Sales Tax Referendum On Ballot

To vote Saturday, Helotes residents will need to go to:

The polls will be open in each place from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Only persons living within the city limits of Helotes may vote in the city election. Persons throughout the greater Helotes area may vote in the school board race. And only persons living within the water district boundaries may vote in that election

The first Helotes city election will determine the mayor and five city council members for the next two years. The election of city officials held last November was a special election to provide officials until the regular day for city elections in Texas on April 3.

The current mayor, Tom Beatty, has filed for reelection, and is opposed by Chuck Lee, Bennie Lyon and Frank Thompson

The five incumbent council members also have filed for re-election. They are Guy Burnett, Leonard Hill, Reudy Loeffler, Verna Thompson and Pat Wootton. Two challengers have filed—Pete Cantu and Mike Krisak.

Also on the city election ballot is a referendum on a 1 percent sales tax for Helotes. However, some political observers doubt that the vote on the referendum will be legal since neither a public hearing nor advertising of the proposed referendum preceded its being placed on the ballot.

In the school board election two positions are to be filled out of seven candidates. For Place 1 they are Nellie Reddix, the incumbent, and Kay Brown, Alice Asher and Walter J. Geraghty. For Place 2 they are Harry Cunningham, the incumbent, and Mrs. Lee Applegate and Dr. Gerald P. Burns.

The water board election also is to fill two places. The incumbent is Joe Shaffer, and the other candidates are Bee Geisler and Harry Sherblom.

Circle A Trail Gatebuster

Meantime, Mrs. Mullins has announced the opening of Helotes Used Cars on Circle A Trail adjacent to her real estate office. She also has filed a law suit against the city over the zoning of her property and has asked that the ordinance be declared void.

Dear Editor,

Helotes, Texas

Ten long years have passed since the American prisoners came home from the prisons of North and South Vietnam. Yet the fate of more than 2,400 other American servicemen and civilians still remains unknown.

Many delegations both official and unofficial have been to Vietnam and other parts of Southeast Asia seeking an accounting. To date the only results has been the release of 92 sets of remains, most of whom were known to have been deceased before 1973 and consequently could have been returned at that time.

In recent years there have been more than 390 firsthand reports of "live Americans still in captivity throughout Southeast Asia," and our government continues to investigate. In addition there is irrefutable evidence that the remains of more than 400 men are being stored in a warehouse in Hanoi.

For the families of those men the war cannot truly be over until there is the fullest possible accounting. Each one is very realistic and thus prepared to accept the finality of death, however, what they cannot and indeed should not be expected to accept, is a declaration of death based on speculation. If it is true that Americans are still being held against their will in Southeast Asia — and our government's policy states "the weight of evidence indicates that they are — then we must do everything possible to see to it that those men are not abandoned.

The daughter of one of the missing men expressed it succinctly! "I need to know if my father lives or is dead. I need to welcome him home with open arms or carry flowers to his grave. I need to know that he lies sleeping in a comfortable bed or in a peaceful hallowed ground." She expresses the feelings that have haunted the families of those brave men, some for as long as 17 years.

for as long as 17 years.

Beyond the need of the families to secure the accounting, there are two more extremely important reasons why it must be achieved. First, for our country, our government, it is a matter of honor. Secondly and even more importantly, for all of us as caring people, it is a matter of humanity. We must see to it that the fullest possible accounting is obtained.

Won't you express your deep concern for your fellow Americans to your elected officials and the Vietnamese ambassador to the United Nations? These men and their families are depending on you.





Grey Forest Doctor Develops New Alcoholism Treatments

The following article is about the work a Grey Forest resident, Dr. Raymond Costello, who is a member of the faculty of the psychiatry department at the Health Science Center here. Dr. Costello has received international recognition for his work in alcoholism. (His wife, Sandra Schneider Costello, also is a researcher at the Health Science Center and formerly was a member of the Grey Forest city council.) The following article was written by Mike Lawrence for Texas Times, a publication of The University of Texas System, for the March issue

Please release me, let me go, for I don't love you anymore. To waste our lives would be a sin:

release me, and let me love

Was this popular song lyric written by an alcoholic about the hold that alcohol had on his life?

One day some years ago, a man who claimed to have written "Please Release Me" and other popular songs in-cluding "Mr. Sandman" literally crawled onto the alcohol treatment ward at Audie Murphy Memorial Veterans Hospital.

Recalls Raymond Costello, Ph.D., associate professor or psychiatry at The University Texas Health Science Center and assistant director of the therapeutic community for alcoholics at the VA hospital,"The man had damaged his brain with alcohol to the extent that he couldn't stand up. The motor functioning of his hands was still good, however, and he was an excellent piano player.'

By the end of his 42-hour stay on the ward, which is the standard length of time for the program, the patient was able to walk out of the hospital, "although he had to keep his feet widely separated," Costello

Some time later, the doctor reports, the man went on a drinking binge and died.

"Alcohol abusers vary in their response to treatment," Costello says. "We have found that our program is as high as 60 percent successful with some patients and as low as 20 percent successful with others."

To arrive at his unique blend of treatment modalities, Costello reviewed alcohol treatment programs throughout the world. His findings were recently quoted in a BBC television documentary on alcoholism broadcast in Great Britain.

Based on his surveys, as well as on experiences at the VA hospital, the doctor and his colleagues have produced a treatment difficulty scale which gives them a method for predicting how successful treatment in their program will be.

'We count the number of life problems shown to be important in published findings on alcoholism," Costello explains. "The more of these an individual patient has, the more treatment will be needed and the poorer the chances of complete recovery."

Some of these factors are employment status over the past two years, financial independence, marital status, medical status, psychiatric status other than from the alcohol itself.

A married, employed patient in relatively good physical and mental health has a much better opportunity to benefit from any treatment program, the doctor believes. The program he supervises is operated as a

therapeutic community.
"Alcoholics treated in an in-patient setting where only physical symptoms are emphasized realize very little good in the long run," Costello says. "In our approach, we treat 30 patients on the ward for six weeks. In group sessions, we watch the way patients relate to the emerging society of the

"As we comment about what we see, the patients begin to realize that their actions in the hospital community are similar to their actions outside. They then begin to observe their own behavior more realistically and can practice behaving differently in the hospital so as to make changes on the outside more easily, Costello says.

In small groups, patients tell the story of their lives to one another.

"Initially, the stories are fragmented because the patients are emotionally upset and because of alcohol's ef-

fects on memory," Costello notes. "Gradually, the stories begin to make more sense and the patients begin to understand better the purposefulness or lack of it in the way they have been living their lives.

Costello credits Drs. Jacques Baillargeon and James Lee, also San Antonio health science center faculty members, with maintaining staff morale and creating an atmosphere of healthy attitudes about living.

The doctors view alcoholics as living their lives in a socially fragmented way. The more important alcohol is, the less socially integrated alcoholics are.

We look for substitutes for alcohol's effects," Costello says. "If alcohol obliterated memories, we look for someone who will listen to those memories. If it helped to pass the time, we try to find ac-tivities to fill the time."

"Many of these patients do not confide in anyone and have no friends," Costello says. "For one of our sessions, each patient is asked to bring their spouse or a significant friend or relative to the meeting. One patient went out on the street and found a wino-a total stranger-and brought him to the meeting. We went ahead and worked with this man in the group. It was good for all of us. I know it showed me something about one alcoholic's social patterns."

Many alcoholics also have very disturbed sleep patterns

alcoholic wakes up nearly as tired and troubled as when he first went to sleep," says. "It's hard for them to keep nighttime fantasies separate from daytime thoughts, because their sleep-wake cycle is so disrupted."

The doctor notes that many alcoholics acquire a psychiatric diagnosis suggestive of serious thought disorders because they are interviewed when they have not been sleeping well.



Better To Skip 'Toys' For Easter

With Easter fast approaching, Paula Moore, president of the local humane organization, Man and Beast, Inc., cautions against buying live chicks, ducklings and "bunnies" for youngsters to treat as "toys."

"The baby animals are almost certain to die within a few weeks if not sooner," said Moore. "Often they are given to children who are too young to know any better who literally squeeze the life out of these delicate creatures."

Also a hazard for the baby animals, she said, is figuring out what to do with them after the youngsters lose interest. In the end, many of the creatures are deliberately abandoned in San Antonio fields, woods or ponds. Some are dropped off at animal shelters in the vain hope that "someone" will adopt them. "The reality is," she said, "that they will be put to death along with all the otherwise."

"There is also a possible health hazard for both the youngsters who receive these Easter animals and for their parents," Moore noted. "That cute, fluffy little creature may be harboring infectious salmonella, which can cause diarrhea, fever and severe enteritis."

FAULTY VALVES LEAD TO VARICOSE VEINS

If man had four legs, he would be less concerned with varicose veins, But he is short a couple, and his upright stance places greater stress on the veins of his legs.

This is particularly true of occupations that require prolonged standing. Police officers, dentists, surgeons and cooks are susceptible to varicose veins.

These swollen, thin-walled blood vessels appear just under the skin of the legs. Blood is flowing backwards into the veins from above because their valves are not keeping the circulation going toward the heart. Pressure

builds and the legs swell.

The Texas Medical Association says deeper veins within the leg often can compensate for the shallower, varicose veins and maintain circulation without significant swelling. But if the deep veins also have faulty valves, swelling increases and more varicose veins may develop.

The problem of weak valves may be inherited. And diseases, such as phlebitis, can destroy valves and lead to the enlarged veins.

Varicose veins often develop in pregnant women because of the increased amount of blood in the body. The problem usually goes


away after delivery.

The common first symptom of varicosity is the veins protuding from the leg. Other signs include fatigue in the leg muscles, cramps and tenderness near the swollen veins, and a feeling of congestion in the veins. In later stages, the skin of the legs become may deeply pigmented and ulcerated.

Treatment includes surgery to remove the veins just under the skin's surface or more-risky injections that harden the vein to block it off. With either method, the goal is to remove the varicose veins from the leg's circulatory system so it can per-form better.

Complications arising from varicose veins can be prevented by wearing sup-port stockings to reduce the pressure on the veins, elevating the legs above the heart level daily, avoiding long periods of standing, exercising lightly (swimming, cycling, walking, dancing, golf), and not wearing tight garters or girdles.

Fire Ants Committee

State Representative Dan Kubiak says campers and picnickers have virtually abandoned Stephen F. Austin State Park in San Felipe County because of heavy fire ant infestation...And at Washington-on-the-Brazos, areas around picnic tables and other facilities are being treated on a regular basis to keep the historic park safe for visitors.

Kubiak, chairman of the Select Committee on Fire Ants, says fire ants don't recognize man-made boun-daries and invade the state's

parks as readily as farm and ranch land. "It was already difficult to estimate the dollar damage to crop and grazing lands," Kubiak says, and now we have to add in the loss of tourist dollars if the pest spreads into state parks." He says it's important to insure that stateowned lands be written into any treatment program the state adopts.

Kubiak says there are 67 state parks in the 109 infested counties containing over 78 thousand acres. (78,693) not including land around state

owned lakes and reservoirs or national parks. "I have already invited the Parks Department to send a representative to the next hearing before the Select Committee on Fire Ants to help us determine which areas have already been affected and to pinpoint areas in danger of infestation,

Kubiak says Texas must find out what Brazil is doing in fire ant control, since the pest brought no disease or natural enemies along when it landed in Mobile, Alabama,



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

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

Another of the homes featured on the Boerne Area Historical Preservation Society Historical Tour on Sunday, May 2, 1982, will be the Erna Davis Pioneer House located at 103 E. Kronkosky.

It is typical of the frontier homes of the 1860's. The house was built by Johannes F. Stendebach who immigrated to Texas from Germany in 1852. Mr. Stendebach was noted for his rock work, and the house is

built of handhewn stone and has cypress flooring.

There have been several owners of the Pioneer house, including Mrs. Mary Dienger who lived there from 1921 to 1961. Mr. and Mrs. Harry Davis bought the house and restored it in 1965, and added a kitchen and bath.

The house originally consisted of the first two rooms with a back porch and a shed behind the house. The stairway to the loft was on the outside of the building as

Sunday houses were built in those days.

Mrs. Davis has fulfilled a longtime dream by restoring the home to its original decor. Each piece of furniture has been carefully selected and the home is now decorated with authentic antiques from spinning wheels to cradle, old wood beds, milk safe and crescent wood stove. A cozy fireplace

nestles in the corner of the

parlor.

Another of the places of interest on the Boerne Historical Tour sponsored by the Boerne Area Historical Preservation Society which will be held on Sunday, May 2, 1982, is the Theis House, located at 104 Newton Street, behind Bergmann's Lumber Company, 235 So. Main Street.

The Theis House is the best preserved early frontier home in Boerne. It was built in 1858 by Phillip Jacob Theis, a blacksmith and wheelwright who immigrated from Germany in 1855. The Theis house was one of ten residential structures existing in Boerne in 1858.

Visitors can see the original chink and daubing construction, hand hews beams, willow reeds for lattice, adobe with straw for plaster, some rock construction and an old style cedar fencing.


Newton Street, adjoining the south boundary of the Theis property, was initially surveyed in 1852 as a public access to the Cibolo Creek. It was left open for the use of bucket brigades and later fire hoses when there was a fire in town.

Mr. Theis operated his blacksmith shop under a mulberry tree in his front yard. Jacob Theis and his wife, Margaretha, raised seven children in the Theis home. One son, August Theis, took over his father's blacksmith shop and he and his wife, Agnes, lived in this house, where they also raised seven children.

Theis who died in 1879, was one of the signers of the petition to create Kendall, County in 1859. August Theis, a son, was an officer in the state militia in the 1870's, during which time the old Theis homestead was used as an armory for the militia's guns and ammunition.

The youngest of the August Theis children is Max H. Theis, a loved Boerne senior citizen, who has been a lifelong resident, businessman and civic leader in the city. He and his lovely wife, Laura Bell, live at 119 E. Evergreen, in Boerne.

Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Bergmann are the present owners of the Theis house, and have restored it to its original state, complete with furnishings of that period. The house is filled with antiques and family mementos, providing a fascinating look into Boerne's past.

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
