All will be judged on Triday. Trophies and awards will be presented to the winning livestock exhibitors at 1 p.m. Saturday, just prior to the livestock auction which begins at 1:30 p.m.

There are divisions for breads, cakes, pies, and cookies in the Bake Show, of which Mrs. Thomas H. Keese serves as superintendent. Judging of baked goods will begin at 9 a.m. Saturday, and awards will be presented to the winners prior to the auction of baked goods at 10:30 a.m.

The Farm Mechanics Project Show will consist of classes for livestock equipment, farm machinery, farm, home and yard conveniences, electrical projects, and trailers. Exhibits will be on display throughout the show.

Thomas H. (Bub) Keese, Show Superintendent, and Harvey Faris, Assistant Superintendent, invite the public to attend the show and sales. Food and drinks will be sold on the grounds by the Bandera County 4-H and Home Demonstration Clubs each day of the show.

It tells of the reaction of the American Congress and carries a eulogy to his friend delivered by John Adams, then the second president. Washington died on December 14, 1799, and this paper, published in January expresses the great loss felt by the

Nation as he was entombed in George Town at his beloved Mount Vernon on Dec. 20.

Mrs. Stemen and her husband are interested in printing, and can appreciate the excellent typography and writing in this early-day journal. The newspaper was on display at the ECHO office briefly, but is usually kept wrapped to prevent fading of the type, set partially with old-style lettering.

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



Wool And Lamb Producers

Wool and lamb producers must submit their sales slips from 1979 wool and unshorn lamb marketings and file an application before they can receive their incentive payments. County Executive Director, Ronnie W. Pendley, said producers have until January 31, 1980, to file and avoid late payments.

The support price for 1979 wool marketings is \$1.15 per pound. Pulled wool will continue to be supported at a level comparable to the support price for shorn wool through payment on unshorn lambs.

Shorn wool payments are based on a percentage of each producer's returns from sales. The percentage is the amount required to raise the national average price received by all producers for shorn wool in 1979 up to the support price of \$1.15 a pound. Shorn wool prices averaged between 80 and 85 cents per pound in 1978. Approximately 220 local pro-

Approximately 220 local producers have filed for their 1979 incentive payments.





USDA Proposes Measure To Help

Elderly and disabled people would be able to apply for food stamps at the same time they for Supplemental Security benefits (SSI) under rules proposed recently by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The new rule would make it possible for the Social Security Administration, which administers SSI benefits, to also accept food stamp applications. People applying for SSI would be able to apply for food stamps simultaneously if everyone in the house is applying for or receiving SSI benefits, and no one is already receiving food stamps.

The proposed rule, which implements a provision of the 1977 Food Stamp Act, could take effect as soon as next summer.

Currently, SSI recipients who want to apply for food stamps must go through a separate procedure. "This has placed a real burden on people who are elderly or disabled,' said Assistant Secretary Carol Tucker Foreman. "It may also be a reason why many elderly and disabled poor do not currently participate in the food stamp program. Processing food stamps and SSI applications jointly should be of real

assistance to these people."

The proposed regulations were published in the Federal Register on Friday, Dec. 7. Comments on the proposal must be received by January 22, 1980, and should be sent to Claire Lipsman, director, program development division, family nutrition programs, Food and Nutrition Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.



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

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Study Covers Aquifer Use

The Texas Department of Water Resources has published new report containing estimates of available ground water that is recoverable in Texas aquifers, including the Edwards Aquifer, on an average annual basis from 1980 through the year 2030.

Average annual ground-water availability from major and minor aquifers is estimated to range from approximately 10.2 million acre-feet in 1980 to 8.4 million acre-feet in the year 2030.

An acre-foot of water is the amount of water that would cover an acre to a depth of one

foot, or 325,851 gallons.
Titled "Gound-Water Availability in Texas-Estimates and Projections Through 2030," the report 2030," the report is available without charge from the Texas Department of Water Resources, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711. The report number is 238.

Major aquifers included in the study are the Ogallala, Carrizo-Wilcox, Edwards (Balcones Fault Zone), Trinity Group, Alluvium and Bolson Deposits, Gulf Coast, and the Edwards-Trinity (Plateau).

Retirees Need More Income

People planning ahead for their retirement should be aware that social security was never intended to offer a complete retirement income, Gilbert G. Gonzlaez, social security district manager in San Antonio, said recently.

Social security benefits provide a partial replacement of earned income lost or reduced because of the retirement, disability, or drath of a worker.

Some pension experts estimate that retirement income should be 60 to 70 percent of pre-retirement earnings in order for a retiree to maintain a standard of living similar to that before retirement.

Social security benefits generally provide 25 to 60 percent of pre-retirement earnings, depending on the in-dividual's earnings over the years. With an elegible husband or wife, benefits would be 3712 to 90 percent of the worker's previous earnings

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Number **Takes Eight Weeks**

Anyone who expects to need a security number should apply eight weeks before the number will be used, Gilbert G. ionzalez, social security district manager in San Antonio, said recently.

Evidence of a person's age, identity, and citizenship status is required at the time of application. In addition, anyone 18 or over must apply in person at a social security office

The best evidence of a person's age and citizenship tatus is a public or church record of birth recorded before the fifth birthday, or a bapfismal record recorded before age 5, Gonzalez said.

Many different documents can be used a provide identity, such as a driver's license, voter's card, some sort of ID card, club membership card, or similar items showing signature and personal infor mation

People born outside the United States should show their citizenship papers or immigra-tion documents.
