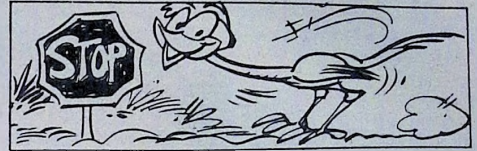
Two former owners used their first names as part of the name of the salon, and one named the boutique its unique name.

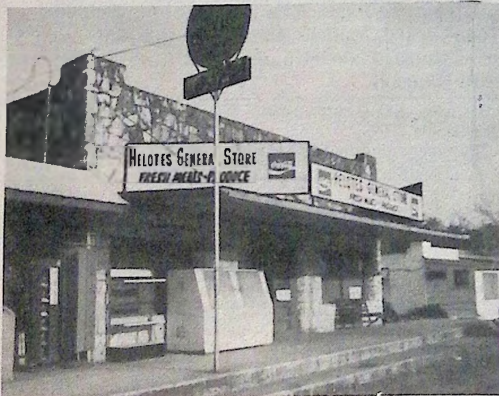

'79 Earnings Need Report

All social security beneficiaries who have earned more than the annual exempt amount during 1979 and received at least one check, need to file a report of these earnings by April 15, Gilbert G. Gonzalez social security manager in San Antonio, announced.

The 1979 annual exempt amount was \$4,500 for people age 65 or older and \$3,480 for those under age 65 all of 1979. Anyone who was age 72 or over in all of 1979 does not need to file a report. People who receive

benefits because of disability also do not need to file reports, since different rules apply.

Anyone who did not receive any checks in 1979 because of expected earnings does not have to file a report. But, Gonzalez said, if their earnings were less than expected, it may be to their advantage to make a report. Because just \$1.00 in social security benefits is withheld for every \$2.00 of earnings above the annual exempt amount, some benefits may be payable.

Wells Show Slight Drop

Reflecting a month of scanty precipitation, water levels in all of the Edwards Underground Water District check wells declined during January, the EUWD office here has announced.

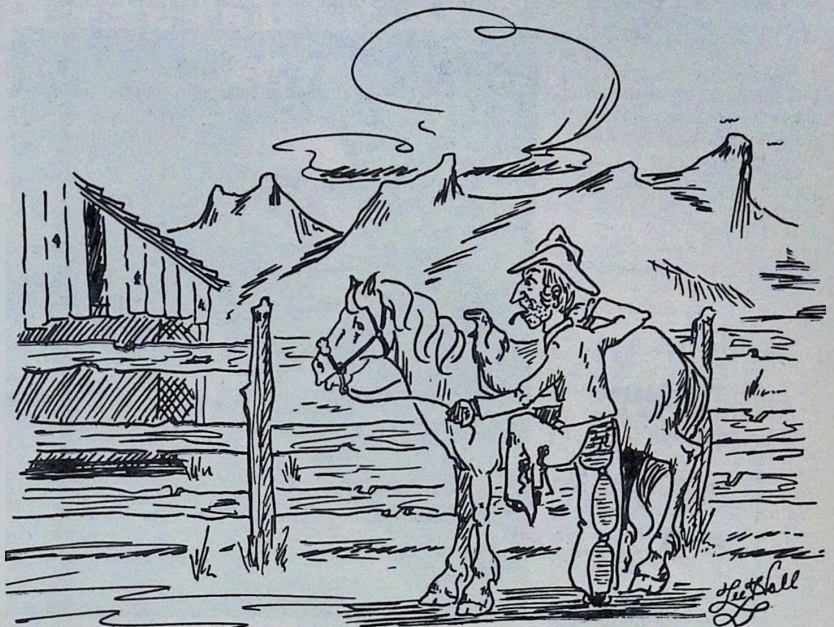
"The slight drop in water levels," District Manager Thomas P. Fox said, "resulted from January's light rainfall plus the fact we had a comparatively dry fall."

"Although the check wells are still well above average," he continued, "we felt it would be appropriate for all of us to follow prudent conservation techniques."

Following are the water wells' readings at the end of January shown in elevation above mean sea level with the recorded highs in parentheses:

- Uvalde: 877.9 feet, down 1.3 feet (886.3).
- Sabinal: 796.7 feet, down 5.1 feet (835.4).
- Castroville: 712.8 feet, down 2.5 feet (737.8).
- Hondo: 743.5 feet, down 4.7 feet (773.8).
- San Antonio: 678.4 feet, down 1.1 feet (696.5).
- New Braunfels: 627.3 feet, down 0.1 feet (630.2).
- Kyle: 572 feet, down 1.7 feet (593.8).

Leona River Springs at Uvalde were flowing 44 cubic feet per second, up six cfs. Comal Springs at New Braunfels were flowing 350 cfs, down five cfs from December's reading but still well above the average of 285 cfs.

Civil War Records Given To St. Mary's

A collection of first editions of the Official Records of the Civil War, including the rare map books of the battles, published by the United States Government in 1894, has been presented to the St. Mary's University academic library. The collection of more than 168 volumes was donated by Mrs. Henry Guerra, Jr., in memory of her grandparents, Judge

George Henry Noonan and Cornelia Bowen Noonan.

The Official Records list the names and company of every registered soldier serving in both the Confederate and Union Armies, and the map books in color illustrated every battle fought in the Civil War. The records are a rich source of information for researchers in the history of the United States and for genealogists.

Along with the Civil War Records, Mrs. Guerra

presented St. Mary's library with a first edition of Frank Leslie's "Illustrated History of the Civil War" published in 1894.

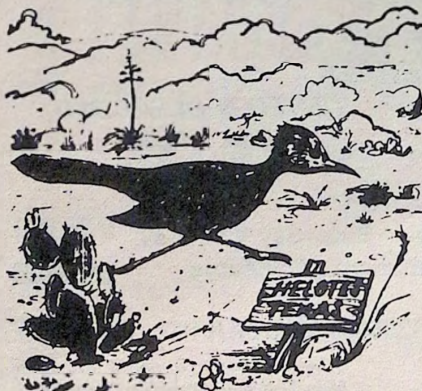

New Book Traces Life Of Texas' 16th Governor

The Life and career of Texas' 16th governor are chronicled by Martha Anne Turner in her recently published full-length biography of Richard Bennett Hubbard, who went from a typical plantation childhood in Georgia to a rigorous education in the classics and law, to pioneering in East Texas in the 1850's.

Early dubbed "the eagle orator of Texas," Hubbard rose

quickly in state and national politics, serving as United States attorney for the Western District of Texas and then as state representative from Smith County. He used his impressive oratorical skills first to support the Southern secessionist position and later to advocate reconciliation between the North and South.

Hubbard's journey from a regional zealot to a national

statesman is peculiarly a story of the South between the 1850's and the 1880's. True to his background, he was an ardent Confederate who sacrificed family and fortune to defend a dying way of life. But disillusioned by the futility and inhumanity of the Civil War, Hubbard gradually attained a more complex, compassionate understanding of the nation's political needs.

Although the years immediately following the war were difficult for Hubbard, he gradually resumed political activities, culminating in his election to the office of lieutenant governor in 1873. After reelection to a second term, Hubbard became governor when Governor Richard Coke resigned to take a seat in the United States Senate.

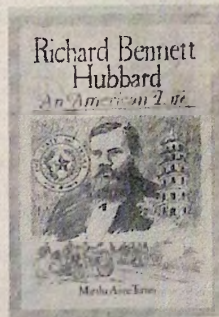
As governor of Texas from 1876 to 1879, Hubbard was a reformer concerned with the humane treatment of prisoners, public support for education, and the honest administration of the state's regulatory powers. A politically motivated scandal about one of his business transactions cost him renomination to the governorship, and Hubbard retired from office in 1879.

A lifelong, loyal Democrat, Hubbard contributed all his political skills to the 1884 presidential campaign of Grover Cleveland. His renowned and spellbinding

oratory was a crucial element in Cleveland's election, the first Democratic presidential victory since that of Buchanan 28 years earlier.

In the spring of 1885, President Cleveland appointed Hubbard as ambassador to Japan, a country that had fascinated him for some time. During his 4-year tour of duty, Hubbard recognized the injustice of Japan's subordinate trade and political relationships with the Western powers. The "crowning achievement of Hubbard's foreign service" was the successful negotiation of a more equitable treaty between the United States and Japan.

Drawing on primary sources never before available, Miss Turner fills a gap in American history with her book "Richard Bennett Hubbard: An American Life," just released by Shoal Creek Publishers of Austin. The book contains 36 photographs and sells for \$15.

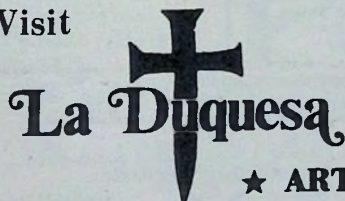

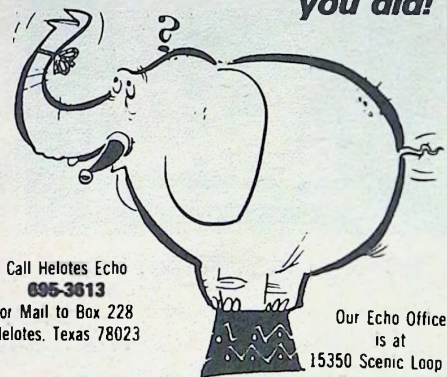

Mrs. Pickard Dies At 69

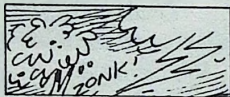

Outpatient Surgery Set

Methodist Hospital will shortly open a new outpatient surgical center in nearby Methodist Plaza specializing in day surgery—that is, minor procedures which do not require overnight hospitalization.

The new unit, set to open in May, is freestanding but hospital-based, in that it is physically linked to the main hospital by a sublevel walkway under Medical Drive, which makes all hospital services readily available.

This new unit is one of a new breed of facilities aimed at reducing the cost of medical care to the community. For cases of minor surgery, these ambulatory surgical centers eliminate the added expense of a hospital stay, save the doctor's time which would be spent on hospital rounds, and avoid a general disruption of a patient's household—special baby-sitting arrangements for children, hospital visits, etc.
