Helotes Finds City On Its Door Steps

By unanimous action, San Antonio's City Council May 25 pushed San Antonio into the 11th largest city in the nation spot, annexing 63.38 square miles of Bexar County. Stretching its boundaries over large acreages to the Southwest corner of Hausman and Bandera Road, it even gobbled up much of what is traditionally considered Helotes, and took in a number of subdivisions encircling San Antonio — despite vocal opposition from groups in the newly annexed areas.

Citizens of Helotes and Scott City joined Hills and Dales in an earlier protest. Hills and Dales — already annexed — has a suit in the United States Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit to declare the annexation void on several counts. Attorney for the appellants is Earl Cobb, Jr.

Ray Ellison, a developer whose subdivisions fall in the annexation pattern, also filed suit naming the City of San Antonio, the City Manager and others as defendants and is seeking a temporary injunction to halt annexation of more than 40,000 acres involved in

the present action and involving some 90,000 residents. Ellison took action the day following the Council's vote.

Annexation without representation is claimed by those who oppose the City's position. Some who spoke at early protest sessions pointed out that they seldom availed themselves of city facilities — having more interest in military installations or nearby smaller towns. Other opponents pointed out the lack of ability of the City to provide services and that the very quantity of newly annexed land was too great to be taken in at one time — adding 30 per cent or more to the land mass of San Antonio.

Citizens of Helotes were asking each other "What Town is This?" and most of them expressed fear of big city problems should their lot fall within the newly annexed territory, the boundaries of which are not clear.

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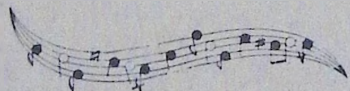

Festival Elects Dr. Arthur For '73

The Helotes Spring Festival Assn. will meet at Floore Country Store Wednesday, July 12, at 7:30 p.m. and everyone interested in joining is invited.

Dr. James R. Arthur, local dentist, was elected 1973 President of the Helotes Spring Festival Assn., Inc., at the June 7 meeting. Larry Bergstrom, outgoing president, thanked members for their work and urged them to lend support to his successor. Mr. Bergstrom is chairman of the Seguin Benefit Dance being sponsored by the organization. He also pledged his support for next year's event.

Other officers elected for the 1973 Festival which will be held May 3 through 6 next year are the following: Edwin Faust, coordinating vice president; Jerry Martinez, vice president in charge of street participation; Leon Schueneman, re-elected treasurer; Mrs. Carmen Madla, re-elected corresponding secretary; and Mrs. Connie Madla, recording secretary. In addition, Mrs. Betty Muires was named Chairman for next year's Hill Country Horse Show and several other chairmen were appointed.

Dr. Arthur also announced that a membership drive will be inaugurated immediately. Dues are two dollars annually, and the organization uses all monies to sponsor the annual event. Other organizations are allowed each year to raise funds for their own projects during the big Cornyval.

Longest Ride Heads For Arlington Now

The longest trail ride in Texas — 282 miles — is in progress. After leaving Helotes June 4 via the Hill Country to Lampasas, the riders were to have a week-end break, according to Kitty Fischer, trail boss. On Monday, June 12, they begin the second leg of the journey going through Hamilton, Hidden Valley, Hico, Chalk Mountain, Glen Rose and across the Brazos River June 15 going on to Cleburne for a night stop at Lake Nolan.

Riders left here after a dance the eve before at Floore's Country Store. Others are slated to join along the way.

After going through Joshua, they will stop at Burleson where a Queen is to be elected. The final day of riding is June 19 and Arlington.

They hope to make Six Flags Over Texas that day with a complete day of fun slated for June 20. This is the second annual ride which has already received more national and statewide publicity than many older established events in Texas. Last year's founders struck out on the July 4th week-end over hot pavement and were given the red carpet treatment as the official ride of Six Flags Over Texas amusement park.

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Investigators Ask For Help

The Bexar County Sheriff's Department has requested the assistance of eyewitnesses in identifying the hit and run driver who struck two teen-age girls Friday, May 5, about 9:30 p.m. on Circle A Drive less than a block from Bandera Highway.

Because of the nearby street dance being held on the Plaza during the Festival, an unusually large number of people witnessed the accident. Both girls who received severe head injuries were hospitalized in serious condition, but have returned to their homes where they are making satisfactory recovery, according to reports.

Description of the vehicle was given to investigators as was a license number. Several witnesses described the driver, but investigators request that anyone who actually saw the accident or who has other knowledge of the event call 226-5161 and report the facts.

Rumors spread rapidly as a crowd of spectators gathered after the accident, and these have hampered a quick solution to the case, one investigator said. The suspect is thought to have been well-known to some who witnessed the accident, another source said, and these are requested to make a statement.

Witnesses who gave accounts agree that the vehicle sped away without stopping to render aid.

Local Pastor Has 25th Anniversary

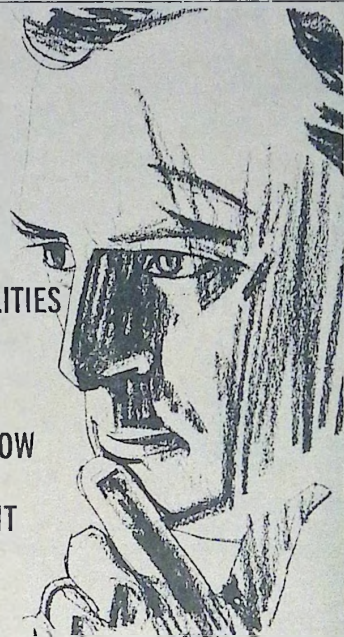

Artists Awarded Ribbons At Show

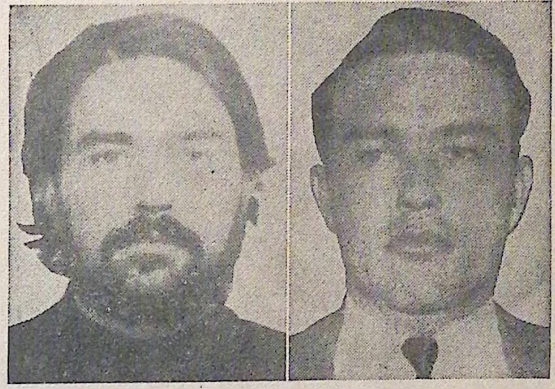

WANTED BY THE FBI



CAMERON DAVID BISHOP

Cameron David Bishop, a violence-minded college revolutionary who is charged with the sabotage of war utilities in the dynamiting of Colorado power transmission towers, is on the FBI's list of "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives."

Between January 20 and 28, 1969, he allegedly was responsible for dynamiting four transmission line towers in Colorado supplying power to defense plants. Wreckage from one blast damaged property nearly a mile away and dozens of square miles near Golden, Colorado, were partially blacked out. A Federal warrant issued at Denver, Colorado, on February 11, 1969, charges Bishop with the destruction of war utilities.

Bishop, who is reportedly an active member of the Students for a Democratic Society, a loudly militant "New Left" group opposed to U.S. involvement in Vietnam and existing government policies, has reportedly voiced a desire to live in Cuba.

He is known to associates as a revolutionist or anarchist who believes in violence to secure social reforms and was given a discharge from the Army for unsuitability after being located, while a deserter, as a mental patient in a hospital. He reportedly has a violent temper, has reportedly bragged of using drugs, including LSD, and was convicted of assault and battery in Colorado in 1965. He has allegedly stated his willingness to kill a police officer and has reportedly possessed hand guns, including a .357 magnum, in addition to rifles and dynamite.

A white American, born at Pueblo, Colorado, on November 7, 1942, he is 5'8" to 5'9" tall, weighs 155 to 165 pounds, has brown eyes, dark brown hair, a stocky build and a medium complexion. He has worn a beard, long hair and long sideburns in the past. A tattoo of a skunk holding a mirror appears on his right forearm. He has worked as an assistant credit manager, auto parts manager, coffee house operator, laborer, mine worker and truck driver. Consider Bishop armed and extremely dangerous.

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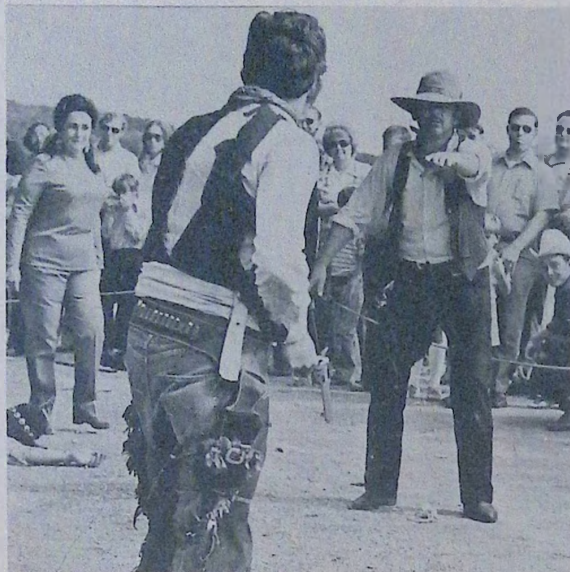
