With the theme "Frontiers Past and Present," the 13th annual Cornyval sponsored by the Helotes Spring Festival Assn. moves on stage here for five fantastic fun-packed days from Wednesday, May 3, through Sunday, May 7. A parade Saturday, six dances, a coronation, contests, and prizes are on the program.

The setting is all of downtown Helotes—with a Western backdrop that requires no stage props to give the event the true Frontier flavor.

The annual celebration features the Corn theme. As all but the newest residents know, Helotes is an ancient Indian word for "green corn" — or what is called corn-on-the-cob. When the Spaniards arrived in Texas they continued to use the word which joined the Spanish language. Helotes was Helotes when San Antonio was called Yanaguana, so the past frontiers go way back.

But President Cled Heathington and Executive Vice-President Don Belto of the Festival Assn. promise that Corn will have plenty of interesting sidelights to make this the biggest and best Cornyval, since 1966 when the present series of corn festivals began here.

With the selection of Miss Helotes '78 on Wednesday night, May 3, at Floore Country Store, the Festival will be declared officially open. The gala begins at 7:30 p.m. and goes to 12:30 p.m.

A major carnival will be on the midway all through the Festival featuring Wide State Shows, operated by Cleo Graves. This has been a successful attraction in the past few years here and is to be expanded for both tots and teen fans.

On Thursday, May 4, the merchants of Helotes—in the downtown area and on the Helotes Park Plaza and along Bandera Road—invite tourists, homefolks and visitors to browse and shop and dine out. That evening beginning at 7 p.m., there will be free entertainment on the patio of Floore Country Store. A square dance contest will be conducted with the Bexar County Squares of the Alamo Square Dance Assn. performing. Cecil Harper has been announced as the caller. This is one of the most authentic-type Western shows and everyone is invited to see this great show.

Friday will be a busy day for those setting up the 67 booths for the street events. Beginning at 5 p.m., May 5, the Old Bandera Road — where once cowboys

Ranch Town Getting Lake, 300 New Homes

San Antonio Ranch Town's new marketing director, Jerry Foreman, said last week that development of the new community on Bandera Highway just west of Helotes is entering a busy second phase.

"It's really looking up," he said. "We got a bad image in a lot of places last year (when the Ranch Town was first opened to the public), and we want to change that."

Hidden Value Homes headed by Ronnie Jarozewski will begin construction within 90 days of 44 new homes in the area to the left of the main entrance road and about a block in from Bandera Highway.

A second builder, whose name could not be announced yet, is projecting 20 homes to start within 90 days also, and 100 additional to start before the end of the year. These will be built to the right of the main entrance road.

Ranch Town itself plans 175 homes to start by March, 1979, in the area about midway between the entrance and Villarreal's. The offices of Ranch Town, located in the First National Bank Building on IH-10 in San Antonio, will be moved to the new community by the middle of May, he said. The company has bought one of the 20 homes already completed

on Cat Mountain and will occupy it until a new office building can be built.

Meantime, construction is underway now on the dam that will back up the community's 20-acre recreation lake in 50-acre Wildlake Park. The lake site is to the left of the main entrance road also.

All platting for the second-phase development has been approved by San Antonio's Planning and Zoning Commission, Foreman said. Ranch Town will not build sidewalks, as the commission had been reported as requesting. The main concern of the commission, he said, was not with

the lack of sidewalks but with the size of the street cul-de-sacs in relation to the turning radius of fire-fighting equipment. But the commission also has been satisfied on that, he said.

San Antonio Ranch Town is being built on the 8,500-acre former Lytle Ranch. It is expected to have a population of more than 60,000 persons when completed. It extends from Bandera Highway on the north to Culebra Road on the south.

At present no commercial development — such as shopping center or apartment complexes — is being projected. The shopping centers will not come until Ranch Town has

enough people to support them, Foreman said, and multi-family units are being deferred now in favor of single-family dwellings.

Foreman, a native of Amarillo, joined the Ranch Town organization in March. He is a graduate of Texas Tech, but has spent much of his adult life in Arabia and Florida. He has been a frequent visitor to South Texas and knows it quite well, he said.

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Helotes School In New Building

The new Helotes School building is complete, and Principal Fred Pizzini expected to move into it Thursday. A formal open house will be held before the end of the current school year.

Also complete is the new gym, except that the floor has to be sanded and basketball backstops put up after furniture stored there has been moved to the new classroom building.

The new one-story, air-conditioned classroom building will house the third, fourth and fifth grades plus the kindergarten. They have been housed in portable classroom buildings moved onto the campus last year when construction began on the new building.

The portable buildings will be moved at once to Coke Stevenson School, Pizzini said.

The existing classroom building on the Helotes campus will be used for the first grade, now meeting in the cafeteria

building, and possibly the second grade.

In addition to classroom space, the new building includes a large new office, a clinic, a teacher conference room, a teacher resource room, and a reading room with a speech therapist in attendance. The new building also includes a large new library with a small stage at one end.

The interior of the new \$700,000 building is largely given over to open, unwallied teaching areas divided by low chests and movable screens. Each of the areas is carpeted, as well as is the library.

The kindergarten will be housed in two more conventional new rooms separated by a flexible wood screen, but each with its own sink and worktable and rest room. The kindergarten also has its own separate fenced-in playground.

The interior walls of the new building are a neutral beige but new furniture will provide color. The library furniture will be in yellow gold, the third grade in green, the fourth grade in bright blue, the fifth grade in burnt orange, the kindergarten in gold, and the other area, not yet assigned, in red.

The Helotes School now has a capacity of 750 students, Pizzini said. A large increase in students is expected next year from the Braun Station area.

In addition to the new building and gym, Helotes School also has a new phone number — 695-8714 and 695-8715.

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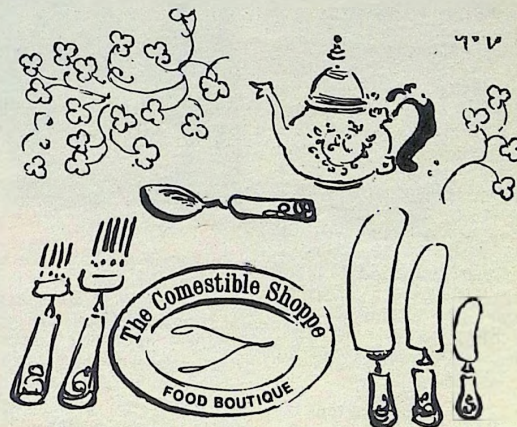

AN EDITORIAL

What Is Helotes?

Helotes is the future. Into the valleys and across these hills, new streets and new roads, new homes and new businesses will swell the population and bring many new sights and scenes to the area. People from everywhere are drawn irresistibly, once they've experienced it, to the Helotes ambience of space and clear air, green areas and mildly-blending seasons, tree-lined creeks and lofty views, and the independence of spirit that characterizes life in this environment.

Beautiful will be the new homes and shopping centers and the curving, soaring drives linking them, such as the new section of the highway to San Geronimo.

Ranch Town alone will draw more than 60,000 people. From the San Antonio side comes a procession of subdivisions — Wildwood, Wildwood II (soon to open), French Creek Village, Woods End, Braun Station, Verde Hills, Helotes Ranch Acres Units 4 and 5, and more being platted. Add to these the established areas — Downtown Helotes, Helotes Park Estates, Helotes Ranch Acres Units 1, 2, and 3, Evans Valley, Grey Forest, Beverly Hills, Stage Coach Hills, University Hills. Add the development around the University of Texas at San Antonio, where the first large apartment complexes in the area have appeared. Helotes is the future, and the future is almost upon us.

Helotes is the past. Whence came these hills and these valleys, these scenes and these settings for a new open way of life for so many? Many millions of years ago a great crack developed in the face of the Earth. Today it is called the Balcones Fault, and extends from near Del Rio through Uvalde, Helotes, New Braunfels, San Marcos, Austin and on toward Dallas. You cross it every time you drive the highway from Helotes to Leon Valley. On the Helotes side the land was uplifted when the Earth's rocks slipped along the face of the great crack. The streams were accelerated, the land was eroded, valleys were cut in the uplifted limestone strata (laid down by nature in a still more distant era when the Helotes area was covered by a sea). Then the Earth was still, for millions of years, until the near-past. Then came the Indians, traveling, searching, living off the land — a good life in many ways. Then came the ranchers, holding the primitive land in large tracts, preserving it, building sturdy homes of thick limestone blocks and tin roofs. Then to the valley areas came the farmers. Then came us.

Helotes is the present, a split-second between past and future, not to be held (as if anybody would want to hold onto it). But in that fleeting image you see the unfolding of a community (as opposed to "suburb"), the burgeoning, the taking root, the extending out, the accepting of more and more neighbors, the enjoying in Helotes of more and more necessities and perquisites, the growing. Downtown Helotes, Helotes Park Plaza, Helotes School, the churches, and the people they serve — these are the present. It too is a good life. Enjoy. Oops — they WERE the present: us.

VFW Plans Loyalty Day

Helotes Post 7108 of the Veterans of Foreign Wars will join with VFW posts throughout America to observe Loyalty Day on May 1.

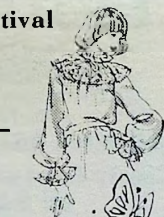

Two Historic Hill Country Springs Marked

Cast aluminum informational markers similar to state historical markers were installed by the Edwards Underground Water District this week at the San Marcos Springs and the Comal Springs in New

Braunfels.

The markers give a brief geological and historical account of the famous springs and feature an etched map of the Edwards area including the recharge zone and the underground reservoir extending from Brackettville on the west to Kyle on the northeast.

Discovered in 1764 by French explorer St. Denis, the Comal Springs are the largest in Texas and the Southwest. Maximum discharge in 50 years of recorded readings was 550 cubic feet per second—355,608,000 gallons per day. Average flow has been 285 cfs. However, during the drouth of the 1950s, Comal Springs ceased to flow for a brief period.

In 1743 Spanish explorers discovered the San Marcos Springs and estimated there were 200 bubbling from the ground. Highest recorded reading since 1928 was 310 cfs and the lowest 46. Average flow is 166 cfs.

The springs are a natural discharge of the Edwards (Balcones fault zone) aquifer. Water enters this limestone formation through a 1,505-square-mile recharge zone (some 175 miles long) where the formation meets ground surface in Kinney, Uvalde, Medina, Bexar, Comal, and Hays Counties. Water — some of which is just now entering the reservoir from rains of 40 to 50 years ago — moves from west to

east and serves more than one million persons in ranching, irrigation, municipal, and recreational uses.

Seventy per cent of the water

entering the reservoir originates west of Bexar County. About 10 per cent enters the ground in northern Bexar County and 20 per cent east of Bexar.

Counting Ants Is Lab Project

UTSA students have been a little antsy lately.

They have been estimating the number of ants — 94,319 of them — in 132 ant hills on the west side of the UTSA campus.

They estimated the harvester ant populations as a project in environmental biology labs.

Students dabbed model airplane paint on the abdomens of 100 ants in each of the ant hills. They then released the ants.

The next day, after the painted ants had time to become mixed in with the other ants, students counted 100 ants and determined the ratio of painted to unpainted ones.

The painting method is similar to the banding and ear tagging used to estimate populations for other types of animals.

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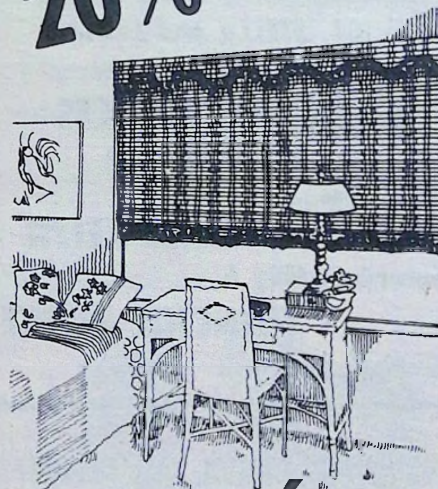
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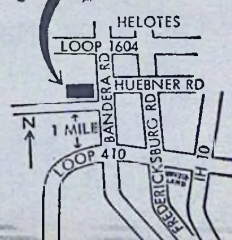

and Indians and countless early-day settlers camped—will come alive with food booths and beer gardens and entertainment. There will be two big free street dances along the route, at 7:30 p.m. Playing for these will be Whiskey Basin and Texas Music, both Country & Western-type bands. And inside, or rather outside on the patio at Floore Country Store, Dale Keith & His Starlite Ramblers — great favorites of the past Cornyal crowds — will be playing a third free dance, compliments of the famed night spot.

There will be plenty of food booths and fun events to please the 100,000 visitors expected during the Cornyal. Some will be coming by horseback, riding with the Alamo Kountry Kickers Trail Ride.

Saturday, May 6 has so many events that no one person is expected to see it all. But for those who would like to try, there will be the big 3-Mile Parade—featuring this year's Frontier theme. There will be horses, floats, marchers, bands, antique cars, performers, and plenty of roadside parking. The parade will be lining up at 10 a.m. at Loop 1604 and Bandera Road. After being judged, it will move out at 11 a.m. toward downtown Helotes and turn towards dispersal at Scenic Loop Road. There will be more than 100 units, and visiting

floats will come from all of South Texas.

Some 300 artists will be here. A major attraction will be the Helotes Art Guild's show on the Gallery grounds, Bandera Hwy. plenty of food, everyone is expected to be here Saturday. Voting will be taking some time out. There is no better way to await the returns than to join Saturday's big day in Helotes. The midway will be wide open, too, for the carnival spirit.

Right after Church on Sunday, the festivities begin again. Target time is 1 p.m. 'til after the sun goes down and the Texas band finishes on the Floore Country Store patio. A big Sunday event will be the Old Fiddler's Contest slated to begin inside the Country Store at about 1:30 p.m. If he can arrange his schedule, the World's Champion Fiddler will be on hand. There is no charge for this event.

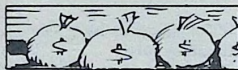

Showings chiefly are by invitation, but other artists may inquire about space at the Art Haus, 103 N. Main, Boerne, phone 1-249-3700.



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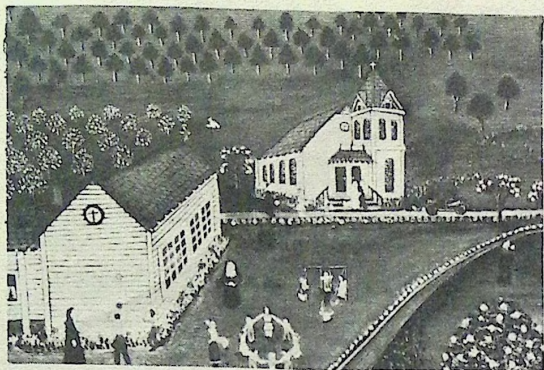

Art Show Features Fannie Lou Spelce

SAN ANTONIO, TX. — When one of her paintings was called a primitive, 70-year old Fannie Lou Spelce was angered, insisting she wasn't that old.

Today, her unaffected style and painted remembrances of her childhood have provided her with the reputation as America's newest important folk artist.

Her intricately painted recollections will fill the Lower Floor Gallery at The Institute of Texan Cultures through April and May until June 15.

An Austin resident, Mrs. Spelce began painting after a career as a nurse. She took art lessons at Laguna Gloria Art

Museum in Austin. Instructor Owen Cappelman encouraged her to drop the lessons and work alone.

Mrs. Spelce muses, "Why do I paint what I paint?... To me it is delightful memories that I am eager to share with others."

To date, Mrs. Spelce has finished nearly 200 pieces. The details found in Mrs. Spelce's work are evident in 60 pictures that hang in The Institute of Texan Cultures, a center for the interpretation of Texas history and folk cultures, which is open Tuesdays through Sundays from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. Admission is free.

Noted Scientist

Edwards Wells Top Standards



The scientist who supervised the development of synthetic rubber for the United States government will speak at UTSA April 21.

Renowned polymer scientist Dr. Carl Marvel will speak on "My Sixty-Seven Years of Chemistry" at 3 p.m. in Room 2.02.10 of the UTSA Science-Education Building. The lecture is open to the public without charge. Professor of chemistry at the University of Arizona since 1961, Dr. Marvel is a pioneer in the chemistry of polymers, the giant molecules used to make such materials as nylon, orlon and lucite.

The purity of water from the Edwards aquifer could wind up saving millions of dollars in water bills for consumers in the five-county Edwards Underground Water District area, the EUWD staff believes.

Because the aquifer in Uvalde, Medina, Bexar, Comal and Hays Counties tests out free of bacterial contamination and is well below minimum Federal standards for chemical pollution, the EUWD feels water purveyors in the EUWD will be exempt from a drinking water regulation proposed by the Environmental Protection Agency.

The regulation would require expensive new activated carbon filtration plants for certain municipal water systems. It appears to affect primarily those cities using surface water requiring large amounts of chlorine, Col. McDonald D. Weinert, general manager, said, adding it is aimed at control of organic chemical contaminants.

Purity of the aquifer is monitored continuously by the EUWD in cooperation with the U.S. Geological Survey.
