Edwards Wells Drop Slightly

Water levels in the check wells of the five-county Ed-wards Underground Water District continued a seasonal decline in April, but the discharge from Leona River Springs, south of Uvalde, was up slightly over March.

The only sizable decline in well water levels was in the check well at Sabinal which dropped 8.1 feet from the March

Uvalde: 879.3 feet, down 0.4 feet

Sabinal: 790.3 feet, down 8.1

Castroville: 710.4 feet, down

Hondo: 742 feet, down 0.7 feet. San Antonio: 677.4, down 0.2

New Braunfels: 627 feet, down 0.2 feet. Kyle: 565.2 feet, down 0.8 feet.

Leona River Springs in Uvalde County were flowing 37 cubic feet per second, an increase of 2.1 cfs over March. Average flow there is 13.5 cfs. Comal Springs at New Braunfels were flowing 312 cfs, down five cfs, but above the average of 285 cfs. San Marcos Springs were flowing 104 cfs, down seven cfs. Average flow there is 166 cfs.

A drought as severe as the one that ended in 1956 should pose no threat to the Edwards aquifer, Col. Weinert says. With the average annual

recharge totalling 560,000 acre feet and present usage about 320,000 acre feet, there is available for additional use and discharge from springs 240,000 acre feet of water each year, he said. Meanwhile, the aquifer continues to be recharged—rain or not—with water running out of the Edwards Plateau springs and with water now filtering into the reservoir from rainfall that occurred as long as 50 or more years ago.



Prize-Winning Booths Told


Five ribbons were awarded on Saturday afternoon, May 6, during the Cornyval '78 to organizations or individuals having best-of-the-booths.

"A check which is subject to early payment under this amendment, which is later determined to be incorrect, will not have to be repaid as long as the event which caused the benefit to be incorrect occurred after the payment was made," Mr. Gonzalez added. Checks for the many social

security beneficiaries in Bexar County will be dated other than the 3rd in 1978, as follows: June 2, September 1 and December 1. Supplemental security income recipients in the county will get their checks on the 1st of each month except that the July 1 check will come on June 30 and the October 1 check on September 29.


