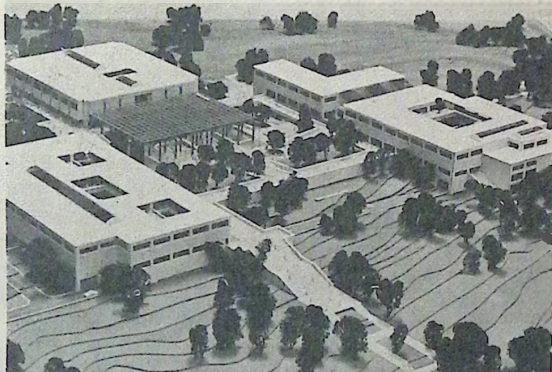

The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System have called for bids for Phase 1 buildings to be constructed on the campus of the new University of Texas at San Antonio. They will be accepted until 2 p.m., Wednesday, April 5. The initial buildings—five of which are shown in the model above—were designed to allow for the natural setting and for ease of movement. Bartlett Cocke and Associates, Inc. have the plans and specifications upon which the bids will be based. Shown here are Humanities, Administration, Arts and Sciences and other facilities including a library. By 1973 some 6,000 students should be on campus with about 30,000 expected through a normal growth. As soon as the bids are accepted, work is due to begin in the actual building. HUD Okays New Town

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development announced Feb. 28 in Washington, D. C., that an \$18 million loan guarantee for the San Antonio Ranch new town near Helotes has been approved, despite a court order issued a week earlier by U. S. District Judge Adrian Spears in San Antonio prohibiting acceptance of the guarantee by the new town developers.

The order was issued after suit HUD has taken the position that had been filed by the Sierra Club, the controlled development of the Citizens for a Better Environment, area would be less of a threat to the League of Women Voters, and aquifer than uncontrolled urban American Association of University sprawl development. Women charging that HUD had violated procedures established by law to assure protection of natural resources.

Judge Spears ordered a hearing for March 16.

The suit is the latest in a series of attempts by citizens of San Antonio to prevent the development of the new town, chiefly because of fears that it would pollute the Edwards underground aquifer from which San Antonio gets its water supply. A portion of the aquifer underlies the area on which the new town would be built.

San Antonio Ranch would be on the 9,318-acre former Lytle Ranch about two miles west of Helotes on Bandera Highway, extending through to Culebra Road on the south. It eventually would bring a population of more than 60,000 persons to the edge of Helotes.

Plans for the 30-year project include schools, two golf courses, three lakes, shopping centers, an industrial park, a 500-acre technical education center, and 28,000 residential units. Several anti-pollution measures are planned.

Luck Rides With Youth

In a freak accident which could have easily proved fatal, a youth about 20 years of age struck a heavy low-water pole at a curve on the Scenic Loop Road about midnight on February 28, throwing the six-foot pole into the air and almost completely through the windshield, where it rested in contact with the seat.

According to the youth who was alone at the time of the accident, he rounded the curve at about sixty miles and lost control of his car. As the silver hardtop 1965 convertible came to a rest in a ditch without turning over, he discovered the post a few inches from his head. The youth who is acquainted in this area listed San Antonio as his home. He was able to walk away uninjured. The accident occurred near the

Wagner Road. He struck four other posts before hitting the one which broke his windshield, according to reports. A family living in the vicinity took him to his home.

Patric McDonald Seeks GOP Nomination

Patric McDonald, an announced candidate for the Texas Legislative District 57-H in the Republican primary to be held May 6, said in part in announcing his candidacy: "Texas is basically conservative, and wants to remain that way." He said further that state government needs an "effective opposition party to offer checks and balances" to prevent profiteering.

Campaigning on a slogan "Build a Texas we will be proud to turn over to our children"—he pointed out that a requirement of single-member districts for Bexar County has to be the single most



important gift "to pass on to our children."

McDonald, who attended the University of Texas from 1952 to 1956, resides with his wife, Lois, and their daughters on "the forty acres," a developed acreage which they own off Bandera Road in Helotes. A native Texan, he came to San Antonio in 1957 with the U.S. Treasury Dept. as an internal revenue agent. In 1963 he opened his business—the McDonald's Business Forms and Systems—and last year moved the general offices to Helotes.

Mr. McDonald and his family have resided in Helotes since 1965. He has children in the Helotes Elementary School. One daughter, Suzette, will enter Marshall High School next fall. His daughter, Debbie, who will be graduated from Ursuline Academy this spring, has been accepted as a student this summer at St. Edward's University in Austin.

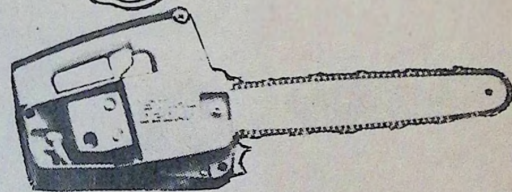

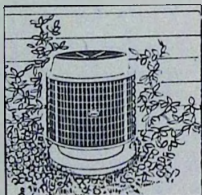

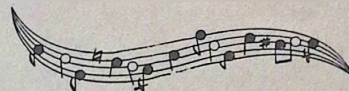

Work On Highway Started

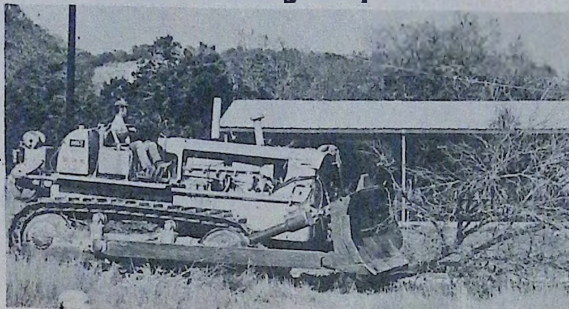

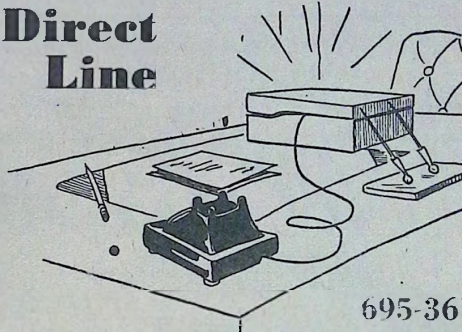
