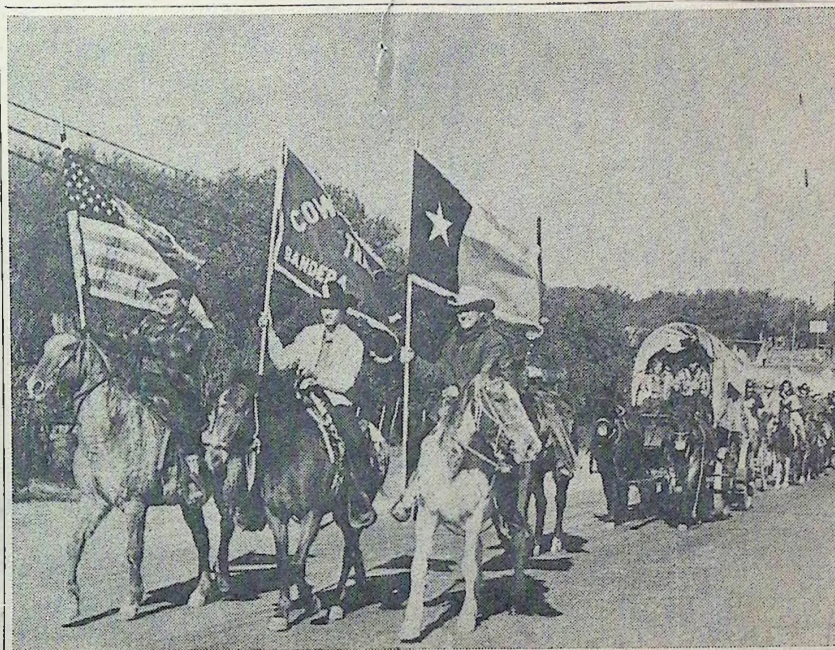

Survey To Take 60-90 Days Here

The San Antonio office of the U.S. Geological Survey is investigating a possible dam site on San Geronimo Creek in Medina County, just across the Bexar County line.

According to word from the Edwards Underground Water District, it is expected to take from 60 to 90 days to assemble all the necessary information in order for the manager to make a recommendation to the District's Board of Directors.

Harry Burleigh, area engineer, has also been advised that a total of \$400,000 has been approved for a comprehensive study of the co-ordinated use of surface and ground water in the San Antonio-Guadalupe Unit of the Texas Basins Project. The study was initiated by the San Antonio City Water Board, and has been agreed to by the San Antonio River Authority, Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority, and the Edwards Underground Water District.

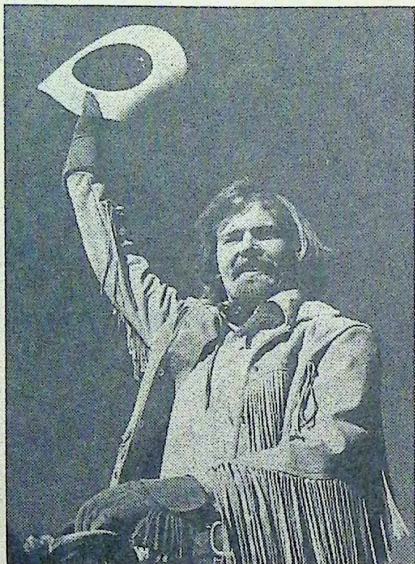

Bill Includes UTSA Bonds

Helotes Area residents are very interested in the progress

of House Bill 278 which went to the Senate Finance Committee Feb. 16 after passage by the House of Representatives.

This legislation authorizes revenue bond financing of the University of Texas construction at San Antonio, and has strong support of both Governor Preston Smith and Lt. Governor Ben Barnes.

Under the legislation UTSA would get \$30.2 million dollars through bonds secured by pledges of tuition income.

Dear Editor:

Something eventful and progressive has been realized in our community in the form of an independent fire department for the city of Grey Forest.

The Grey Forest Fire Department evolved as a result of a Helotes Fire Department board decision to donate a Helotes fire truck (stationed at Grey Forest) to that city. This action was at the recommendation of Board President, Clarence Galm, that members consider a motion to transfer the vehicle and all support equipment to the Grey Forest community. A motion was made and passed at the Dec. 1970 meeting to effect the truck transfer. This transfer will in effect increase responsiveness to emergencies in the Scenic Loop Area and will enhance civic pride within the city of Grey Forest.

It has been reported the Grey Forest department is highly enthusiastic over this new asset to their city and is laying plans for many new improvements to the overall fire protection program. The citizens of Grey Forest and the Helotes area volunteer fire

department have always worked as a team to combat fires in the local area. This agreement of long standing will remain in effect indefinitely and simply means we will assist one another in fighting fires or responding to emergencies regardless of location.

In view of the creation of this distinct fire department, an agreement has been reached by officials of both the Helotes and Grey Forest departments to only accept donations from their respective areas. This essentially means that citizens of the city of Grey Forest will send donations to their own department and those citizens outside the city will continue to make their donation to the Helotes Dept.

Once again it must be pointed out that fire fighters and executive members of the departments are all voluntary. There are no salaries paid anyone associated with these departments. All monies contributed by the good citizens of this area go for maintenance, operation, insurance and

replacement of worn equipment. These are your tax free commodities and should be first on your donation list. A standard donation for householders is \$5.00 while business establishments usually contribute \$10.00 or more.

A recent gesture of generosity was expressed by one of our local citizenry in the name of John Wagner. Mr. Wagner presented as a gift to the Helotes Fire Department a four-wheel drive weapons carrier. This vehicle has since been refurbished into a first class brush fire fighting apparatus. Much of this rework was done by volunteer firemen. This vehicle is being housed in the new addition at the Helotes station. Firemen are being trained in its use at the regular meetings and are quite enthusiastic over its utility. Our sincere thanks are extended to Mr. Wagner for the gift of this sorely needed versatile vehicle.

General store owner John T. Floore, unofficial "Mayor of Helotes" a shout and a stagger northwest of town phoned and said: "Listen, who was chief Bexar County jailer Jesse Dobbs speaking for when he went in front of the San Antonio City Council last Thursday and launched his little speech about the glories of an incorporated City of Helotes? I'll tell you one thing: He sure wasn't speaking for ME!"

Added Floore, who gets his mayor title more or less by acclamation as the perennially unopposed chairman of the Democratic voting precinct out there:

"If Helotes is going to be a city, I say let's go first class and hitch up to the City of San Antonio."

In this day and time, starting a new city involves thorny problems of providing police, fire, street, sanitation, public health and other diverse services at rates that might break the back of average wage-earners without a hope of even "approaching" the efficiency level of San Antonio services, according to Floore.

"And politically, Lord knows what a baby city might fall heir to—like maybe being taken over by voting 18-year-old hippies."

Floore said jailer Dobbs, who used to be federal marshal here, lives in Helotes Parks Estates, which he described as "an opulent area full of \$50,000 and \$75,000 homes" where some of the residents "appear to believe they can incorporate themselves into a pastoral paradise, devoid of urban aches and ills, with everybody eating home-grown tomatoes, squash and corn on the cob."

As for himself, said Floore, he was ready to hazard the guess that a preponderance of those living in Helotes proper—"I'm talking about the ones who got here first, the shop owners, the rank-and-file folks, the old timers"—would overwhelmingly support annexation to San Antonio, and "easily defeat" any proposal to incorporate Helotes.

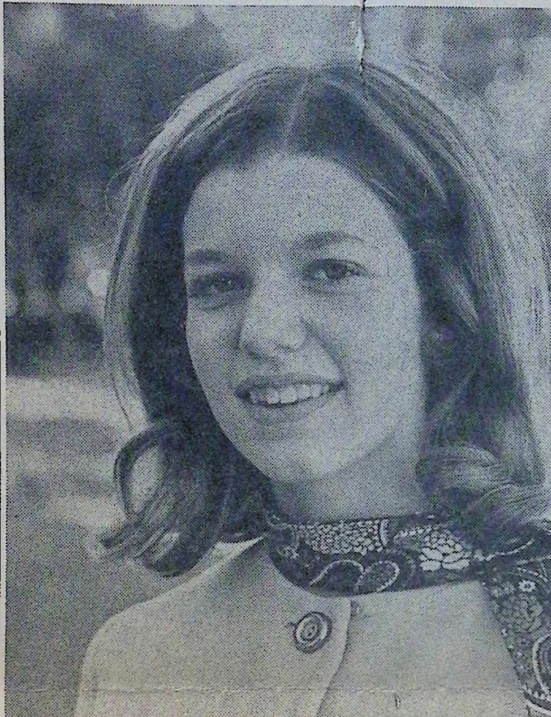

If a fence, tool shed, garage or old barn takes away some of your garden's charm, decide what you should do about it to turn it into an asset. Shelves for potted plants, a fruit tree or pyracantha espaliered, or ivy might help. Tall growing plants can provide a screen in some cases.

Now that the trees are bare-leaved, tour your yard and notice where overcrowding needs curing.

Start flats of tomato, sweet peppers, squash, and eggplant. Stop by the nurseries here to get your young flowering plants and such favorite ornamentals as coleus.

If you feed your potted camellias as soon as they are through blooming, the plants will carry over to next year in good shape.

In March, divide and reset canas, bananas, daisies, phlox and chrysanthemums.
