Helotes' Cornyval 1985 — the twentieth edition — will hegin to unfold on Wednesday, May 1, with the coronation of the new Miss Helotes and continue through Sunday, May 5.

Don Reddout, president of the Helotes Festival Association, announced this week an extra added attraction for this year's Cornyval. It is a complete one-ring European ctyle circus to be presented Sunday at 3 and 7:30 p.m., and will be free. The big top will be set up behind the carnival. It is the Exotic Animal Circus from Beeville.

The 1985 Miss Helotes pageant and cornonation will be held in the Community Activity Center of Our Lady of Guadalupe Church. Twenty-two girls are entered in the competition. The pageant will begin at 7 p.m., and admission will be \$1 with children under 12 free.





Bexar Eligible For Disaster Loans

Bexar County Judge Tom Vickers has announced that Bexar County farmers and ranchers may be eligible for emergency loans from the Farmers Home Administration based on losses incurred during the 1984 drought and the freeze of December, 1983.

Vickers was notified this week that Governor Mark White's request to the Department of Agriculture for declaration of five Texas counties as natural disaster areas has been

approved. The request was based on damages and losses to crops and livestock due to the severe freeze Dec. 18-31, 1983, and the major drought during all of 1984.

In addition to Bexar, other counties eligible for emergency loan assistance because of the drought are Gonzales, Reeves, Wilbarger and Young. Bexar and Gonzales counties both received an additional disaster declaration due to the

UTSA Receives Diaries Of

Frontier Texas Family

the triumphs and tragedies of a Central Texas frontier ranch family are chronicled in a set of diaries recently donated to the Special Collections of The University of Texas at San Antonio Library by Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Coleman of Fowlerton

The six handwritten volumes of the Redford diaries record nearly 50 years of weather conditions, plantings, harvests and community activities in Blanco County from 1877 until 1923. They were begun by James Redford, Sr., a Scottish

immigrant to Canada, who recorded the first entry on Jan. 1., 1875, in Stratford, Ontario, In 1877, Redford moved his sizable family to Sandy, Texas, two miles north and seven miles west of Johnson City, where they established themselves on 640 acres and worked as farmers and ranchers. The first Texas entry is February 7, 1877.

Redford maintained a faithful chronicle until June 17, 1907, when his son Alexander took over the task until 1923. The father of the donor, Coleman, cared for the

younger Redford in his declining years until his death in 1953 and was given the diaries.

"Apparently, there is a seventh volume that is unaccounted for," explained UTSA professor of archaeology and climatologist Dr. Joel Gunn, who became aware of the diaries through the Colemans'

friend. San Antonio radio news and weathercaster Bill McReynolds. "Nevertheless, what we have is quite a significant and unique find and offers a plethora of information about weather, building fences and schools, planting and harvesting and temperature changes. It is an excellent resource for those scholars studying climatology because we have very few records of this type from the last century." The diaries

are expected to be available to scholars, in a transcribed version, by the fall of 1985.

Barbie Dolls Better Investment Than Apple Computers?

Barbie Dolls, her friends, and their accessories are the hottest investments, even better than Apple Computer stock. According to Alan Crittenden, editor of "The Almanac of Investments, any Barbie doll over ten years old is valuable. Those in excellent condition vary in resale from \$30 to \$1,000. "That's a lot of money for what used to be a toy" says Crittenden.

Prices for Barbie accessories have also risen at doll auctions around the country. \$1,100 was paid for Tutti's bedroom set. \$800 bought Barbie's mid-'60s stewardess outfits.

Barbie's gift sets, complete outfits bought separately, are hot items. Sears and Roebuck's Miss Barbie with Lawn Swing which sold for \$3 when new, now sells for \$500 to \$600. It was available on the market for only two years.

Where else can one find an array of 50,000 volunteer workers quietly and effectively doing their thing to prepare and present over 150 scheduled events in the ten days from April 19-28 in 1985? 





Ten non-paid peace officers will be added to the personnel assigned to the staff of Precinct 2 Constable, Jerry Connell. The commissions were confirmed and approved during a recent meeting of Commissioners Court.

"These officers are a very neces-

sary addition to the peace-keeping personnel in Precinct 2 and require more extensive training then reserve officers," said Andy Casias, County Commissioner of Precinct 2. who placed the request for the ten additional peace officers before the

"Precinct 2 has experienced a trememdous growth in population in recent years and additional personnel for the Constable's office are a must in order for Constable Connell and his officers to perform their duties efficiently and to the greatest benefit of the County's taxpayers," said Commissioner

This growth, especially in the unincorporated areas, has increased the demand for law enforcement services, especially in the area of delivering warrants, eviction and other papers."

Last year, the Precinct 2 Constable's office served more than 18,000 papers, including 1,200 Forcible Entry and Detainer orders for evictions.

The ten commissioned peace officers who will be contributing a minimum of 20 hours per month to the Bexar County taxpayers under the supervision of the Constable are: Jack J. Amman, Jr., Richard C. Davis, James S. Hageman, Edward L. Jones, David B. Poole, Gerald J. Connell, Jr., Thomas T. Fenley, Kurt W. Johnson, Robert D. Nalbach, and John H. Small.

All have completed training as required by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education.

The Precinct 2 Constable's office also will soon have access to national, regional, and local criminal information systems via a new computer link that has been approved by Bexar County Commissioners Court.

Precinct 2 Constable Connell gave personal testimony on the need for the access to the criminal information systems a necessary weapon in his crime-fighting arsenal, especially as an alert to his personnel about dangerous criminals who might create a life-threatening situation.

The computer link, which utilizes the County/City/City Water Board system, will only have a minimal running cost. It is expected to be in place by the end of April.
