# Accident Fatal To Medina Man

A one-car accident here Tuesday, Feb. 13, about 9 p.m. on the Scenic Loop Road near the John Wagner Road curve claimed the life of Don Wayne Melton, 34 years old, of Medina, Texas, and seriously injured the driver, identified as 29 year old Randy Woolls also of Medina, who remains in poor condition at Bexar County Hospital.

The car apparently failed to negotiate the curve and went out of control striking a tree adjacent to the Helotes Creek. The car was demolished, and volunteer firemen from the Helotes and Grey Forest fire departments worked 45 minutes to release the victims.

EMS ambulances answered the call. Melton was pronounced dead on arrival. Funeral services were scheduled for today, Feb. 16, in Bandera with burial in Medina.

Cutting is the only rodeo event in which the horse is the star and his rider the silent partner. Once the rider has completed cutting one cow from a herd, he must not reign or cue his horse until the rider signals him to stop. It is the oldest rodeo performance event, having begun 90 years ago in Haskell.

## IH-10 Work Underway

Work has begun on im-provements to the IH-10 and IH-410 Interchange near Wonderland. The announce ment was made by the project's successful low bidder, Austin

Bridge Company.

The proposed work includes separated ramps between the IH-410 eastbound and IH-10 southbound connection and the entrance ramp from Fredericksburg Road. An exit ramp from this IH-410 to IH-10 connection to the access road is proposed near the Park and Ride facility. The existing exit ramp from IH-10 southbound to Wonderland Drive will remain in place

The entrance ramp from Wonderland Drive to IH-10 southbound will be relocated 1000 feet toward Vance Jackson Road. The entrance ramp to IH-10 northbound, north of Vance Jackson, will be relocated 2500 feet toward Wonderland Drive.

An exit ramp is proposed from IH-10 northbound to the access road where the Vance Jackson entrance ramp was formerly located. The other ramps will remain in place. Turnarounds will be built beneath IH-10 at Wonderland Drive, Vance Jackson Road and Wurzbach Road. The im-provements will cost \$6.3 million and take two years to complete.

The State Department of Highways and Public Transpor-tation has announced that the proposed improvement of the I.H. 10 and Loop 1604 Inter-change has been cleared for fur-

ther development.

The proposed improvements include construction of a partial cloverleaf interchange, use of the existing Loop 1604 roadway as the eastbound main lanes, construction of Loop 1604 west-bound main lanes, and the building of frontage roads,

ramps, and crossovers.

This project will soon be scheduled for construction by the State Highway and Transportation Commission.

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

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**Must Yield** To EMS

"Always Yield to EMS," is the theme of a county-wide traffic safety campaign now underway by the Independent Insurance Agents of San Antonio.

IIASA president John Bezdek said the appeal is aimed at motorists who fail to observe the emergency vehicle right-ofway law, causing EMS am-bulances to be delayed in traffic while going to or from an emergency call.

'Most drivers know they are required to yield the right-ofway to an authorized emergency vehicle making use of audi-ble and visual signals, but far too many operators are ignoring this regulation with the result EMS ambulances are losing precious time and in some



instances have become involved in an accident," Bezdek said. He reported most of the

delays are happening at street intersections where the driver erroneously assumes he or she has the right-of-way because the traffic light is green. Bezdek pointed out failure to hear the ambulance warning

sound because the car radio is on or the air-conditioning is at high speed is no excuse either. He suggests drivers lower their car window slightly, if necessary.

## Feb. 26 **Eclipse To Be** Partial In This Area

Texans should not look directly at the sun Feb. 26, according to the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness. Although Texans will notice no visible difference in the day's brightness, a total solar eclipse will occur in a path from the Pacific Ocean crossing the northwestern United States. The eclipse will occur partially in virtually all the rest of the continental United States.

The solar eclipse will begin in this area at 9:11 a.m. as the moon first touches the sun's upper right corner. The moon will hide 57.8 percent of the solar disk at 10:23 a.m. when the eclipse reaches its midpoint The eastward moving moon will slowly pull away from the sun after mid-eclipse. At 11:41 a.m., the dark new moon will leave the sun's upper left corner.


Prevent Blindness recom-

mends indirect watching as the only safe way to view the solar eclipse. The simplest indirect way is the "pinhole" method.

The circle of light on the card-board will . ow the sun being slowly obscu. ed by the moon as it passes between the earth and the sun. NEVER LOOK AT THE ECLIPSE THROUGH THE PINHOLE OR THROUGH BINOCULARS OR A TELESCOPE. Photographers should also remember not to look at the sun through their

camera viewfinder.
Following the last total eclipse seen in the U.S., March 7, 1970, 145 cases of eye injury were reported in a Prevent Blindness survey, 121 of them eclipse burns. The remainder had tried to protect their eyes with devices-sunglasses, totally ex-

posed photographic negatives, smoked glass and welder's gog-



Indirect watching is the only safe way to view the solar eclipse on Feb. 26. The simplest indirect way is the "pinhole" method. Take two pieces of white cardboard, make a small hole in one, and with the sun at your back, focus the eclipse through the pinhole onto the second borad. The size of the image can be changed by altering the distance between the cardboards. One may use the binoculars or a telescope as the projector, replacing the pinhole cardboard.
