## **Bond Election To Be** Held Sept. 25

A county road bond issue to raise \$31 million for repairing existing roads, make drainage and safety improvements and acquire additional right-of-way will be included on the Sept. 25 special election ballot.

Matching state funds, on a four-to-one ratio, will increase the value of the bond project to approximately \$127 million.

#### **Edwards** Wells Drop

well throughout the five-county Edwards Underground Water District declined during July, the EUWD office has announced.

The levels continued their summer drop because of lack of rainfall, extreme heat and increased water use, Tom Fox, EUWD general

manager, said. Noting that the San Antonio index well dropped 7.4 feet to a level of 651.5 feet at the end of July, Fox said the reading was only 9.3 feet above the level reached during the drought of 1980.

'The district is urging everyone to adopt prudent conservation practices at this time," Fox said. "While there is not yet an alarming situation, we feel that conservation, even in times of plentv. makes good sense.

Spring flow also dropped. Comal Springs at New Braunfels were flowing 250 cubic feet per second, down 54 cfs from June and substantially below the longterm average flow of 299 cfs. San Marcos Springs also remained below the average of 168 cfs with a July flow of 127 cfs, down three cfs.

Well levels west of San Antonio showed smaller declines, compared to large drops in June, as seasonal irrigation slacked off. But Fox stated the continuation of drought-like conditions will mean heavier muncipal consumption as residents use more water for lawn and garden irrigation.

#### Northside **Readies For Opening**

Northside School District kicked off the 1982-83 school year Tuesday at Paul Taylor Field House when Superintendent Jack C. Jordan welcomed 2,300 professional staff, including 200 new teachers, during a general assembly which began four days of inservice training. 34,500 students are expected to begin classes in 42 Northside schools (including four new ones) on Tuesday, Aug. 24.

The Northside school board sold \$8 million worth of bonds at its meeting Monday night. The money will be used to buy land for a new high school and middle school and to finance additions and renovations at existing schools. The bonds were part of a \$481/2 million bond issue approved by district voters in

#### **Bible Study Open To All**

A new method of disciplined Bible study will begin Sept. 12 at University United Methodist Church. Open to the entire community, it will be led by the pastor, Rev. Stephen Wende.

"We believe the time is right for a systematic and thorough Bible study for laypersons," said Rev. Wende. "This study will emphasize knowing what the Bible says as a basis for what it means." Not intended as "mere devotional or occasional material," the course will require the student to attend weekly classes, complete daily assignments and prepare for brief examinations.

However, the approach is neither heavy nor scholastic. Unique visual learning aids, cartoons and memory techniques present abstract Biblical concepts in

memorable form.

"The Hebrews knew how to use visual aids — they are scattered throughout the Bible," noted Rev. Wende. "We believe these are in good taste, and they will fix the important personalities and events in the mind."

The course is structured in semesters, each ten weeks in length, beginning with surveys of the Old and New Testaments, followed by depth studies of every section of the Bible.

The first session on Sunday, Sept. 12, will run from 7 to 8:30 p.m. Pre-registration is necessary and a fee of \$10 for materials is required. Child care is available. University United Methodist Church is located at 5084 De Zavala Rd.

## **Aquifer Hearings Draw Fire**

Opposition to legislation limiting pumpage from wells over the Edwards Aquifer was expressed by persons attending the regional forum Wednesday night in Uvalde sponsored by the Edwards Underground Water District.

Uvalde spokesmen also opposed any plan which would have residents of areas outside San Antonio help pay for surface water for San Antonio.

Seventy-five persons, most of them from Uvalde, attended the forum, the third scheduled by the EUWD this summer. The fourth forum will be held at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 1, in the Hondo High School audio-visual room, Tom Fox, EUWD general manager, has announced.

In Uvalde, Oliver O. Haas of New Braunfels, vice chair-man of the EUWD board, presented his personal plan which states, "I would use surface water in conjunction with Edwards water to be able to insure a safe yield level of operation of the Edwards underground reservoir. This would insure spring flow and maintain the ecology of the entire system as nature intended."

Haas also stated, "I would propose to pay for the surface water supplement to be used

in conjunction with the Edwards water by adding a water adjustment cost each and every user of Edwards water, or a mixture of both surface and ground water, or ground water

John W. White of Uvalde, executive director of the Nueces River Authority, expressed opposition to limiting pumpage from the Edwards by a change in the state's water laws and said, "There is an urgent need to develop supplies of surface water for the San Antonio area."

White expressed the belief that agribusiness should be accorded a higher priority in the use of surface water.

"There is no valid reason," he said, "why the irrigation of lawns, washing of cars and use of water for swimming pools should be given the highest priority ahead of irrigation of lands for the purpose of growing life-sustaining food and fibers."

White said that approximately half of the water for domestic and municipal purposes goes to the watering of lawns, washing cars and for swimming pools and said the San Antonio metroplex should pay its own way in obtaining the additional water it requires to continue its inevitable municipal and industrial growth.

Mayor John Harrell of Uvalde also placed priority on the production of food and fiber and spoke against legislation limiting pumpage from the Edwards.

Robert Van Dyke, general manager of the San Antonio City Water Board and only representative from the city to attend the forum, assured-the group at the Uvalde meeting the City Water Board would also oppose any ground water regulation and pointed out that the CWB had never sought outside funds to pay for surface water for the

city.
Van Dyke has participated in all three forums sponsored by the EUWD.


At this time it is suggested that all citizens check doors and windows for easy entry, and be alert to possible prowlers in the area.

Graveside services for Elgin Theodore Wehmeyer, 69, of Hilltop Village, who died this month in Kerrville were held in the Garden of Memories, Pastor David Lilly of Zion Lutheran Church officiated.

A Kerrville resident for 10 years, Mr. Wehmeyer was born July 26, 1913 in Fredericksburg. He moved to Kerrville from Alice. He was a fabrication welder and a graduate of Main Avenue High School in San Antonio and Oklahoma A&M University where he received a degree in petroleum engineering. He worked for Continental Oil Co. in Ponca City, Okla. until 1943. When he returned to Kerrville in 1951 he opened a welding shop. He moved to Casper, Wyo. where he helped plan and build the first high pressure compressor plant in Wyoming. His marriage to the former Frances Leinweber took place in Ingram on May 24, 1936. Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Frances L. Wehmeyer of Harper; sons, Ted Wehmeyer of Dripping Springs; Glenn and Steve Wehmeyer of Harper; brother, Werner Wehmeyer of Kerrville; two grandaughters; and a daughter Mrs. Elaine Lozier of Harper. Mr. Wehmeyer, a cousin of Mrs. Walter (Adelia) Schuh of Helotes grew up here where he has many

#### New Phone Book Has 1,603 Listings

Distribution of the 1982 Helotes telephone directory has begun. The new directory contains 11 white pages and 29 yellow pages. It has 1,603 white pages listings, said Marcus Semmelmann, district manager for Southwestern Bell.

The cover features a sculpture by retired Southwestern Bell lineman Gerald Sanders of Pampa. The bronze sculpture, titled "After The Storm," authentically details a telephone lineman repairing a pole and crossarm damaged by a 1949 ice storm that swept through West Texas.

Each residential customer will receive one copy of the directory. Additional copies may be obtained by calling any Southwestern Bell business office or visiting any PhoneCenter after Sept. 1, Semmelmann said.

Approximately 4,381 directories will be printed. Of that, 2,178 directories will be delivered to customers by Sept. 1. Extra books are for customers moving into the area throughout the year and customers requesting additional copies, Semmelmann said.

One new feature in the directory is the Customer Guide section in the front of the directory. It contains helpful information on types of service as well as discount rates for Long Distance calling.

Customers may notice however, a typographical error on Page 18 in the new section under "Rates within Texas." It shows a call from Helotes to San Antonio being a Long Distance call. This is a mistake. There is no Long Distance charge for this call.

In "After The Storm," the bronze sculpture shown on the cover of the 1982 Helotes directory, Sanders recreates

the lineman's leather cap, body belt, boots, gaffs (boot spikes), and other tools of his trade in authentic detail.

Sanders said he was "tickled to death," when Southwestern Bell officials told him the artwork would be featured on 1982 directories across the state.

The sculpture was done "entirely from memory," Sanders said.

"I was there in 1949 after that storm brought down nearly 300 miles of wire between Midland and El Paso," he said. "I didn't intend that sculpture to look like anyone in particular, but after I finished I realized it looked a lot like an old boy I climbed poles with 30 years ago," Sanders added.

Southwestern Bell commissioned the sculpture for display in the company's new state headquarters building in Dallas.

Sanders has won numerous awards for his bronze sculptures. His works include a collection of elk horn carvings.

# **Teachers Get Raise**

Northside district trustees have approved the 1982-83 teacher salary schedule with raises averaging 10.06% for bachelor degree teachers and 10.85% for teachers with master's degrees. Bachelor degree teacher salaries will range from a beginning salary of \$14,000 to \$24,276 for those with 22 years experience. Master's degree teachers will begin at \$15,000 and will go up to \$27,706 for those with 29 years experience.

The state minimum salary scale ranges from \$11,110 to \$19,260 for BA degree teachers and from \$11,888 to \$21,100 for MA degree teachers:

According to Superintendent Jack C. Jordan, "The board-approved salary schedule is very competitive, helping Northside to attract and hold teachers of the highest quality."

#### Six members of an Environmental Studies class in UTSA's graduate school who have been making a study of the city of Helotes

this summer reported their findings at a recent meeting of the city planning and zoning commission called by Tom Powell, chairman of the commission.

Their study included water and sewage service for Helotes, the National Flood Insurance Program and flood plain regulation, street system inventory, subdivision regulations, possible city code requirements, future population and historical preservation.

The six members of the class are Rosie Castro, Gordon Browning, Richard Delgado, Luis Salazar, Henry Romo and Kathy Komray. The project was under the direction of Professor Robert Ashcroft.

The group counted 491 dwellings within the city boundaries and projected that the current population is approximately 1,473 persons. They counted 120 vacant lots in Helotes Park Estates and 78 in Helotes Ranch Acres, and predicted the maximum possible growth without multi-family housing to be no more than 1,000 additional persons before the town is 'filled up.'

Students returning to Northside District secondary schools are being informed by letter of policy amendments designed to create a school environment where maximum learning can occur without distraction.

Addressing serious role infractions, the new policies specify expulsion from the Northside District for the rest of the school year as punishment for any student involved with drugs, alcohol, weapons or assault on district personnel.

According to Board President Raul B. Fernandez, "By dent Haul B. Fernandez, "By spelling out school rules and clearly defining punishment for infractions, students will know where their responsibility lies. We expect to significantly reduce discipline problems. The board seeks to underscore its position that teachers doing position that teachers doing this nation's biggest and most important job have the support of administrators and patrons committed to educational achievement. Students devoted to receiving a good education do not deserve to be hindered by classmates unwilling to con-centrate on the same effort."

Specific policies adopted by the board provide: Expulsion for the rest of

the school year for any student knowingly possessing, handling or transmitting any object that can be considered a weapon;

Expulsion for the rest of the school year for any student guilty of assault on

district personnel; Expulsion for the rest of the school year for any student knowingly in possession of, selling or attempting to sell, or under the influence of alcohol, marijuana, alcohol, marijuana, hallucinogenic drugs, nar-cotics, or other illegal drugs or controlled substances

Although similar policies regarding assault and weapons have been enforced by the school board in the past, expulsion has usually been the penalty for selling drugs and not always the penalty for possession of be-

ing "under the influence of" alcohol or drugs. Past penalties for possession have included police and parent notification and suspension up to 10 days, or assignment to an alternate educational facility.

The policies apply to school-sponsored activities away from campuses and at other district facilities as well as "at school." Most school discipline

policies and the Texas Education Code use the term "suspension" to mean any length of time away from school of from one to many months. The board's use of the term "expulsion" strengthens its position on the student's responsibility and defines anticipated board action in discipline cases, although due process hearing procedures to deter-mine the specifics of rule

According to Fernandez, "We expect violations of school rules and laws to drop significantly, as we continue to communicate appropriate behavior to students and their parents, and we ask their support for this position by signing the "Certificate of Understanding and Acceptance — Standard for Student Conduct," and returning the certificate to their secondary
