as the program at the Krempels Center, are not available to survivors who do not live in the Portsmouth area. There is unanimity among survivors regarding the benefits of the Krempels Center. Some survivors travel from as far away as Keene to participate. Transportation issues are significant. There should be more programs like that.

Discharge Planning and Support. Survivors face significant obstacles when they are discharged from acute care. They are frequently unable to negotiate through a system which is not intuitive, even when services are available.

Lack of General Public Education and Awareness. Survivors reports that there can be misunderstanding by primary care health professionals and by employers, particularly when the survivor appears normal.

Medical Records Sharing. Survivors describe difficulties obtaining proper treatment because medical records are not shared by providers.

Managed Care Issues. The managed care companies may not approve medications, notwithstanding efforts of doctors and pharmacies. Medications need to be provided on a timely basis.

Due to the chronic nature of unmet needs presented at hearings over the years, and the need for funding to address such needs, the Advisory Council has determined that a taks force should be formed pursuant to RSA 137-K made up of stakeholders to review the viability of a trust fund to address these chronic unmet needs on a grass roots level.
