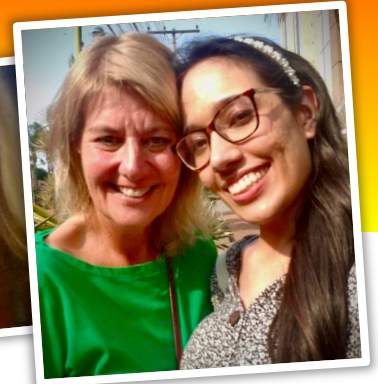

About Ribeiro Preto

“Ribeiro Preto” or “black creek,” is named after a waterway in the area. The city is about 712,000 people strong – just smaller than Seattle proper. During Brazil's emancipation in 1888, they gave each former slave their own homestead. As a result, the coffee trade thrived, and sugar is now the main agricultural export. Farming and ranching, agriculture-related products, medical technologies and building supplies all pour out of this region. They host one of Brazil's most important agricultural trade shows, Agrishow, in April of each year!
