## Robbery Suspect Indicted

The suspected robber of the Helotes office of San Antonio Savings Association was indicted Wednesday in San Antonio by a federal grand jury. His whereabouts are unknown.

The indictment named Shelby David Shifflet, 36, as the man that the FBI suspects as having walked into the local SASA office at about 4 p.m. on Monday, Nov. 17, and demanded money from a teller. A picture of him taken by a bank security camera showed the barrel of a gun sticking out of a bag he held.

The indictment on an FBI charge of receipt of stolen bank money said he escaped with more than \$500.

He walked from the SASA office to the Helotes Park Shopping Center parking lot and disappeared.

After the robbery, the sheriff of Bandera County and FBI agents searched for him in the Lakehills area of Medina Lake. He had borrowed a car from a woman acquaintance in Lakehills, and when he failed to return the car, she reported it stolen. The car was found near Boerne Wednesday morning.

He also was reported to have bought another car, a cocoa brown 1976 Toyota, in Jourdanton on Tuesday after the robbery.

Shifflet's description is white male, 4 feet 1 inch tall, weighing about 150 pounds, with brown hair and blue eyes.

He is believed to have been in the Lakehills area for several weeks before the robbery.

## Ordinance On Signs Unchanged

Helotes City Council Wednesday night authorized Mayor Vivian Hultz to negotiate with Bill Klick of Leon Valley to be the new Helotes chief of police.

The action followed an executive session during Wednesday's Council meeting when the Council interviewed Klick. Councilman Gene Brigrman was absent.

At the beginning of the fiscal year in October, the Council budgeted \$22,000 for the annual salary of a chief of police, but it was expected that the city will have to pay Klick more than that. An announcement of the result of the negotiations is expected soon.

The Council also heard a report from the Sign Committee of the Planning and Zoning Commission of the controversial sign ordinance. Georgeanne Hitzfeld and Greg Huber indicated the ordinance only needs strict and continuous enforcement as it is. The Commission is to report back to the Council in 90 days on how enforcement should be

## Posey Bennett Dies At 95

Posey (P.A.) Bennett of Grey Forest died Sunday, Nov. 23, and was buried Wednesday morning, Nov. 26, in Sunset Memorial Park. A memorial service was held for him Tuesday afternoon at Forest Hills Presbyterian Church.

Mr. Bennett was 95. He was born in Sabine County on Sept. 16, 1891, but lived most of his life in San Antonio and, in recent years, Grey Forest.

His lengthy working life included careers in teaching, insurance and civil service. He gained his bachelor's degree from the University of Texas in 1920. After a teaching and superintendent's position in Mason, Texas, he began an insurance career which lasted more than 20 years.

A civil servant during and after World War II, he traveled extensively as an instructor, including a favorite overseas station on Guan.

After his mandatory retirement from civil service at age 70, he was still determined to continue his own education and share it with others. At approximately age 72 he earned his master's degree from Our Lady of the Lake University.

After a few years of selling audio-visual equipment and aids to

San Antonio area schools, he volunteered for the Peace Corps Visa program. The last years of his teaching career may have been his

students at the San Antonio Literacy Council to help them gain their G.E.D.'s and citizenship, until his healthy finally mandated his permanent retirement.

Prior to restrictions on travel due to his health, he was active in the Forest Hills Presbyterian Church. He was a 32nd degree Mason and a member of the Patterson Lodge #1177. His burial at Sunset Park was under the auspices of members of the Lodge.

The last years of Mr. Posey's life were spent with the loving care and support of his wife, Sabina.

His survivors include his wife; two daughters, LaBelle Cravens of San Antonio and Edna Mae Wilber of St. Louis; one son, Arnold Bennett; two stepdaughters, Rosa Maria Alonso of Mexico City and Noemi Cortez of Mexico City; two stepsons, Jose Luis Soto of San Antonio and Ariel Soto of Houston; a sister, Blanche Grover of Kingsland; and numerous grandchildren, great-grandchildren,

## Taft, Clark Seniors To Compete For Scholarships

Two Northside School District high school seniors will be competing for over \$249,000 in scholarships as local nominees for the National Century III Leaders Awards Program.

Taft High School senior Shawn Boland and Clark High School senior Greg Sonnen will compete with other local and state winners for scholarships and a trip to Williamsburg, VA. to attend the National Leadership conference in March 1987.

The Century III Leaders Awards Program is administered by the National Association of Secondary School Principals and funded by the Shell Companies Foundation.

Since 1976, about \$2.5 million in

scholarships has been awarded to students as Century III Leaders.

Two winners from each state and the District of Columbia will receive an all-expense paid trip to Colonial Williamsburg for a three-day national meeting where they will discuss current and important business, political, and educational issues which face America and the world.

State winners will compete for the National Century III Leader and an additional \$10,000 scholarship. Nine semifinalists will receive additional \$500 awards.

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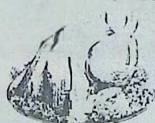
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# \$5.4 Million Westside Freeway Contract Awarded To Heath

Another stage in construction of a freeway for western and northwestern San Antonio has received the green light from the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Highway commission members approved the construction of frontage roads across Interstate 410 at the site of the interchange with the new Westside Freeway (Texas 151). The \$5.4 million project is one of several contracts for work in Bexar County awarded at the November meeting of the commission.

Heath Constructors, Inc. of San Antonio was the low bidder on the Westside Freeway project at \$5,417,661.65. The contractor will build frontage roads across I-410 for

the new freeway. The work will also relocate the I-410 frontage roads at the site of the proposed interchange.

Public support for the project included donation of 92 percent of the land needed for construction. The cost of one frontage road was also provided by private sources. The new freeway will serve the growing residential and light commercial development in western and northwestern San Antonio. It will also provide direct access to downtown.

San Antonio's downtown area also received a boost with the

approved construction of a new exit ramp from I-37. The highway commission awarded a \$1,024,980.57 contract to Zumwalt Paving & Grading, Inc. of Helotes to build a southbound exit ramp from I-37 to Houston Street.

The ramp will provide additional access to the central business district, which includes the convention center and the new Tiendas Del Rio Mall, a new inner-city multipurpose shopping, office and residential development. No additional acquisition of land is required for the work.

Another inner-city project

approved by the commission will widen Colorado Street from Fredericksburg Road to Commerce Street. Zumwalt Paving & Grading, Inc., of San Antonio was the low bidder for the work at \$1,874,543.23.

The contractor will widen the two-lane road to four, 11-foot travel lanes with curbs and sidewalks. The

The Board of Directors of the Helotes Area Fire Department has approved purchase of a new pumper/tanker. Low bids were awarded to Gande Ford for cab and Chassius and Four Guys, Inc. for the apparatus construction. Helotes Bank will arrange the financing. Delivery is expected in the Spring of 1987.

Further actions taken by the Board included resolutions to improve the business management procedures:

Acceptance of a financial report

by consultant Susan Wooten validating the accounts for 1985-86 and recommending use of purchase vouchers, monthly account activity statements, gross and net income and expenditures to be used in budgets and accounts. The recommendations have been implemented.

The Internal Revenue Service is removing the penalties of \$2500 against the fire department for failure to file returns on time in 1984 and 1985. The 1986 tax forms have been filed this year promptly with

the assistance of Mrs. Wooten.

The fire department has achieved full compliance with the Farmers' Home Administration (FHA) on the loan for the fire truck purchased in

## Peace Award To Include Local Telecast

The four-nation group known as Contadora has been named as recipient of the 1986 Beyond War Award for its continuing effort to achieve peace in Central America through negotiations rather than military action.

Announcement of the award was made after meetings with the foreign ministers of the four nations — Mexico, Panama, Colombia and Venezuela.

Presentation of the award will be made on Dec. 14 in a television "Spacebridge Of The Americas" that will span the North and South American continents.

Each of the four foreign ministers

has been invited to visit a different U.S. city in December to receive the award on behalf of his country. The leaders of the four Contadora nations — President Virgilio Barco Vargas of Colombia, President Miguel de la Madrid of Mexico, President Eric Arturo Delvalle of Panama and President Jaime Lusinchi of Venezuela — will also participate in the "spacebridge" from their capital cities, which will be linked via satellite.

The San Antonio segment will be held at San Antonio College on Dec. 14 from 3:30 to 6 p.m. Admission will be \$5.

## Exercise Programs

### Good For Elderly

Everybody's getting physical these days. It seems there's a video exercise program for everyone from infants to grandparents.

Although older people can benefit greatly from exercise, they require an individualized program designed with their personal strengths and goals in mind, says Pamela Stanton, EdD, director of the physical therapy education program at The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio.

"More and more elderly people are interested in maintaining their health and independence," Stanton says. But there's a great deal of misinformation around, particularly when it comes to exercise and conditioning programs."

She is particularly concerned about sedentary men and women who pop a tape in the videocassette recorder and suddenly begin whirlwind workouts led by non-professionals.

Stanton recommends a medical checkup before starting an exercise routine. "Medical evaluation is important for everyone, especially the elderly, to establish physical limitations," she says. "Actually, there are very few older individuals who should not exercise."

Exercise doesn't cure cardiovascular disease, but it may improve the prognosis, Stanton contends. "Exercise also can build strength, flexibility, coordination and promote relaxation," she says, "and there is some evidence that exercise can help to retard the progress of osteoporosis."

In designing an exercise program, physical therapists evaluate a

person's range of motion, general physical condition, daily tasks and leisure time exercise activities.

Says Stanton, "We focus on a lifetime program which encourages the person to stay at the highest possible functional level.

Exercise doesn't have to be jumping up and down for 30 minutes. It should be based on things people enjoy doing, like swimming, bicycling and walking."

Those who want to begin aerobic programs should try 20-minute sessions three times a week and build up to more time per session, she advises.

"Warm ups and cool downs are important transitions for the body, as are gently calisthenics and stretching exercises."

Stanton's advice to elderly exercisers:

- \* Wear loose-fitting, comfortable clothing. Wear shock absorbent footwear for jogging and walking. Never wear rubberized "sauna" suits, she warns. "The body's heat regulatory system doesn't react as promptly in the elderly."

- \* Adjust your activities to the environment. Don't jog on a summer afternoon; exercise in the cool of the morning or in an environmentally controlled area such as a shopping mall.

- \* Do not hold your breath as you exercise. Breathe in as you contract your muscles; exhale as you relax.

- \* Schedule warm-up and cool-down phases.

- \* Begin exercising at your current tolerance level. Gradually increase the amount of time per session as your tolerance increases.

## UTSA Offers Trip To Mayan Dig

If you'd like the chance to play "Indiana Jones" for a week or so, The University of Texas at San Antonio may have just what you need. UTSA's Center for Archaeological Research is offering a chance for volunteers to work at the Colha Project in Belize.

The Center for Archaeological Research will offer a contributor/participant program which will cost \$300/week per person. That price includes meals, camp essentials, lab equipment and transportation from the airport to the site. Transportation from the U.S. to Belize is the responsibility of the volunteer.

Volunteers will be able to participate in excavating, surveying, mapping or lab work, besides supporting the research. Volunteers don't need to be an archaeologist or a scientist.

The Mayan site at Colha, Belize (about 47 miles north of Belize City) is significant due to the evidence of stone tool mass production.

One of the participants, Dan Potter of Harvard is working on his Ph.D. dissertation on the Middle PreClassic occupation at Colha. In 1983, he discovered a series of bloodletting offerings, fundamental finds in supporting current theories of bloodletting rites in ancient Mayan life, and plans to continue his research on the rites at the site in '87.

The site has also revealed a "skull pit", broken ceramics, stone tools, animal bones, marine shells and even a tiny copper bell.

The 1987 season promises to yield more information and more surprises. Besides Dan Potter, Eleanor King, a Ph.D. candidate at Penn State and a veteran of Maya expeditions to El Mirador, Copan and Carros, will direct the field work. There will be excavations of

housemounds, workshops and at least one "plaza group" (elite residence).

The 1987 season is planned to start in early February and run through April or May. Because of time, funding and logistics, volunteer space is limited. For more information, contact the Center for Archaeological Research at 691-4378.

## Museum To Show 'Ancient Art'

Ancient art drawn from a vast local collection of Egyptian, Greek and Roman antiquities will go on display Dec. 19 at the San Antonio Museum of Art. This preview exhibition of sculpture and painted pottery will serve to introduce the extensive Gilbert M. Denman, Jr. Collection of Western Antiquities recently donated to the San Antonio Museum Association.

"Ancient Art from the Denman Collection" will feature approximately 40 outstanding pieces of marble sculpture and Greek pottery dating from around 3000 B.C. to the 4th century A.D. The exhibit encompasses Egyptian, Greek and Roman sculpture in the round and in relief, and painted Greek vases.

One of the highlights of the exhibit will be a marble sculpture of the "Sleeping Ariadne," which was formerly in the collection at Wilton House near Salisbury, England. The statue is a Roman (2nd century A.D.) copy of a Greek original that no longer exists. Also on display will be Greek grave relief dating from the late 5th century B.C. The carved marble tombstone, depicting a young deceased woman with her father, is almost complete and in very good condition.

"Ancient Art from the Denman Collection" will coincide with the December annual meeting of the American Institute of Archaeology in San Antonio and will remain on display through 1987.

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## Flu Season

### Returns

### With Northerners

With the first cold snap roaring into San Antonio last month, residents are readily reminded that the cold and flu season has been issued in as well.

To cut down on the misery of nursing yourself back to health, Dr. Vivian Giudice, director of the student health services and family practice medical group clinic at Medical Center Hospital, has come up with a few tips to help area residents stay healthy.

"Staying healthy is the optimal solution," she explains. "This means eating nutritionally, as well as getting plenty of rest and exercising."

"San Antonians also need to remember to dress for our drastic change in weather from mornings lows in the 50s to afternoon highs in the 70s or low 80s," Dr. Giudice adds. In addition, she recommends dressing children in the "layered-look" allowing them to shed outer clothing as the day warms.

Also ensure proper protective clothing, i.e., raincoats, boots, etc., if the weather is wet in addition to being cold.

Although most people are ill for only a few days, the flu can be life threatening for the elderly or chronically ill.

To help combat the flu season, typically between November and April, a yearly vaccine is recommended for "high risk" groups.

"High risk" groups include:

- Residents of nursing homes and other chronic care facilities.
- People 65 years or older.
- Anyone (at any age) who:
- \*has certain heart, lung or kidney problems.

- \*is a diabetic.

- \*has a severe anemia.

- Hospital or medical personnel.

- And, the general population who want to reduce their risk of acquiring the flu.

During the flu season be sure you:

- Wash your hands often.

- Avoid close contact with an infected person.

- Eat a well-balanced diet (with extra fruit and fruit juices).

- Get plenty of sleep.

- Avoid stress (which lowers your resistance.)

- Avoid smoking (smoking damages air passages, making them less able to resist a virus attack.)

If you do get a touch of the flu or cold bug, remember, emphasizes Dr. Giudice, that these ailments are caused by a virus — not a bacterial infection — and cannot be treated with antibiotics.

"If you do succumb to a cold or flu," says Dr. Giudice, "let your body be your guide. If symptoms continue or worsen after two to three days, consult your physician."

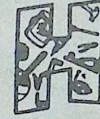
Mr. Smith has been the organist at Christ Church for the past eight

The concert will be held in the Immaculate Conception Chapel, and is dedicated to The McIvaine Family, OST benefactors. The recital is open to the public.

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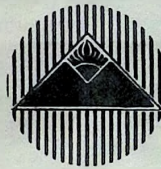
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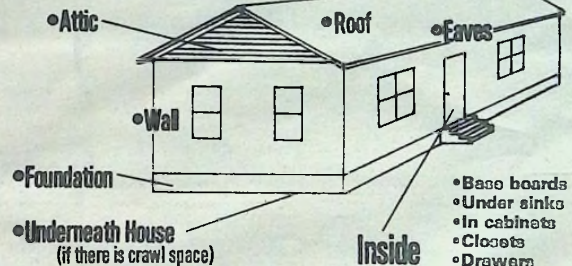
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# Rams To Open District Basketball Play Dec. 8

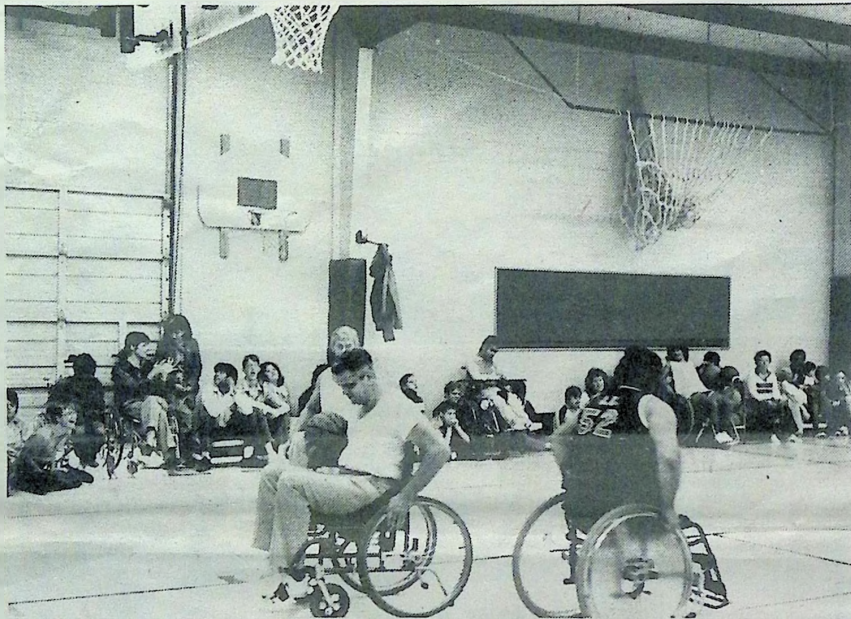

Osterman said 6-7 Darrin Wylie is improving with his inside play.

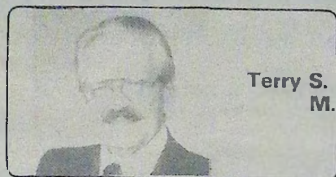
Wylie netted 15 points and Joe Uriegas and White each contributed eight against Jefferson.

### A SPECIAL PROBLEM IN PARENTING: BLACKBOARD STRATEGY

Has this ever happened in your home? Dad comes home from a hard day in the salt mines. As he pulls in the drive, the customary after-school bedlam dwindles away. A single look at you prompts him to ask what happened. You start with the spilled orange juice, mention the crayon artwork on the new wallpaper, and are just starting to explain the bandage on Junior's leg when Dad interrupts with, "What! These little angels have been misbehaving?" Angels? No, goblins that Mom can't keep in line. They become models of decorum upon his arrival. Why? Simple: Dad is the BIG authority.

This condition exists in a lot of families, this one-parent authority. The reasons for it I'll leave up to the psychologists and simply state that it is a big problem for many young families. In all my years of dealing with kids and parents, I've come across but one single solution to it. It was provided by a mother who had an overly long wait in my office due to an emergency. Her seven-year-old son began to fidget, run up and down the hall, make noise, and in general behave like any gap-toothed boy would after an hour's confinement.

Mom asked him in a quiet, conversational tone to sit down. In a few minutes she repeated her request, still in the same tone. Then she said, "Sit. Or do you want me to write this on the blackboard?" Zoom! He was in the chair and not one peep was heard from him during the rest of her consultation.

Curious, I asked about the mysterious power of a blackboard. She told me that she handled most of the problems of childhood discipline, but those she couldn't deal with were written on a blackboard and discussed with Dad when he came home. This boy idolized his father, liked to go fishing and hiking with him, and would do anything to keep from incurring Dad's disfavor. She told me how it worked in their home. I've seen it work in dozens of other homes since I stumbled across this "blackboard strategy".

An ordinary blackboard is conveniently placed, and plenty of chalk is kept at hand. During each and every day all of the infractions of childhood that mother cannot handle are recorded, such as "called me a mean old ugly" or "had a temper tantrum" or "refused to straighten room". Every single act outside the boundaries of normal behavior is diligently recorded... provided Mom can't deal with the situation by herself. At the end of the day when the father returns from work, the BIG authority is brought into action.

Dad sits down with Junior and the blackboard. He goes over the citations one by one, explaining them. "You tracked mud through the house. We've told you about it before, so this is disobedience, isn't it?" Junior nods. "You ran through Mrs. Murphy's flower bed and told Mom you didn't. What's that called?" Lip quivering, Junior admits to lying. And so on through the list, with full explanation of each item.

This whole action is a scaled-down version of adult law. Mom apprehended the miscreant and put him on the docket. A trial is held, giving full disclosure and informed consent to guilt (Junior is permitted his say, of course). Then comes sentencing by Dad-the-judge.

They go over the list again. "Mud in the house. Hmmm. Not a bad disobedience. But just so you won't forget, there'll be no dessert for you tomorrow night. Just an empty plate to look at while the rest of us eat ice cream." "Now you know lying is a serious offense in this home. What do you think a fair penalty would be?" Plea-bargaining, Junior says, "No TV?" Dad-the-judge counters with, "No TV Saturday morning... and you stay in your room the whole morning." "Aw, gee, Dad..." He is cut off by his father who has been calm, fair, just, sympathetic, understanding...and unwavering. One family uses a completely innocuous ping-pong paddle as the symbol of authority. A certain number of swats is agreed for each offense, the sum total being administered at one time.

At first the blackboard is full, but the notations become fewer and fewer with time. Here is ultimate authority in action. Junior realizes that the very worst thing Mom can do to him is make an entry on the blackboard docket. "Why, I'd rather have a good licking from Mom than another icy talking-to from Dad. He doesn't miss a trick. And he never kids!"

Blackboard strategy works. Or will work where fairness and consistency are applied. Done with a cool head, it can make authoritative discipline a fun thing. Still, kids will be kids and home is not a military academy. Though consistency is a keynote, leniency is permitted at times. Mixed with love, of course. The payoff is the respect Junior will develop for Mom and Dad and authority figures in general.

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
