Committee assignments essential for planning the 1971 Festival and Cornyval will be completed along with electing additional members to the Board of Directors. The October meeting was postponed by the executive committee to avoid conflict with two

other events of civic interest in the community, an officer said.

Charter memberships, available throughout 1970, are two dollars per person, and citizens of this area as well as those interested in the annual event's success are invited to join. A fund-raising dance will be scheduled sometime this fall to help defray expenses. Invitations for the Festival to join in other celebrations have come in this month from Yorktown's Western Days and from Laredo, and the organization hopes to set up a means of participating in the future.

Citizens Here Move To Keep Helotes on Map

Machinery for incorporating Helotes as a municipality was set in motion at a meeting held Monday, Oct. 19, at the Forest Hills Presbyterian Church under the sponsorship of the new Helotes Park Civic Association.

The overflow crowd included citizens from Helotes

Ranch Acres, Evans Valley Acres, San Geronimo, the Hausman Road, Leslie Road, Galm Road, and Loop 1604 areas, and downtown Helotes as well as Helotes Park Estates. They almost unanimously called for incorporation. Grey Forest citizens were observers.

Robert E. Linder III, president of the new civic association, presided. Speakers included Victor Engle, chairman of the Hills and Dales Annexation Committee.

At a previous meeting on Oct. 15, Earle Cobb, Jr., the lawyer representing Hills and Dales in their fight against annexation by San Antonio, was speaker. He pointed out that if Helotes will petition to incorporate before San Antonio annexes the University of Texas site area, Helotes will have established its own jurisdiction rights and subsequent actions of the City of San Antonio will not affect the ability of the citizens of Helotes to incorporate.

An election to incorporate will have to be held before incorporation can actually be accomplished. The action authorized on Oct. 19 was only to petition for incorporation.

Dwayne L. Hasse, chairman of the Helotes Park incorporation committee, said the plat of the proposed area to be included was due from the surveyor last Tuesday. The area extends from Rudy's and Irene's Restaurant on the west to Loop 1604 on the east and includes Helotes Ranch Acres, downtown Helotes, Helotes Park Estates, Evans Valley Acres on Hausman Road, and a part of the Leslie Road area.

In less than a week after the meeting at the Helotes Presbyterian church, the City of San Antonio announced that it will begin on Nov. 19 to annex the new university site and the area around it for one mile north of Loop 1604. Annexation of this area is due to be completed by Jan. 1. San Antonio will have territorial jurisdiction for five miles beyond its new boundaries, according to a state law. This five miles would include part of the new town planned on the Lytle Ranch.

Another announcement came from the Fourth Court of Civil Appeals, which was hearing the suit of Hills and Dales contesting the legality of San Antonio's "spoke" annexation out IH 10 and Loop 1604 which had already placed Hills and Dales under the city's territorial jurisdiction. Judge Jim Barlow announced a decision upholding the legality of the spoke annexation. Hills and Dales planned to appeal the suit again.

Chairman Hasse said the Helotes committee plans to push ahead vigorously with its plans to petition for incorporation, in spite of these announcements.

Honorary Trail Boss Johnny Bush will lead the Alamo Kountry Kickers through here this week-end on their annual trail ride from San Antonio to Bandera, Sat., Oct. 31 and Nov. 1, Pat Halpin, president has announced. Late registrations may be made Friday, Oct. 30 at the Bandera Drive-In from 5:30 p.m. to 10 p.m. There will also be an opportunity to register during the drive along the way. Everyone riding must be registered and pay a six dollar fee, he said.

From Bandera Drive In at 8 a.m., the group will head toward Toepferwein's Place where they will enjoy a 30-minute stop. Lunch stop will be in Helotes from 11 a.m. to noon. After a stop at the Floore Country Store and elsewhere here, they will go on toward Bandera. A 30-minute stop Saturday afternoon will be Villarreal's Ice House and then on to San Geronimo for the night.

Saturday there will be a free Barbecue and dance at Pete's Place with The Branded Men playing.

After hitting the trail Sunday morning there will be a special stop of 20 minutes and then on to Pipe Creek for lunch. A final stop in the afternoon will be at the Roadside Park before the group heads into Bandera. Many of the riders have been through here with the Bandera Regulars and other rides and they invite their friends to join them. Come by to talk at the stops.

Lytle Ranch Site To Become Town?

A feasibility study and a land use plan for building a new town on the former Lytle Ranch near Helotes have been completed, according to a recent announcement by a representative of the Alamo Area Council of Governments. The new town would have a population of from 60,000

to 75,000 persons. Developers are Hayden Head of Corpus Christi and Lawrence Wood of Refugio, who purchased 8,400 acres of the ranch from W. J. Lytle, Jr., last year.

Shortly after the purchase, they offered 1,000 acres to the regents of The University of Texas System as a site for the new University of Texas at San Antonio. The site was turned down by the regents as being too far from San Antonio, although they said it was their second choice.

The developers of the Lytle Ranch—known also as the San Antonio Ranch—announced at the time of the regents' decision that they planned to develop a series of communities there anyway.

The feasibility study and land use plan were developed by William L. Pereira and Associates of Los Angeles, Calif., one of the most outstanding land development firms in the world. Assisting is an Arlington, Texas firm, Christian, Miller and Honts, Inc. (Continued on Page 2)

The developers plan to file an application for a loan from the Department of Housing and Urban Development under the federal New Town Act of 1968. The act requires that the project must provide for balanced housing of all types, mixed income levels for inhabitants, economic feasibility, a practical plan for financing land acquisition, planned orderly growth of the area, and a concept

consistent with areawide planning regulations or principles. Loans may be insured for up to \$50,000,000.

Town or Country, That is Question

The review committee of the Alamo Area Council of Governments first would have to approve the application.

Some objection has been expressed in San Antonio newspapers to the project because the site is on top of the Edwards Underground aquifer, source of San Antonio's drinking water.

Some objectors would like to make all the Helotes area a great big wilderness preserve, but the government doesn't have any laws for that at present.

The entrance to the Lytle Ranch is located about two miles northwest of Helotes on the left side of the "Riebe" curve. The ranch extends to Culebra Road on the West and to Bandera Road again near San Geronimo. Mr. Lytle retained about 500 acres of the ranch near San Geronimo.

Cox To Succeed Postmaster Quill

San Antonio Postmaster Dan J. Quill, who will retire Saturday, is to be succeeded by Thomas E. Cox, assistant director of operations in the San Antonio facility. Cox entered postal service in 1936 as a substitute clerk and worked his way up through the ranks. His appointment was made by the Dallas Regional Post Office. Quill has served as Postmaster of San Antonio for 36 years.

In addition to his successful postal career, he was for many years a champion in the fight against polio as represented chiefly in the "March of Dimes" campaign to provide funds for research, and care of victims. All citizens of Bexar County and South Texas owe him a debt of thanks, for this as well as his service with the post office.

Beer Theft Solved Here

Deputy Sheriff Jack Young and other Bexar County officers unearthed evidence leading to the solving of a break-in Friday, Oct. 16 at Floore's Country Store. Picked up were two youths of this area, one 18 years old and the other a juvenile, about 16.

According to one account, the boys evidently used a crowbar to remove a heavy chain and lock which had been placed on a storage chest several months ago after the owner, John T. Floore, and his staff had noted some disappearance of beer cases—which Mr. Floore estimates amounted to about a thousand dollars worth over a period of time.

On Friday night, however, some 20 cases had been removed from the chest. Mr. Floore noting one partially filled case on his sidewalk, went inside planning to return to pick it up. However, the case disappeared before he could retrieve it. Mr. Floore estimates that the damage to the door amounted to about \$150.

The merchandise was apparently sold as only 13 of the 20 original cases were recovered.

Charges were filed against the boys and the juvenile was turned over to his parents.

Rains Help Fight Fires

September rains—totalling one-and-a-half inches by Sept. 20 to make 22 inches for 1970 to that date—were a welcome sight here. They halted the reign of terror of Drouth which had paralleled a situation in California's hills which caused millions of dollars of damage there.

Less than 1.2 inches fell in July and August here, and fires—brush and even some suspected deliberate ones—plagued the area fire departments.

Most dramatic was the three-day fight put up by the combined volunteer fire departments of Helotes, Grey Forest, Balcones Heights and Leon Valley. They used the efforts of an average of five units and a total of more than 100 men to keep 200 acres of burned out land from becoming more widespread. The fire took place on the Wagner Ranch and backfiring was finally used to stop it.

Mr. John Wagner, owner, bought food for some 60 men who couldn't take time to go home to eat. Rudy L. Zepeda, fire chief, commended the men of the community for their help, as well as the many teen-agers who joined in the fire-fighting.

A guard was posted during much of the time to see if the causes of repeated outbreaks could be discovered.

Mr. Wagner has donated a brush fire fighting truck which has the reported value of \$3200. The Department had been planning to buy similar equipment when funds could be raised.

Several other fires broke out in the area, pointing up the need for continuous support of the local fire department, Martin Terry, assistant fire chief, said.



Medical Center Grows

**UT Dental School,
 VA Hospital Next**

Two major expansions in the nearby South Texas Medical Center were announced late in October.
 First, construction of the 760-bed Veterans Administration Hos-

pital was announced as going to begin about Dec. 1. It will cost \$31,993,000 and will open about the end of 1973. It will be built adjacent to the Bexar County Hospital and the University of Texas Medical School on 33.3 acres.

Second, regents for the University of Texas System approved plans for a \$24,100,000 Dental School in the same medical center. It will be connected with the University of Texas Medical School in order to integrate facilities for teaching in the basic sciences and use of experimental animal programs.

The Medical Center is located about two miles south of the new University of Texas at San Antonio site on Loop 1604 and Babcock Road.

This Time To Vote Also Offers Choice

An off-year election (so-called because it's an election year in which there's no race for President) of more than unusual interest will come to a climax on Tuesday, Nov. 3, when the voters do their choosing at the polls.

Helotes voters—Republicans, Democrats, or other—will vote at the Helotes Volunteer Fire Department fire house, Bandera at Galm Road, Tuesday from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Leon Valley voters will pull the levers in the Leon Valley School cafeteria, and Leon Springs School.

What makes this election different is that several strong Republican candidates threaten some Democratic hopefuls this year. In times past, there was little suspense in Texas elections after the Democratic primaries in the Spring.

In spite of all the Republican publicity this year, voters will find on the long ballot a large number of uncontested races, that is, for positions for which there is a Democratic candidate only.

The chief contested races in which citizens in Northwest Bexar County may vote are:

For Governor of Texas, in which the incumbent Democrat, Preston Smith, again is opposed by Paul Eggers, a rather strong Republican opponent against Smith two years ago. But Smith has even greater strength now than he had in that race.

For United States Senator, in which Democrat Lloyd Bentsen, Houston insurance executive and Lower Rio Grande Valley

land developer, who knocked off incumbent Ralph Yarborough in the primary, is opposed by George Bush, also of Houston, presently a member of the U.S. House of Representatives. On this one you can toss a coin.

For United States Representative, in which long-time incumbent O. C. Fisher of San Angelo is opposed by Richard Gill of San Antonio in the young Republican's first political race. Only a really upsetting Republican sweep could put Gill ahead.

For County Commissioner, Precinct 2, in which Tom Stolhandske, Democrat, and Lauren Barneby, Republican, both seek to succeed veteran Ollie Wurzbach, who chose not to run this time. Stolhandske is considered an easy shoe-in.

For Justice of the Peace, Precinct 2, in which the candidates are Oliver Chamberlin, Republican and Fred Clark, Democrat.

Seven proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution on which the voters are supposed to say yes or no will lengthen the ballot even more.

Only two, No. 2 and No. 3, have produced much controversy. No. 2 is the liquor-by-the-drink amendment. No. 3 is opposed by most ranchers and farmers. It would authorize the Legislature to establish a method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands "based upon the capability of the lands to support the raising of livestock or to produce farm and forest crops." Opponents say it would favor land speculators and "Sunday" farmers.

Postmaster Lists Holiday Mailings

Helotes Postmaster Charles Davis has announced that when the Post Office Department says mail early for Christmas this year it means early.

Christmas packages to friends and relatives in the United States should be mailed between Dec. 1 and Dec. 10, and greeting cards between Dec. 11 and Dec. 15.

To Alaska and Hawaii they should be mailed between Nov. 30 and Dec. 4 (unless the sender is using air mail; then he has until Dec. 14).

These dates don't apply to military mail going overseas. Deadlines for surface parcels going overseas is Nov. 6 and for airlift service is Nov. 27.

Surface parcels to friends and relatives in Mexico should be mailed by Dec. 4, greeting cards by Dec. 9, and air parcels by Dec. 16.

To facilitate Christmas mailings, Postmaster Davis announced that the Helotes Post Office will be open on three Saturdays in December from 8 a.m. to noon. The dates are Dec. 5, 12 and 19.
