PROPANE PRICES ROLLED BACK

AUSTIN—Texas Attorney General John L. Hill was notified Monday, Feb. 11, that the Federal Energy Office has "rolled back" propane prices in response to the urgings of attorneys general of

revised F.E.O. interpretation of existing regulations regarding propane. And the Federal Energy Office also announced the beginning of an official investigation into the charges of a propane price manipulation.

The roll back of prices for propane produced after Jan. 31, 1974, to a May 15, 1973, base price should result in a substantial reduction of price, Hill said—perhaps, more than 30 percent of the current wholesale price, and should mean a saving of more than \$210 million for Texas users.

Attorney General Hill noted that an estimated 1,500,000 Texans residing in some 600,000 homes use the propane gas as a primary fuel source. In addition, Texas Liquefied Petroleum Gas Association figures indicate that 75 percent of all Texas farmers use this fuel for all agricultural production.

Hill recalled that when the Cost of Living Council ordered a ceiling in the spring of 1973 for 23 major oil companies, it did not set a ceiling for independents and brokers, causing an "artificial shortage." With the lifting of the ceiling in Phase II, the cost jumped in one year from 5.5c per gallon wholesale to 25c per gallon, upping the average consumer's cost from about 14 percent to 40c and more.

Assistant Texas Attorney General Frank Cooksey, who appeared with Arkansas Attorney General Jim Guy Tucker at the F.E.O.'s Feb. 6 hearing in Washington, D.C., noted that spiraling costs not only worked a hardship on persons of fixed incomes, but would force the price of farm produce to be increased.

Hill said the announced roll back "is a good example of results which can be attained when state attorneys general work together."

Ranch Town Not Stopped

A spokesman from the San Antonio office of the Ranch Town to be developed here has told an Echo editor that the rumor that developers had been enjoined from starting work—pending a Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals ruling—was unfounded, although it had got widespread publicity. A decision is expected about April 1.

Ranch Town—called officially San Antonio Ranch New Town—is to be a completely pre-planned small city of some 80,000 persons. It is to be on former ranchland

located between Bandera Road and Culebra one mile and a half west of Helotes on Highway 16.

Students Must Go To Nearest School Constitutional Convention

Northside Independent School District trustees have reaffirmed administrative policy which requires students to attend the school in the area where they live.

The Board's response came after a request from Mr. and Mrs. Carl Miles, Rt. 1, that their daughter be allowed to remain in Jay High School even though the family resides in the Marshall attendance area. Their request was denied.

In other Northside business, trustees were informed by District Engineer Tom Powell that construction progress on Boone Elementary will allow Boone students (who now attend class at Leon Valley and Thunderbird Hills) to move into the new school in Babcock North this spring.

The Northside Transportation Department told the trustees that eleven additional school buses would be needed if all eligible bus riders took advantage of bus transportation. Presently, 2,884

Northside High School students ride buses. An additional 2,376 high school students who live outside the 2-mile limit and could ride the bus provide their own transportation.

AUSTIN, Tex.—Public hearings continued this past week while Constitutional Convention delegates began talking about plans for writing various sections of the new Constitution.

The Local Governments Committee have approved their version of a section in the new Constitution which would allow counties to merge or change their boundaries with the approval of two-thirds of the voters. The Finance Committee agreed on a clause which designates that all real and personal property shall be taxed equally and uniformly.

The Education Committee approved a proposal that would allow the state legislature to appropriate the revenue of the Permanent School Fund for support of free public schools. The Legislative Committee has been hearing testimony on the frequency and duration of legislative sessions as well as the issue of pay for state lawmakers.

The House Chamber has been packed during the General Provision Committee's hearings on the "Right to Work" proposal. This proposal, which states that no person can be denied employment on account of membership or non-membership in a union, is one of the most controversial issues delegates have considered so far.

Sen. Nelson Wolff, chairman of the Submission and Transition Committee, set public hearings this week, to deal with the submission procedures to be used in presenting the convention's proposed constitution, the form of the ballot and the timing of the election.

UTSA Signs 1,171 For Spring Term

Official enrollment for the spring semester at the University of Texas-San Antonio is 1,171. During the fall semester 1,113 graduate students were enrolled.

In addition to the classes held in the Goliad Building in the Koger Executive Center on Loop 410, UTSA is conducting classes at the UT Health Science Center at San Antonio and at Randolph and Kelly Air Force Bases.

Hobby Cagers Show Wins

Twenty-five of the Hobby Middle School Seventh Grade Basketball Team finished Northside District play with a record of 16 wins and no losses. Overall, the Team won 27 games this season and lost two. Hobby coaches, Charlie Duke and Terry Hall, are college graduates and both are new to the Hobby athletic program this year.

Bexar County's professional engineers will stress the current energy crunch during National Engineers Week, Feb. 17-23.

Charles W. Edmundson, Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., engineer, 1974 chairman said that the nation's technological brainpower is not being fully utilized in the present crisis.

"We hope to get across the

painful truth that there is not enough fuel to support our citizens in the manner to which they have become accustomed," he added.

G. B. West Enters Dist. 57-H Race

G. B. West of 9165 Bandera Road in the Helotes-Leon Valley area has announced his candidacy for the position of State Representative District 57-H being vacated by Rep. Waylon Simmons who is not seeking re-election.

West entered the campaign Feb. 4 and is seeking to win the Democratic primary slated for May 4. He campaigned in 1972 against Simmons in a race which he said ended with his candidacy 200 votes short of the winner. He has also formerly run in a State race for the Railroad Commission.

A native of Florida, he is married, and has two boys. He served in the Marine Corps in the Second World War, and was a former Deputy Marshal in Colorado. He attended the Marine Corps Institute in Quantico, Virginia, during the War.

He has named Miss Lennie Block, a Leon Springs broker, as campaign manager for his present race.

West is a member of the Loyal Order of the Moose. He serves on the Board of Directors of the Texas Mobile Movers Assn. He is Vice President of Texas Mobile Homeowners Assn., and a member of the San Antonio chapter of the Texas Farm Bureau. He has been active in the P.T.A. at Leon Valley.

West says that he intends to take the personal approach in his campaign. He is also planning work with high school youths. He said that he is against the State income tax.

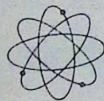

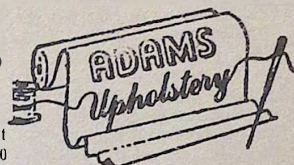

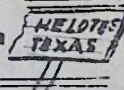

Mrs. Ben Zimmerlie in everyday life—nothing compares to the excitement and fun of a movie set on location.

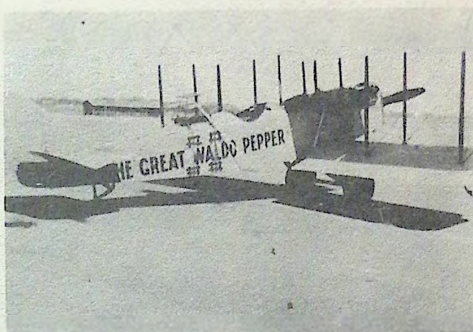
The picture is being made by Universal Pictures of Hollywood and will be ready for release sometime next Fall. The last location shots were completed during November and December at Zuehl Air Force Base between Seguin and San Antonio. It featured Elgin and surrounding towns such as Lockhart, Floresville, Fentress and many early model planes and trucks.

The film recreates a traveling air circus in the 1920's. It is entitled "The Great Waldo Pepper," and stars Robert Redford. Paul Newman and his son Scot Newman are among the directors.

All the fun of a midway with tents, and the humor inherent in the situation came alive during the shooting.

Mr. and Mrs. Zimmerlie own a 1925 Model T Ton Truck which will get a prominent spot. They are members of the Alamo Horseless Carriage Club which provided some of the props. Some 300 extras were on the set to provide a Texas touch. Mrs. Zimmerlie says that she doesn't speak any lines but that there was a talented young woman director who told them what to do.

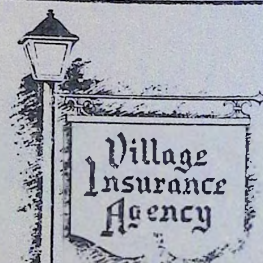

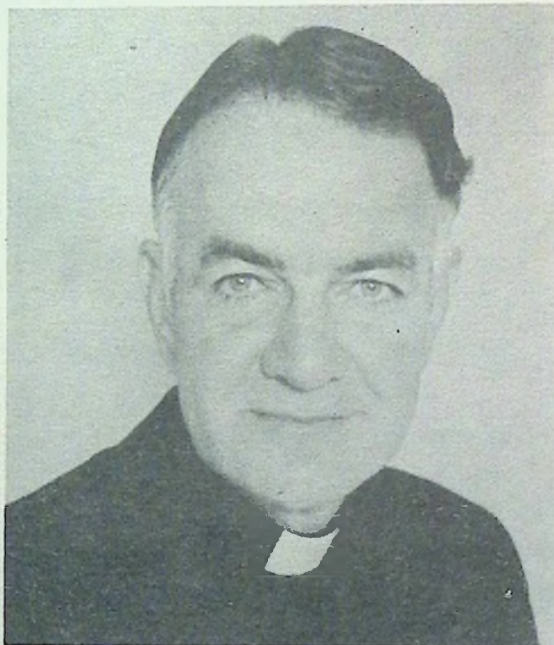
