Cornyval '84 to Run May 2-6



Bob Cage, Helotes builder, scheduled groundbreaking for his Helotes Executive Center yesterday afternoon — Thursday, April 19, at 1:30 p.m. The Center, designed by Guy Burnett, will be built on Bandera Highway about midway between the Helotes Park Shopping Center and Downtown Helotes.

Ginger Stutes of the Grey Forest Volunteer Fire Department reported this week that the department has received enough donations and other support to continue for another year. The department received \$300 from the Village Scoop, which last weekend donated 50 cents to the department from every purchase made at the ice cream parlor.

Sandy Bauman has made available the former Vinck's Garage for a special Cornyval '84 art show. Paul Kime is assisting in arranging the show. The Baumans recently bought the garage building from Martin Terry but have not yet occupied it. The art show will be open throughout the Cornyval.

Marjorie Fitzgerald, secretary of the Helotes Garden Club, has announced that the club will meet next on Tuesday, May 1, at the home of Mrs. Marjorie Beatty on Rafter S Trail in Helotes Park Estates. The program will be about photography and Ryder Howard will speak. The program will begin at 10 a.m.

Cornyval '84, the 19th spring festival for Helotes, will get underway Wednesday, May 2, with the Coronation Pageant to choose Miss Helotes '84 and her court from the 19 candidates pictured in this issue of The Echo.

Then the Cornyval will continue through Sunday, May 6, with a variety of entertainment that has attracted as many as 100,000 yearlings to Helotes in previous years.

The theme of the 1984 Cornyval is

"Spring Echoes Through Helotes."

The Coronation Pageant will be presented in the Parish Hall of Our Lady of Guadalupe Church, beginning at 7:30 p.m. Admission is \$1 for adults and children 12 years old and over. Children under 12 are

free. The Dow Daggett Trio will play, and Dr. Philip Moorad will be master of ceremonies. Mrs. Michelle Moorad is chairman of the pageant.

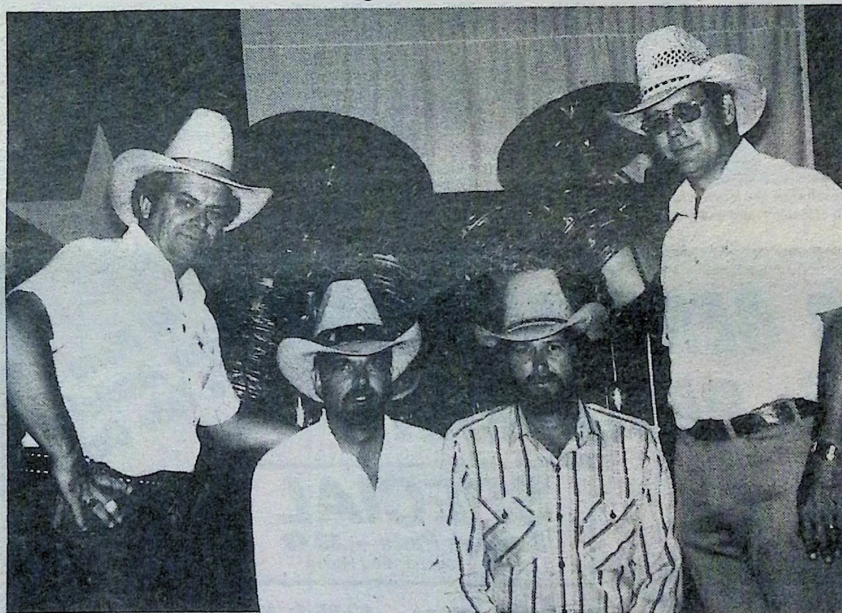
Wednesday also is Welcome Day in Helotes, with shopping, food and touring. Thursday, May 2, will be Merchants' Day, with business and professional open houses.

The lavish celebration in Downtown Helotes will begin Friday night, May 4, and continue through Saturday and Sunday. The Old Bandera Highway will be closed off and the street lined with food and games booths. A carnival midway will be open and there will be two free street dances plus a third free dance on the Floore Country Store patio. Playing on the street will be the Levis and the Davenport Family, and on the patio will be Billy Mata.

A Cornyval '84 Parade will be staged Saturday, May 5, at 11 a.m. It will begin at Bandera Highway and Loop 1604 and move through Helotes to the Scenic Loop Road.

Recount May Not End Problems in Grey Forest Mayor's Race

Results of the city elections on April 7 in Helotes were clear-cut, but Grey Forest had to have a recount in the mayor's race and may still face legal action over the voting.

Jerry Martin asked for a recount of the ballots in the race for Mayor of Grey Forest. The results of the recount, conducted Tuesday night this week, showed 62 votes were cast for Matt Vyverman, 57 for Martin and 40 for write-in candidate Don Zook. Vyverman picked up one

more vote in the recount.

After the recount, Martin told reporters he plans to file suit in a county court to try to force another election.

The recount was made by a citizens' committee chaired by Dick Miller. Other ballot counters were Joanne Miller, Gary Prejean and Billy Cornwell. Only they, the three mayoral candidates and the Grey Forest police chief were permitted in the city hall during the recount.

Results of the recount are to be

submitted to the Grey Forest city council.

In the races for Grey Forest city council positions, three incumbents — Beverly Boudreau, Ruth Zook and Lou Hecker — all won re-election. The fourth open place, formerly held by Matt Vyverman, will be filled by appointment by the city council. Vyverman won that position by write-in votes while also winning the mayor's race.

Two Drug Raids Made Locally

Dr. Craig McFarland of the Bandera Road Animal Hospital was arrested last week at his home on Geronimo Road and charged with possessing marijuana and cocaine.

Constable Jerry Connell said his office had worked two months on the case. It began with complaints about abuse of animals at the veterinary clinic. Deputy Constable Cynthia North, who also is an investigator for the Bexar County Humane Society, began an investigation that led to suspicions about the narcotics violations.

A search warrant was obtained by Connell and a raid was made on McFarland's home, on Friday, April 13, at about 8 p.m.

On Saturday, April 14, officers of the Texas Department of Public Safety arrested five men who allegedly were going to set up a "speed" factory in the Helotes area. All the men were from out of town — either Mexico or the Texas Panhandle.

It was reported that the officers had followed the suspects' van by helicopter from Austin to Helotes and then signaled other officers on the ground to make the arrests.

More than sixty floats, bands, horse riding groups and other entries will make up the three-mile parade.

On the street in Downtown Helotes on Saturday there will be entertainment by the Fleetweld Cowboys from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m., Los Reyes Nortenos from 5 to 7:30 p.m., the Sahawe Indian Dancers from 1 to 5 p.m., the Bexar County Gunslingers from 1 to 6 p.m., and contests including corn shucking, best beards, best-filled jeans, beer drinking and cow chip tossing beginning at 3:30 p.m. with KBUC personalities conducting the contests.

The food and game booths and the carnival midway also will be open all afternoon and evening. Two free street dances will feature the Levis and Country Jam, and another free dance on the Floore Country Store patio will feature Sundown.

Most of the events and entertain-

ment will continue on Sunday, May 6. Two free street dances will be held from 3 to 6 p.m. with the Lucy Espinosa band and the Oompa Band, plus Whiskey Dreamin' on the Floore Country Store patio. Sunday afternoon's contests will include corn eating, ice cream eating, beer drinking, jalapeno eating and a feed bag toss.

The Cornyal is presented each year by the Helotes Festival Association, a non-profit civic organization of about 75 members. The 1984 association president is Don Belto. Other officers include: Don Reddout, executive vice president; Maxine Benke, second vice-president; Bill Stein, third vice-president; Jim Benke, fourth vice-president; Helen Wendt, secretary; and Peggy Guilford, treasurer.

Mr. Carroll Dies at 70

Edward A. Carroll, Jr., of Helotes Park Estates, died Monday, April 16, and was buried Thursday morning in Mission Burial Park North after services at St. Mark's Episcopal Church. He was 70 years old.

His survivors include a son, Edward B. Carroll; a daughter, Catherine C. Staudt; and two grandsons, Karl Edward Staudt and Frederick M. Cox.

Mr. Carroll had been a high-ranking civilian officer in the San Antonio Air Material Command at Kelly Air Force Base, and was associated with several well-known ranching and farming interests in Goliad and San Patricio counties. He also was a veteran of the Pacific campaigns in World War II.

He was a member of the San Antonio Writers' Guild, Parents Without Partners and various civic groups. He retained strong ties in historical functions of all kinds. His ancestors were early settlers and participated in the Battle of San Patricio and the Mexican War.

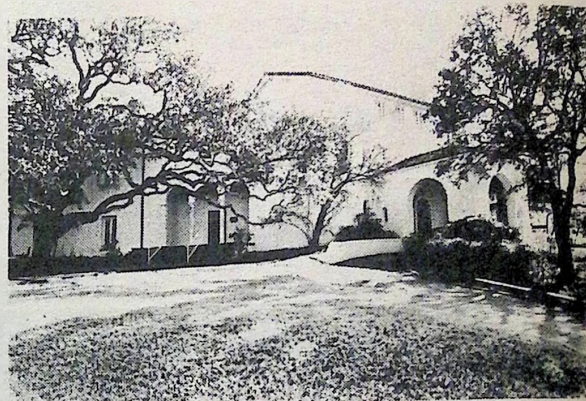

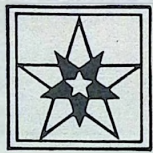

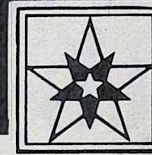

A look at "local measured service"

Perhaps you've heard about a new optional type of service that Southwestern Bell Telephone is proposing for its Texas customers. It's called Local Measured Service (LMS). Simply put, LMS would give you the option of paying for your direct use of the telephone network.

Southwestern Bell Telephone's LMS proposal to the Public Utility Commission (PUC) includes an option that would lower fixed monthly charges while adding a low usage charge for each completed outgoing call. Those calls would be billed on the basis of distance, duration of the call and the time of day.

Another option would be a "LIFELINE" service at a \$5 monthly fee. This service would be targeted to the elderly on poverty-level income. The rate would include a usage allowance of 25 completed outgoing local calls. Additional completed outgoing local calls would be billed at the rate of 8 cents each. Customers would not be charged for incoming calls under either plan.

It's your option

LMS is for residence customers, as well as single-line, one-party business customers. And of course you could keep the current "flat-rate" monthly service if you'd prefer.

These new local service pricing plans would be available within 60 days of Commission approval in 89 offices which currently serve over 2,500,000 customer lines. The company plans to equip the remaining offices within two years after approval.

I think you'll agree there are several benefits to measured service. It would give you options for choosing the plan that gives you more control over your phone bill. You'd also have the option of paying for the service you used, rather than subsidizing those who use their phones a great deal more than you do.

While LMS as a standard ser-

vise offering would be new to Southwestern Bell Telephone's Texas customers, it isn't new in Texas. Customers of three other companies in the Lone Star State — General Telephone, Continental Telephone and Cen-Tel — are taking advantage of LMS. And like us, other companies — United Tel, Palo Pinto Tel and Mustang Tel — have requests pending with the PUC.

Customer interest

We're proposing the service because we've known there has been a need for optional pricing in Texas. Last summer we conducted a survey to determine customer interest in LMS.

We found that interest was strong, particularly among those customers making fewer local calls or shorter-duration calls. The results also showed that customers want wider choices in how they pay for service by having the ability to match their cost to their calling needs.

At this time, PUC hearings on LMS are set to begin Sept. 24 in Austin. You can look for more information about LMS in the special insert in your telephone bill.

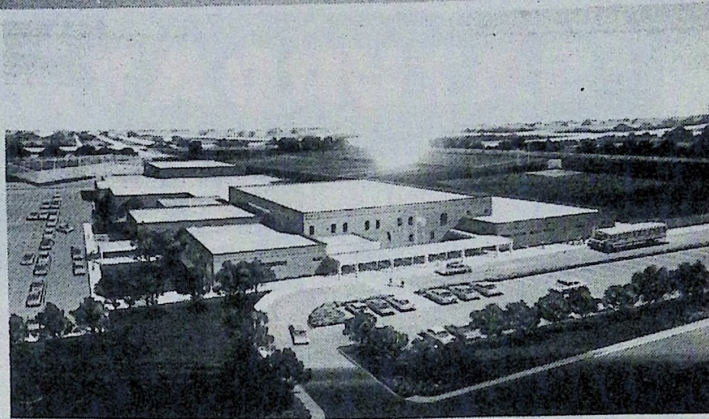

Presently under construction and scheduled to open in the fall of 1985, Northside School District's ninth middle school is located at the corner of Timber Path and Cliff Briar Roads in the Great Northwest subdivision. The \$5.5

million school will accommodate 1,800 students. The middle school is one of three schools scheduled to open in 1985. A new high school and a new elementary school are also being built.

Water Wells Show Drop

Water well levels and spring flow throughout the Edwards Underground Water District declined in March, the district office has announced.

Attributing the lower readings at the end of the month to below-average rainfall for the past several months, coupled with the onset of normal seasonal irrigation, the EUWD is urging consumers to avoid wasting water.

Tom Fox, EUWD general manager, said, "The water level decline is primarily due to a continuation of low rainfall totals. If we fail to get our usual heavier rainfall in April and May, we will be in a dry cycle and can expect further drops in water well levels."

The flow of Comal Springs at New Braunfels at the end of March had dropped 21 cubic feet per second to a rate of 187 cfs, compared to the longterm average of 299 cfs. A decline of three cfs was noted at San Marcos Springs, flowing 111.5 cfs at the end of March, compared to the average flow of 168 cfs.

Following are the water well levels shown in feet above mean sea level with the recorded high levels in parentheses: Uvalde: 870.0 feet, down 0.6 foot (886.3). Sabinal: 739.8 feet, down 9.6 feet (835.4). Castroville: 670.3 feet, down 9.7 feet (737.8). Hondo: 692.5 feet, down 11.7 feet (773.8). San Antonio: 646.1 feet, down 8.5 feet (696.5). New Braunfels: 623.5 feet, down 0.6 foot (630.2). San Marcos: 574.8 feet, down 0.1 foot (581.9).

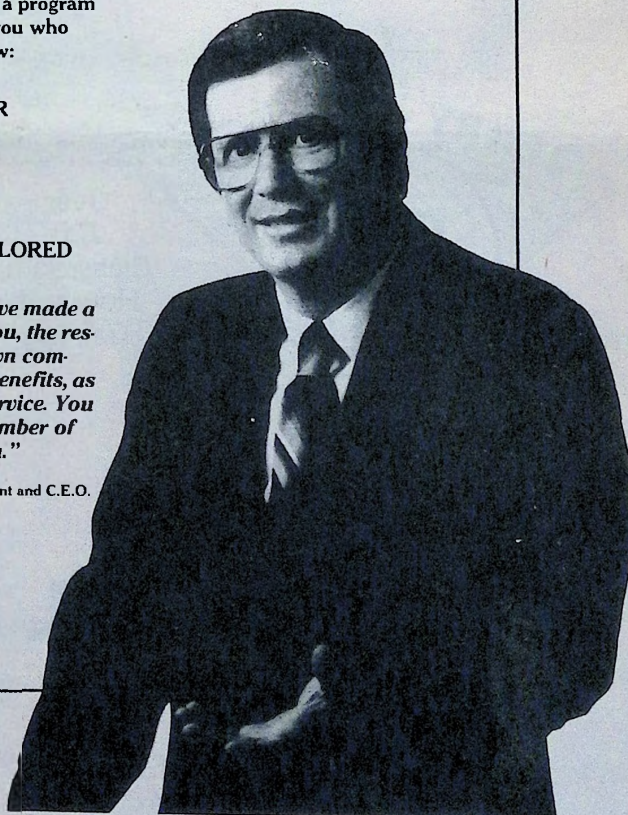

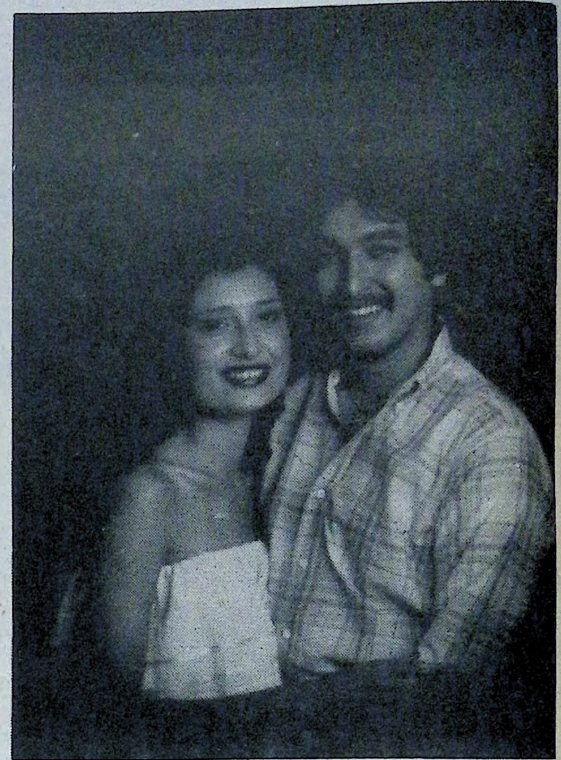

Rodeo Finals For Colleges To Be Here

Collegiate cowgirls and cowboys will be competing in the Southern Region Collegiate Rodeo Finals June 1 and 2.

Performances will begin at 8 p.m. nightly. Admission will be \$5 per person and children 8 and under will be admitted free.

The year's finals will be held in the Silver Rose Garden Show Complex, on Boerne Stage Road.

The Southern Region is a member

of the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association (NIRA) and consist of 30 institutions from the southern portions of Texas and Louisiana.

Some of the school's collegiate rodeo competitors will be from the following universities: Baylor, Texas A&M, Sam Houston State University, Texas A&I, Southwest Texas State, McNeese State and Northwestern State of Louisiana.

First Olympic trial and international invitational competition came to an exciting conclusion last week at the cross-country course at Ft. Sam Houston.

Robert Stull, Mike Storm, Greg Losey and SP5 Dean Glesnek emerged as the top four Americans in the first of two trials to select the '84 modern pentathlon team.

Stull, a civilian athlete from Damascus, Md., was the leading American. He led the competition from the first day but finished second overall with 5,325 points. Stull was passed in the last few hundred meters of the tough 2½-mile run by Laszlo Fabian of Hungary, who finished with 5,353 points.

Fabian, who won the junior world title in Los Angeles last October, started the run in 10th position. He made up a 59 second handicap to pass Stull on the final hill of the course.

Losey, a West Point graduate and former Army captain, had tied Stull in the first day's event of epee fencing and remained tied for first after the ride. He dropped a few points after the swim event and a 1,000 point shoot kept him in the top

three after four events. He finished ninth overall with 5,221 points. Losey and Stull were the only competitors in the 55-man field to score at least a thousand points in each of the five events.

Storm, a civilian from Arlington, Va., started out well back after the fence and moved up into the top six after a near perfect ride. Scoring 1,300 points in the 300-meter swim event and shooting for another thousand, Mike finished fourth with 5,291 points.

SP5 Glesnek, the current national and military modern pentathlon champion, finished in 10th place with 5,195 points. Glesnek had poor showings in both the fence and ride events which left him in 32nd place. He moved up to 23rd after the swim, but it was a shoot of 199 out of 200 for 1110 points that put him within reach of the top competitors going into the run. He passed three other Americans on the course to be one of the top four in the first Olympic trial.

The 20 U.S. athletes who competed have a chance to better their scores and standings at the second Olympic trial to be held at Ft. Sam Houston May 19-22. Selection of the U.S. modern pentathlon team will be based upon the combined scores of the two competitions. Because of the "luck factor" in the riding event,

according to Daniel Steinman, president of the U.S. Modern Pentathlon Association, only the best score of the two rides will figure in the final points. A selection committee of the USMPA will determine the Olympic team.

Outstanding competitors in each of the events were Stull and Losey, who won the fencing competition with 38 victories each for 1,021 points; Jorma Koepela (Finland), Lawrence Keyte (Canada) and Ehab El Libedy (Egypt) who rode for the only perfect 1,100 scores; Mike Gostigian (US), New Town Square, Pa., who won the swim with a time of 3:12.79 for 1,332 points; Daniele Masala (Italy) who beat out Glesnek by shooting a perfect 200 found for 1,132 points; Alex Watson (Australia), who clocked the fastest time in the run with a 12:47.73 for 1,261.81 points.

The best women's fencing and fastest running led Pernille Svarre (Denmark) to victory in the women's invitational competition.

Svarre won 40 out of 50 bouts in the fencing event for 1,110 points and ran the fastest time on the 2000-meter course. Her 6:48.96 was good for 1,255 points and the first place overall with 5,219 points. Svarre was the bronze medalist at the '83 women's world championships in Sweden.
