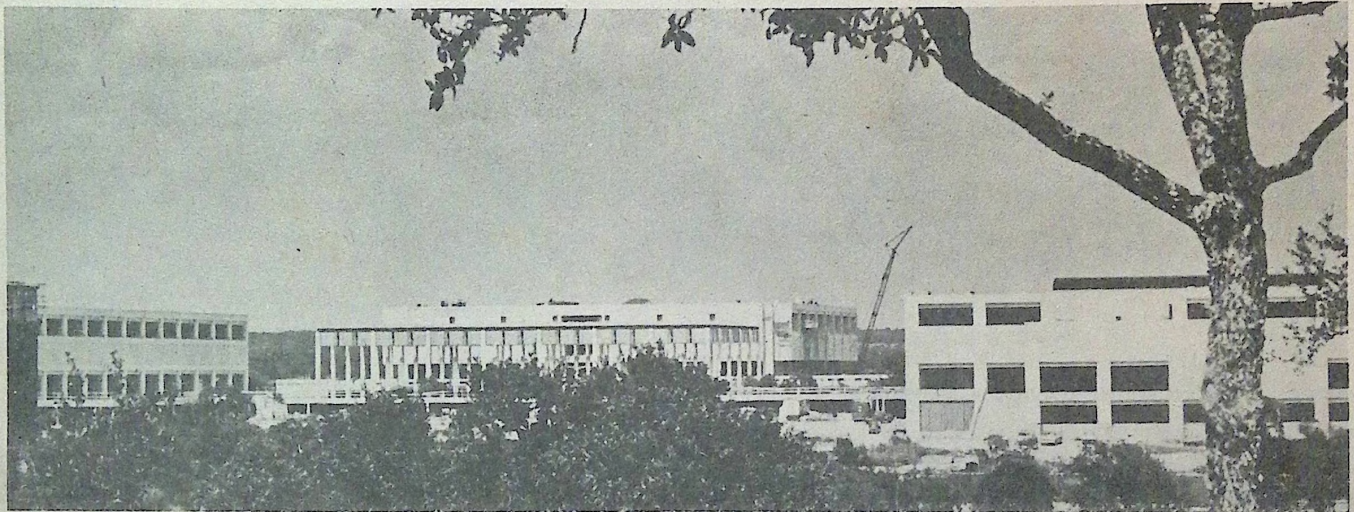

UTSA Draws 4,300 To Campus

The campus is typical ranch terrain and the 600 acres were once part of an historic family ranch of this area.

Doors Open To Juniors And Seniors

As of Thursday, September 4, the student body of the new University of Texas at San Antonio—including graduates, juniors, and seniors was estimated to have climbed to 4300, somewhat short of the projected, 5,000 but with an excellent chance to reach this count, a spokesman said, considering that there are still a few days of late registration.

Everything was going well considering the all-new character of a ranch-type campus with many of the faculty also getting their first look around.

Nothing that has happened here in recent years is likely to have more lasting impact on Helotes and all of Bexar County including Leon Valley and San Antonio than the arrival of a complete new first-class pioneering State university. The excitement was felt everywhere in the area.

UTSA ADDS 90 TEACHERS

Ninety new faculty members have joined The University of Texas at San Antonio this fall, raising the total to 177 to meet the needs of 5,000 graduate students, juniors and seniors expected to

Grey Forest Mayor To Stay

Mayor Ed Faust—who last month startled his constituency by calling for an informal vote of confidence with a promise to resign if he no longer represented the majority—apparently has the solid backing of voters in the City of Grey Forest, according to response he received by letter, phone calls and personal contact.

The response was from both inside and outside the city limits of Grey Forest, he said, with well over a hundred voters personally pledging continued confidence in this City Council. Total population is estimated at about 400, including children, and voting at the polls has never exceeded 150.

Faust was personally given a mandate to continue as Mayor, now in his first term which runs

until April, 1976, according to his interpretation of the response. He said that he was tickled to death to note how many people came forward, and overjoyed at the amount of knowledge people had of the problems, even though they do not say much usually.

Mayor Faust, who also has served as a Councilman for Grey Forest, has had military and civil service experience as well as being actively engaged in business at present in Helotes. He has taken local leadership in energy problems—especially in connection with the Grey Forest Utilities, which distributes natural gas in this area and in Boerne—and in small town problems, working with AACOG mayors on an area basis.

The informal referendum resulted, he said recently, when he was told by a citizen of Grey Forest that most of the citizens had opposed his efforts. He said the telephone and personal conversations did not apparently bear this out.

Asked for his plans, Mayor Faust said that he will continue to work with his Council to deal with the problems of Grey Forest, and will not resign as Mayor.

August Proves Dry Month

August goes on record here as being very dry with only 1.24 inches recorded for the month by Henry Brauchle at his Poor Boy Ranch where he has records dating back into the past century. However, since July was well above average with 3.9 inches, the year's total is not showing a deficit for average annual rainfall so far.

The blustery weather opening September augers well to break any drouth that might be forming. We do need the rains now, Mr. Brauchle said.

Total on September 1—for the first eight months through August—stand now at 23.34 inches.

UTSA Holds First Classes On Campus

Six years after it was established by the Texas Legislature, The University of Texas at San Antonio held the first classes on its new campus last Tuesday, Sept. 2.

This is the first year that undergraduates—juniors and seniors only—have enrolled at the area's youngest university. Graduate students have attended UTSA since June, 1973, in temporary facilities.

UTSA will admit freshmen and sophomores in September, 1976, making it Bexar County's only public supported graduate and undergraduate institution of higher education.

Students attending a new university will have an impact on the development of its academic programs and on student life. They will leave their mark, said UTSA President Dr. Peter T. Flawn.

More than 600 classes will be offered during the Fall semester at UTSA. To meet the demands of the increased class load, the faculty has been increased from 85 to 177. That number will jump again in September, 1976, to 400.

In the hiring of faculty, the quality and breadth of their contribution to the university and their dedication to teaching are the most important factors. "We don't hire faculty who don't like teaching," Dr. Flawn said.

He added, "However, we believe a faculty member should be active in his field through scholarship and research."

All classes will be held in the huge Humanities-Business Building, which contains 181,000 square feet. It includes nine lecture halls, 51 classrooms and 96 offices.

Phase one of construction is 95 percent completed and will be finished in 1976. Included in phase one are three large classroom buildings, the John Peace Library, a physical education building, a convocation center and several smaller buildings.

Phase two of construction, a \$13.5 million project, was recently authorized by the Texas Legislature. A general classroom and office building and an addition to the fine arts building are included in this phase.

The UTSA campus is bounded by Babcock Road on the west, Loop 1604 on the north, Regency Blvd. on the east and UTSA Blvd. on the south. Native plants and trees give it a park-like setting.

Regular city bus service to the new campus will begin Tuesday, Sept. 2, from San Antonio via Balcones Heights. Bus fare is 60 cents each way.

School Trustees Adopt Policy

In compliance with directives of Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, Northside Independent School District Trustees August 25 adopted a policy assuring equal opportunities for all students.

Text of the new, specifically-worded policy is as follows: "NIDSD shall not discriminate on the basis of sex in the educational programs or activities which it operates, including the matters of employment therein.

"It shall be the duty of the Superintendent to coordinate NISD efforts to comply with and carry out its responsibilities under Title IX of the Education Amendments of '72. The Superintendent shall provide, through established grievance procedure, prompt and equitable resolution of complaints . . ."

High School To Cost \$6.2 Million

Hesson and May and Associates, architects, have presented plans for Northside's newest high school—to be the fourth one located on De Zavala Road a short distance from IH 10 for approval which was granted at a recent School Board meeting. Final plans will be assessed at the October meeting of the Board, and bids will be advertised soon after with completion projected in time for the 1977 Fall term.

According to plans shown earlier, the school will be oriented to the rolling terrain with five square buildings featuring split level of three stories.

It is to cost some \$6,200,000 and was planned in the 1973 bond issue passed by Northside voters amounting to \$31,000,000. At that time the campus for The University of Texas at San Antonio had been chosen and the projection of future high school age students indicated that a school for some 3,000 students would be needed soon. The school will doubtless be named for a United States Supreme Court justice, as have been John Marshall High, Oliver Wendell Holmes High, and John Jay High, the three secondary schools in the Northside District.

Proposed location of the bank is on Bandera Road south of Murchs Sports Headquarters, with additional drive-in banking facilities across Bandera Road.

The bank will be capitalized for \$1 million and will be an independent not affiliated with any other banking organization. One hundred thousand shares in the bank were sold at \$10 each.

Guild Leader Combines Medicine And Art



MALCOLM C. LANCASTER, Cardiologist in the USAF and art instructor at the Helotes Art Guild-Gallery was given a tribute by his art students to honor his recent birthday. The tribute was presented to Dr. Lancaster by one of his art students, Mrs. Orville Gensler, a registered nurse and first vice president of the Guild.

The Helotes Art Guild-Gallery and others in the medical profession could be turned into a medical center if the numerous members who are doctors and nurses should exchange their paint brushes for stethoscopes full time.

One such medical member is Col. (Dr.) Malcolm C. Lancaster, USAF, art instructor at the Helotes Art Guild, who was paid a tribute by his art students recently to honor his birthday.

The tribute was minor compared to the numerous medical awards and decorations he has received.

Mal Lancaster, an accomplished artist, is a medical doctor whose specialty is cardiology. He is a Colonel in the USAF at the School of Aerospace Medicine, Clinical Sciences Division, Brooks Air Force Base. He uses his artistic talent to do medical illustrations for himself

and others in the medical profession.

Among medical awards he has received are the Casimer Funk Award for outstanding accomplishment in the field of cardiovascular disease; the 1974 Col. (Dr.) John Jeffries Award for his work in aeronautics and astronautics through medical research. His most recent award was the 1975 Arnold D. Tuttle Award, made annually for original research that is the most significant contribution toward the solution of a challenging problem in aerospace medicine. He is responsible for an electrocardiographic library containing over 700,000 electrocardiograms to provide doctors a greater understanding of normal and diseased hearts.

Not only has Dr. Lancaster contributed to the medical field, but he has contributed a great deal to the advancement of art. He has been conducting free art lessons once a week for approximately eight years at the Helotes Art Guild.

In his teachings, which include every facet an artist must know, he also delves into the sciences as was so aptly stated the tribute paid to him by his students, "You, Mal, have not only taught us to place paint on canvas, but you have enlightened us on the sciences, and given us a keener appreciation of nature and man made objects."

A semi-self taught artist, Dr. Lancaster's only formal art training was a few lessons taught by C. G. McMahon of San Antonio and attendance at a workshop conducted by artist Ken Gore of Gloucester, Mass.

Having traveled extensively, Dr. Lancaster has a collection of European and local art. He also has collections of Brass Rubbings, India Ink and Baroque relief in

papier-mache.

Other interests of Dr. Lancaster include woodwork, especially the building of furniture. He is interested in all the crafts and enjoys working with leather.

When asked why he spends four hours of his valuable time every Wednesday evening teaching art with no monetary compensation he answered, "I have a very selfish motive—I enjoy it."

He was president of the Helotes Art Guild in 1967, and is currently a member of the Board of Directors of the Guild. He has very few paintings to display or hang in the Gallery, as soon as he finishes a painting it is purchased.

Dr. Lancaster is a native Texan. He was born in Amarillo, is married and the father of four children.

The public is invited to visit the Helotes Art Guild Gallery daily from 1 to 5 p.m. and the Wed-

nesday evening art classes taught by Dr. Lancaster at the Guild, located at 10603 Bandera Road.

John Ingle, who teaches water color and oil painting and the art of jewelry making at San Antonio College, will do a water color demonstration at the Helotes Art Gallery to which those interested are invited. The program is without charge and will be held in conjunction with the Art Guild's regular meeting.

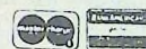

The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN—Early fall is a time when many Texans are trying to locate an apartment, duplex, or house to rent.

And many persons may be depending on getting some professional assistance with the job of finding a suitable spot that fits their pocketbook from a rental listing agency.

Our Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division suggests that the selection of a rental listing agency be made with care, since reports from other states indicate that some consumers have had problems involving misleading or deceptive trade practices in dealing with a few such firms.

Rental listing agencies operate by charging a fee to persons who want to gain access to their special listings of rental property, since most such agencies obtain exclusive contracts with owners to advertise and rent their property.

Some rental listing services specialize in property in certain areas of town. Others specialize in certain types of rental units, such as efficiency apartments, luxury townhouses, or duplex units.

Thus, persons interested only in certain types of rent property or property only in a certain location, may save a great deal of time and effort they might otherwise have spent in looking at property that doesn't meet their needs or wants by dealing with a listing agency.

Real estate advertisements placed in the newspapers by such rental listing agencies may sound like ads placed by owners or real estate brokers, except that the agency name, and sometimes the stipulation

"fee," may appear in the ad. Problems for some consumers have involved rental listing agencies that operate in such a way that consumers sometimes pay a fee to get information they could have obtained free.

Our Consumer Protection attorneys have learned that some rental listing agencies charge customers from \$20 to \$30 to check their "exclusive listings," when those listings amount to nothing more than a duplicate of newspaper ad clippings.

Other persons have been attracted by a listing agency's advertisement for a particularly appealing property, visited the agency, and agreed to pay the required fee in order to get more information about the listing.

It's only then that they have discovered the property they're interested in is "no longer available," or that the ad misrepresented the quality or size of the apartment, duplex, or house.

Consumers who have such problems with a rental listing agency should contact the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division, the county or district attorney, or the local Better Business Bureau.

And our Consumer Protection attorneys remind consumers that many resources are available for shopping for rent property. Friends, relatives, and classified ads can supply information about possible apartments or houses. And some landlords pay the fee themselves to list their rent property with a real estate broker who then advertises it in the paper.
