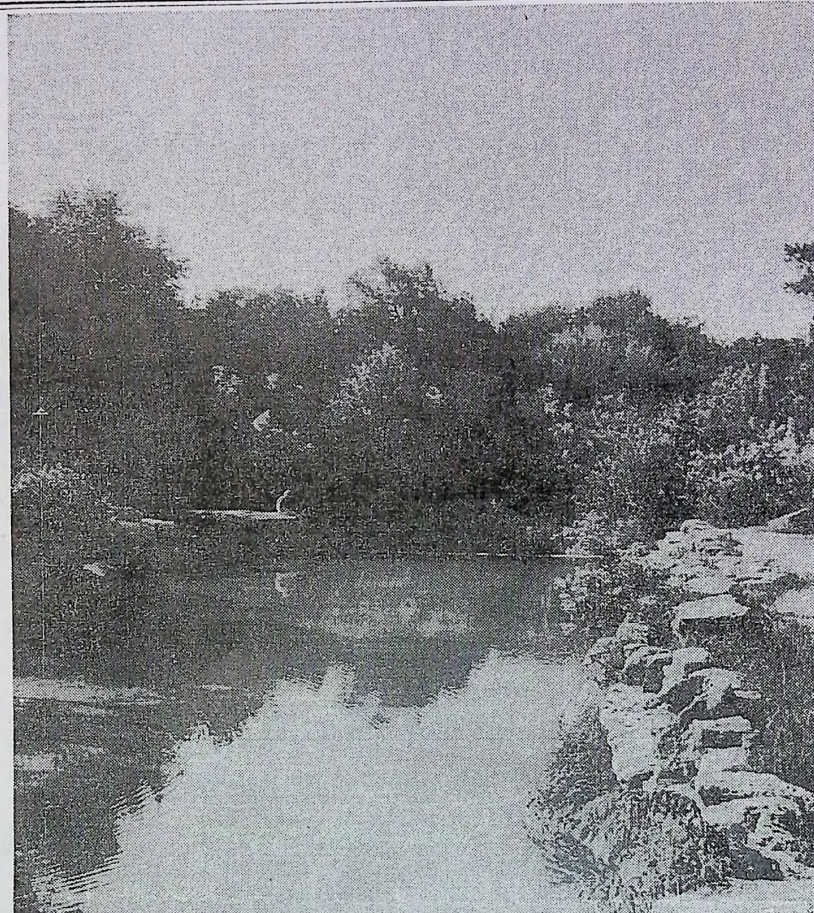
Baptists To Build Church in Helotes

Plans for the new Helotes Baptist Church building to be constructed on a four-acre site at the corner of Bandera Road and Antonio Drive have been approved by the Baptist Association of Dallas, according to H. E. Brown, a building program director. Foundation work will begin in the near future.

The L-shaped building will include a church and educational wing and will cover 3,804 square feet. In addition, 407 square feet of porches will bring the overall total to 4211 square feet. The building will be of hollow tile construction and will have a steeple. The church will front Bandera Road. Entrance to the parking lot will be on Antonio Drive.

Mr. Brown said that the building will be an attractive addition to the community and will meet architectural standards set by the Association.

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Helotes 'Survives' Mock Bomb Attack

Shielded by a bluff at the intersection of Scenic Loop and Wagner Road, men and equipment of the Helotes Area Volunteer Fire Department withstood the recent explosion of a 1-megaton hydrogen bomb over Medina Base.

Only minutes before the blast, which devastated southwest San Antonio and a vast area of southwestern Bexar County, local firemen were ordered by Bexar County Civil Defense to evacuate their station and take shelter.

Warning of the approach of an ICBM was flashed on the air at 9:01 p.m. Thirteen minutes later the nuclear weapon exploded 3,000 feet above the center of Medina Base. The awful blast brought death and destruction to an area extending from Ingram Road on the North to Von Ormy on the south, and from Zarzamora Street on the east to the Medina County Line on the west.

Early casualty estimates numbered the dead at more than 70,000, while injured passed the 80,000-mark. Hospital...

The disaster reported above has not occurred, but Bexar County Civil Defense says it COULD and MAY. It did take place "on paper" the night of August 19 when all Bexar County volunteer fire departments participated in the second of a series of civil defense drills. The Helotes department took active part in the exercise.

Helotes Fire Chief Ralph Swift, Jr., directed the local phase of the operation from the Helotes fire station at Bandera Highway and Galm Road. Others participating in the exercise included Johnny Brannan Jr., assistant chief; J. H. Mayfield, captain; Ed Faust, Reynolds Alguiseva, Arthur Maldonado, and this reporter.

The drill started at 7 p.m. when a shortwave alert was broadcast that enemy bombers had been picked up by radar. The "bandits" were reported headed for Bexar County, with estimated time of arrival fixed at 9 p.m.

For the next two hours the county shortwave station crackled with orders to volunteer fire companies, directing them to fires, explosions, train derailments, and other sabotage throughout San Antonio and Bexar county. Early in the evening, the Helotes equipment was ordered to Southwest Research, where an explosion had set fire to three buildings.

The job of the crew at the Helotes fire station was to record all messages broadcast over the county radio, mark the location of fires, explosions, and other sabotage on a county map, and be prepared to route fire equipment where it might be needed. Routing was governed by road conditions between the stations and the scent of the fire. Many roads and highways were blocked by sabotage of bridges and overpasses.

The exercise was concluded at 11 p.m. with the Helotes department called back into service from its shield behind the bluff at Wagner Road and Scenic Loop. It was ordered into the area just east of Leon Valley, where fire raged out of control.

It could not go in. The roentgen count was in excess of 400.

Radiation in excess of 100 roentgens can be fatal.

Chief Swift said this week that civil defense drill is only part of the local fire department's job. Its principal mission is to provide fire protection for this area. More than 60 residents of the Helotes area are members of the organization, which was formed some two years ago.

Besides Chief Swift, officers are: Assistant Chiefs Brannan and Martin Terry, and Captains Mayfield, Bern Vinck, Joe R. Wallace, Sr., and Leroy Galm. The department holds two training meetings each month, the first and third Thursday. One member has been on duty each night at the fire station for the past three months.

Members of the Board of Directors are: Clarence Galm, president; Mr. Faust, vice president; Baxter P. Melgaard, secretary; C. C. Davis Jr., treasurer; and Chief Swift, Otto Snyder, Lato Martinez, Alex Parrigin, and Max Toepperwein.

Chief Swift said more volunteers are needed. He announced that classes in basic fire fighting will be held the first and third Saturday of each month, starting

in September. They will begin at 9 a.m. and last two hours. The chief said the department is in particular need of personnel available during daylight hours. He said, however, that all are welcome to volunteer for membership and basic training.
