#### Edwards Wells Rise

A "wet" November and a reduction in pumpage combined to put all index wells and springs in the Edwards Underground Water District on the "plus" side at the end of the month, the EUWD office here announced.

Wells gained from a frac-tion of a foot to as much as 5.7 feet throughout the fivecounty area, and all spring flow increased, Tom Fox, EUWD general manager, said.

Comal Springs at New Braunfels increased 36 cubic feet per second to a flow of 262 cfs, approaching the longterm average flow of 299 cfs. San Marcos Springs increased 14 cfs to a flow of 133 cfs, still below the longterm average of 168 cfs.

To the west, Leona River Springs at Uvalde were flowing 36 cfs, an increase of five cfs over the Oct. 14 reading. The Leona River Springs are measured every six weeks instead of monthly.

Following are the water well levels shown in altitude above mean sea level with the longterm recorded highs and lows in parentheses Uvalde: 876.8 feet, up 0.1 foot

(886.3 and 811.0). Castroville: 695.4 feet, up 4.3 feet (737.8 and 622.3).

Hondo: 724.6 feet, up 3.1 feet (773.8 and 662.3). San Antonio: 664.4 feet, up 5.7 feet (696.5 and 612.5).

#### UTSA To **Get Union** Building

The UT System Board of Regents has approved sale of \$6 million in UTSA combined fee revenue bonds to construct a University Center (student union building) at UTSA.

The Board of Regents will not formally issue the bonds until late 1983.

The Regents also approved a cross-town agreement among UTSA, Southwest Texas State University, Trinity University and the Commandant, Air Force ROTC to extend Air Force **ROTC** courses now available at UTSA to qualified students at Trinity University. In-struction will take place on the UTSA campus.

Fort Sam Houston's Military Museum will be closed on Christmas Day and New Year's Day, but open for the rest of the holiday period. #### **Christmas** Packages

preparing parcel post and other packages for mailing. Parcels will arrive at their intended destination in good shape if mailers will follow these suggestions:

Make sure contents are well-cushioned and there is no empty space in the box. Use crumpled newspaper around the items — including all sides, top and bottom. Commercially available foam shells or air-pocket padding also make good cushioning materials.

Just use your carton. Brown paper and twine cord are not necessary. Paper can rip, and twine can become entangled in processing equipment. Close your parcel with one

of the three recommended

types of tape: pressure sensitive, nylon-reinforced kraft paper, or glass-reinforced pressure sensitive.

Use smudge-proof ink for your addressing.

Put the recipient's address in the lower right portion of the container. Put your return address in the upper left hand corner. Remove all other labels from the box.

#### Living Is Cheaper In This Area

The cost of living in the San Antonio area again ranked the lowest among 11 cities with a population of more than 500,000 in the third quarter 1982 Cost of Living Index prepared by the Greater San Antonio Chamber of Commerce and the American Chamber of Commerce Researchers Association (ACCRA).

Living costs ranged from 30.9% above the national average in New York to 1.8% below the average in San Antonio. Nine of the 11 showed living costs above the U.S. average, which was based on price data collected for 248 cities of all sizes throughout the country.

Lori Killian sang special songs, favorites of the honored couple.






#### Absentee **Voting To** Begin

#### **Cowboy Exhibit Coming To San Antonio Institute**

The University of Texas Institute of Texas Cultures in San Antonio has been selected as one of four institutions to host "American Cowboy." a major new exhibition by the American Folklife Center of the Library of Congress.

"American Cowboy" examines the way the cowboy has been depicted in graphic art, fine arts, literature, film, music and advertising, and compares those portrayal to the reality of cowboy life in the 19th century and today.

Nearly 300 artifacts will be incorporated into the "American Cowboy" exhibit. Photographs, illustrations and cowboy equipment from spurs to branding irons detail the everyday reality of the cowboy through the years. The romantic legend is portrayed through diverse media such as original art by noted western artists Frederick Remington and Charles Russell, early stage and film posters, 35 lithographs, sheet music, film production stills, a jukebox with 30 cowboy songs and contemporary magazine advertisements, such as the original Marlboro Man

poster.

The exhibit will open in the Library of Congress Madison Building during the Spring of 1983, and will travel to four cities from December 1983 through 1984. December The Institute of Texas Cultures will be the first location outside of Washington, D.C., to host the exhibit.

"American Cowboy" will be on display at The Institute for eight weeks, from Dec. 1, 1983 to Jan. 31, 1984. After its stay in San Antonio, the exhibit will travel to the San Jose Museum of Art in California, the Denver Art Museum in Colorado and the Glenbow Museum in Calgary, Alberta, Canada.







#### Talented **Students Can Apply**

Applications are now being accepted for the summer 1983 Gifted and Talented Program at The University of Texas at San Antonio.

Currently in its fourth year, the program offers highly qualified high school students an opportunity to attend classes at UTSA for full college credit. Approximate-ly 125 students will be selected to study under an outstanding group of UTSA faculty. Each student will enroll in two courses, earning a total of four college credits. One course will be specific in nature such as archaeology, psychology, biology or art. The other will be an interdisciplinary study involving films, lectures and discussions. Classes will meet daily from May 30 to July 1.





"If you have an APO number, we can send it there," Delaney added. He and his staff at the sta-


He and his staff at the station are expecting 1,000 or more messages this month, "but we can handle as many as 400 per day if necessary."
