Wells Hold **High Levels**

Water well levels throughout most of the Edwards Underground Water District declined slightly during August, the district office has announced.

The drop followed several weeks of scant rainfall from mid-June to mid-August, but all wells in the area are still above their long-term averages, Tom Fox, EUWD general manager, said.

Spring flow was off a scant eight cubic feet per second at New Braunfels, with Comal Springs flowing 322 cfs at the end of August, compared with an average of 285 cfs. San Marcos Springs declined only one cubic foot per second to a flow of 271 cfs. The average there is 166 cfs.

Social Security Checks Get New Look

U.S. Treasury checks for people getting supplemental security income will have a new look starting with the checks issued Sept. 1, William M. Archuleta, social security district manager in San Antonio, has stated.

The front of the checks will

still be gold, Archuleta said, but the back of the checks will be buff color with orange printing. Starting in late 1981 or early 1982 social security checks will be green on the front, buff color on the back with orange printing.

The change is being made

to increase the effectiveness of the Treasury Department's check microfilming operation.



Lyon Announces -For Mayor



Mr. Bennie H. Lyon, native Texan and a resident of Helotes for the past 18 years, formally announced his candidacy to become the first Mayor of the City of Helotes, and earnestly solicits the help and support of every individual who wishes Helotes to remain "Helotes."

Mr. Lyon came to Helotes in 1964, from Nacogdoches, Texas, by way of Austin, Albuquerque, Salt Lake City, Denver, Omaha, Washington D.C., Tampa, Florida, Waco, Tripoli, Libya, and San Antonio

In his family are: wife, Modesta, married 38 years; sons, John and wife Kay and Robert and wife Cynthia. John is a physicist with NASA at Goddard, Md. Bob is a photogrammetrist in San Antonio. Bob and Cynthia both are members of the Helotes Methodist Church.

Bennie started career as rodman and chainman in survey parties in 1935, progressed to instrument man and surveyor then party chief and finally left the Federal government in 1946 as Professional Photogrammetric Engineer. He then went into employment in the private practice of Photogrammetry, as Operations Manager and Engineering Director of a major company, in responsible charge of very large projects in the United States, Mexico, Libya, Egypt, Spain, Alaska, and many others.

Lyon started his own company, United Aerial Mapping, in 1957, beginning 16 years of competition with his own industry and with the Federal government. The government competition was the fiercest of all, since that competition was using our money and did not need to show a profit!

Many successful mapping projects were completed nationwide and United was sold to a major company in 1972, and Lyon remained as Chairman and President while becoming Chairman of two other mapping companies within this corporate group, as well as a member of the Board of Directors of the Parent Company.

In 1977 Mr. Lyon retired from active participation in the mapping business, except to remain as Advisory Board Member of the parent com-

He organized Lyon Enterprises in Helotes, which heads up a Health Food Store, B. H. Lyon & Sons, and Skye Island Corporation. He has been active in civic enterprises such as Helotes Merchants Association, Homeowners Association, financially supported and sponsored Helotes Children's Soccer, also financially supported the Volunteer Fire Company and the Helotes Festival Association.

Lyon states that he feels that his efforts on behalf of organizing and obtaining a charter for the Helotes State Bank as well as financial support is probably his most important lasting contribution so far to our town. Mr. Lyon is Vice Chairman of Helotes

Edwards To **Build Dam**

A 1981-82 budget of \$1,017,394, more than half of it committed to recharge of monitoring projects, was adopted Tuesday by the directors of the Edwards Underground Water District.

The budget includes \$420,000 for construction of a flood water retarding structure on Seco Creek in Medina County, and \$25,000 to fund preliminary investigations for new recharge projects.

The new budget increases from \$90,000 to \$110,000 the funding for monitoring stations, with the EUWD taking over four stations paid for the past two years by the Bureau of Reclamation.

In other business, the EUWD directors gave strong support to the water trust fund legislation passed as a constitutional amendment in the special session of the Texas Legislature. A resolution was adopted urging residents of the Edwards Aquifer area to support passage on Nov. 3 of the amendment which authorizes the use of a portion of excess state revenues for water development, water conser-vation, water quality enhancement and flood control purposes

The resolution states the district recognizes there is substantial growth in Texas, particularly in the Edwards Aquifer area, with increasing demand upon





A Report From The Helotes Area Volunteer Fire Dept., Inc.

The Helotes Area Volunteer Fire Department, Inc. is at the beginning of a new fiscal year which means we will again be looking to the citizens of the Helotes area for financial support. Last year we received donations from 437 individuals and businesses out of a possible 1,450 and this year we hope to see that number surpassed.

This past year has seen many long overdue improvements to the department and we have met just about every goal we had set. We have renovated the fire station with a new roof, new paint inside and out, new overhead doors, carpeting in the meeting room, and miscellaneous training materials and equipment. All of the firefighters are equipped with new turnout gear (coats, boots, helmets, and gloves) and all of the trucks are completely operational. We were able to send one of our firefighters to the Texas A&M fire training school and we will be sending one to the certified arson investigation school at SAC. The reason for sending personnel to these schools is so that the training can be brought back and given to the rest of the members.

All of the above was made possible by the response of those people who donated funds to the department. It is important to know that we are a non-profit, 100% volunteer organization completely dependent on donations. We do not receive any regular support from any governmental agency other than \$300 from Bexar County on a contract with them to provide fire protection to this section of Bexar County. That by itself won't pay the normal operating expenses. At this time, nothing has been negotiated with the new city of Helotes for providing fire protection so contrary to what some people are saying, no part of our Helotes city taxes are scheduled to go to the fire department. Also, the fire department is an incorporated, non-profit business and is now and will continue to be completely separate from the City of Helotes with absolutely no control by the city. In other words, we still need the support of each and every resident

of each and every resident.

In response to some rather negative comments we have heard, yes we have received approval for a \$75,000.00 federal loan (we do have to pay it back—5% interest for 15 years) to be used to purchase a new fire truck. This project was undertaken by the fire department and is an obligation of the fire department, NOT the City of Helotes. With the number and size of new homes and businesses being built in our area, there is no way the equipment we are now operating can handle the types of fires we can expect to occur. The fire department is assuming this obligation and we feel confident we can meet it if donations stay at the level they have been during our last fiscal year. This is not an obligation lightly taken. Much thought and effort has been put into it by a lot of people and it is being undertaken strictly as an asset and benefit to our community.

We have a great group of folks in our department—18 active firefighters (men and women) backed by an outstanding auxiliary (men and women) who give additional support with fundraising activities, station maintenance, and food and drink support when necessary at fire scenes. Everyone is extremely dedicated and working toward the goal of making ours the best volunteer department in Bexar County. We welcome new members and encourage anyone interested to attend any of our regular meetings (1st and 3rd Wednesdays of each month at 7:30 p.m. and the 4th Friday at 9 a.m. for the firefighters; 2nd Monday of each month at 9:30 a.m. for the Auxiliary). Come on by — give it a try — you might like it!



Antiques Go To Institute

A collection of more than 100 items of antique medical equipment has been given to the University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures by the UT Health Science Center.

Items include a tonsil guillotine, mahogany medicine cabinet, screw tourniquet, wax hand, doctor's bag with instruments, and others.

Grant Aids Study Of Disease Cause

A federal grant of nearly a quarter of a million dollars has been awarded The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio for study of a microorganism that has increasingly recognized as an important cause of human disease.

Researcher Dwight Williams, M.D., assistant professor of medicine, division of infectious diseases, will use the three-year grant of \$244,689 from the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases to study a microorganism called Clamydia trachomatis.

"Clamydia pneumonia in infants three to 11 weeks of age and venereal disease in adults," Williams said. "It's also a cause of pneumonia in adults whose natural immune defenses have been weakened by cancer or cancer therapy."

Because Clamydia infection is not reportable in this country, it is not known exactly how many people it affects, but it is believed to be quite common. Among the problems it causes are urethritis and infections of the cervix and fallopian

High Blood Pressure Causes Sought

An estimated 40 million Americans suffer from high blood pressure (hypertension).

This disease is characterized most commonly by increased blood volume and increased nervous system function, and can lead to a number of health problems. Among the most serious are heart attacks and stroke. Together, these killed an estimated 791,200 people in the U.S. in 1979, according to the American Heart Association. In Texas, heart attack was the leading cause of death in 1980, killing more than 37,000 people.

While hypertension is a common ailment, the cause and mechanisms of the disease still are not clearly understood.

A young researcher at The University of Texas Health Science Center here has received a New Investigator Research Award from the National Institutes of Health (Heart, Blood and Lung Institute) to study cause of hypertension.






