Request May Top \$1 Billion

Southwestern Bell soon will file with the Public Utility Commission a rate request which would significantly increase local rates.

Although the final amount of the request has not been determined, the figure could be \$1 billion or more, said Paul Roth, vice president, revenues and public affairs. Roth said the filing with the PUC is to be made by July 1.

"This filing will not be comparable to any other rate case we have filed," Roth said. "The bulk of the company's request will flow from nationwide changes occurring in the telephone industry." He emphasized that without the impact of those changes, the company's request would be more in the range of past Texas rate filings.

Roth said the company's request will be designed to reflect the massive changes taking place in the telecommunications industry in 1984, and also to meet increasing costs of providing telephone service and give Southwestern Bell a reasonable return on its Texas investment.

"With competition in the long distance market, it's no longer feasible for long distance rates to subsidize local rates," Roth said. "The long term result of competition is that prices will be driven towards costs. That means local rates will have to go up, but it also means that long distance rates should come down."

Roth said the filing will emphasize the need for a comprehensive restructuring of telephone rates in Texas. "Rates must be set to cover, or more nearly cover, the cost of providing each service," he said.

The restructuring means that local rates must increase substantially, Roth said. Details of the proposed rates will be announced at the time the company files its request.

Roth said that the company is presently studying alternative pricing possibilities which would provide

Mayor's Granddaughter Dies At 5½ Months

The community was saddened to hear of the death of little Michelle Marie Walpole, born December 1, 1982, who died here Tuesday morning, May 24, 1983, at the age of five-and-a-half months.

appeared to be in good health until early that morning. An EMS was called and she was taken to Methodist Hospital, where she was pronounced dead on arrival. The coroner gave cause of death as aseptic meningitis caused by a viral infection which developed fast.

Michelle, who was born in Rockport, Texas, is the daughter of Mark and Lucy Walpole of Rockport, where the services were held. A Rosary and Blessing of the Angels were recited on Thursday evening, May 26, and graveside services were held in Rockport at 2 p.m. on Friday, May 27.

Michelle is survived by a little brother, Marcus, in addition to grandparents, including her Grandmother Freda Thompson of Helotes, and various other relatives.

The sympathy of the community was extended to those who feel the loss of Michelle.

Rainfall In May Is 6.6

Henry Brauchle, Helotes rancher, reported that the area received 6.6 inches of rain during May. That brought the year's total to 16.5 inches.

The rain was needed since April had set a record for the driest April in history with but a trace of rain.

The heaviest rainfall in May came on Friday and Saturday, May 20 and 21. It was

May and September always have been the two rainiest months in Texas.

Rare Gutenberg Bible To Be Shown Here



Johann Gutenberg of Mainz, Germany, is considered to be the inventor of printing because of his Bible, first book printed with movable type.

The University of Texas at Austin will share one of its greatest treasures—a copy of the rare Gutenberg Bible—with the people of San Antonio beginning June 17.

As part of UT's Centennial observance, an exhibit featuring the Bible is currently on a year-long tour encompassing 18 Texas cities. The exhibit, entitled "The Gutenberg Bible: The Beginning of the Printed Word," will be on display from June 17 through July 12 in the Hall of Mirrors at the University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures at San Antonio.

In conjunction with the exhibit a public discussion on the significance of the Gutenberg Bible will be presented at 2:30 p.m. on June 25, by Dr. William B. Todd, UT professor and internationally known bibliographer. Todd served as consultant to the UT Board of Regents for the search which resulted in the 1978 purchase of the Bible for \$2.4 million.

The first substantial work to be printed from movable type, a process invented by Johann Gutenberg, the Bible is historically regarded as the greatest book in the world. Approximately 180 copies were printed by

Gutenberg in Mainz, Germany between 1450 and 1455. Today, 48 remain and UT's copy is one of five complete specimens in the United States.

In addition to displaying a

Kazen In Washington

The people of this country spoke loud and clear in opposition to withholding taxes on interest and dividends, and the House of Representatives responded by voting overwhelmingly to repeal the controversial provision.

This proves once again that the people are still in charge, and when they say "enough," they can move mountains - even mountains of government red tape.

Joined by others in the House, I had consistently opposed withholding on the grounds that it created unnecessary paperwork, was confusing to many, and that it serves as a disincentive to the important goal of saving. But it took the cards and letters of hundreds of thousands of people across the nation, working through our system of government, to get the job done.

ORIGIN OF PROVISION

The idea of withholding on interest has been around for several years, and it had been turned down repeatedly by Congress. The Reagan Administration dug it up last year and attached it to a tax bill, which I opposed. The bill passed, and the banks were instructed to begin the withholding next July. The theory was that some people were not reporting profits from savings accounts to the Internal Revenue Service, so the banks should do the work of the IRS by withholding in advance.

I could never understand why the IRS cannot catch those people who fail to declare their interest because the banks send the information on earned interest to the IRS. It seems to me that the IRS could cross-match these lists with information on income tax returns, but apparently this is not being done.

We were told that most of our senior citizens would be exempt from the withholding, and all they had to do is file a "relatively simple" statement. The fact that thousands of elderly citizens joined in the campaign against withholding is ample evidence of confusion now

and more in the future. Those people felt alarmed and threatened by the provision.

They, joined by others across the country who objected to the thought of the government making withdrawals from their savings accounts, declared that the idea of withholding had gone far enough.

**GRASS ROOTS
MOVEMENT**

People who had never signed a petition or written to a member of Congress mobilized to make their voices heard. No other issue since I have been in Congress has been so forcibly brought to the attention of the federal government. With this support, those of us who originally opposed withholding immediately sponsored legislation to repeal it, but the House Ways and Means Committee declined to act.

With more pressure from the people came more support for repeal, resulting in a petition of House members to take the issue out of committee and place it before the full House. This is rarely successful because many members prefer to work within the committee system, but in this case the people had left no question of the mood of the country. The petition was successful.

The Committee yielded to the majority, reported a repeal measure to the House and it was quickly approved 382-41.

OUTLOOK

The Senate recently voted to postpone withholding until 1987, not to repeal it as we did in the House. In addition, President Reagan has indicated he will veto an outright repeal.

This indicates to me that there will be an effort to reach a compromise on the issue, although I hope the Senate has the opportunity to vote on our version to repeal.

Whatever the case - and we should know in the near future - it does not appear that withholding will begin in July. This proves to me that the system still works, and that the people are still in control.

WASP, BEE and HORNET STINGS

A patient was brought into my office the other day in a state of collapse. He had suffered a single wasp sting twenty minutes earlier. His face was swollen beyond recognition, eyes puffed completely shut and lips twice the usual size. He was gasping for breath. His pulse was very fast and his blood pressure was extremely low. Fortunately injections of adrenalin, antihistamine, and a cortisone preparation reversed the overwhelming allergic reaction and he was shortly out of danger.

Wasps, bees, and hornets belong to the same family: Hymenoptera. While it may take over 100 Hymenoptera stings to inflict a lethal dose of venom in non-allergic adults, a single sting can cause a fatal reaction in a hypersensitive person. There are three to four times more deaths annually in the United States from these insect stings than from snake bites. And just because you've been stung before with no reaction doesn't mean that the next sting can't result in disaster. Any victim of a wasp, bee, or hornet sting should be on the lookout for anything other than a local reaction about the sting site and should seek medical aid immediately if such occurs. The hypersensitivity reaction usually appears within 10 minutes of the sting. If you've gone an hour without a reaction you probably won't get one. Once hypersensitivity has been demonstrated it is going to happen with each and every subsequent sting. Persons so afflicted should carry a kit containing adrenalin and an antihistamine at all times, available through your physician.

The stingers of these insects may remain in the skin and should be removed by teasing or scraping rather than by pulling. An ice cube placed over the sting will reduce pain and the application of a cortisone cream or lotion is often useful.

Moral: Do not minimize a wasp, bee, or hornet sting. It may be your turn for an allergic reaction. Seek medical aid if you even suspect one.

Pick Professional For Home Remodeling Job

This year Americans will
spend a record \$47 billion on
remodeling and renovating
their homes, according to the
National Association of
Home Builders.

Most consumers who want
to improve the appearance of
their homes, make living
areas more comfortable or
reduce their energy bills will
find the cost of a profes-
sional remodeler a wor-
n-while investment, because
the vast majority of home-
owners don't have the skills
or expertise to finish the
work themselves.

According to national sur-
veys, the three jobs most
commonly performed by a
remodeler are remodeling
kitchens, re-roofing and
finishing basements and
recreation rooms. But for any
redecorating or renovating
job, a homeowner's first
priority should be to select a
remodeler who will do a good
job.

Unless you have special
reasons for choosing a
particular firm, take your
time gathering references of
several remodelers. Shop for
contractors who have done
satisfactory work of a similar
nature for friends or neigh-

bors. Call the local home
builders association or
remodelers council for
further references of
qualified remodelers.

Make sure the remodeler
is licensed to do business in
your area and has a
permanent business address.
A good reputation with
banks and suppliers is also
important. Check with the
Better Business Bureau and
the local consumer affairs
office for complaints records
against the remodeler you
are considering.

Choose a remodeler with
whom you feel comfortable
and who understands your
tastes and needs. Good
communications with the
remodeler are essential.

Get your job off to a
satisfactory start with a good
contract with the remodeler.
Be sure it is clearly written
and mutually agreeable to
both parties. The contract
should stipulate job
divisions, payment schedules
and the quality and quantity
of materials to be used. Read
the contract carefully to
avoid changes or dis-
agreements once the job has
started. Deviation from the
original contract terms is the
most frequent cause of dis-
putes between remodelers
and their customers.

The contract should also
specify work that will not be

performed by the contractor.
A complete remodeling plan
should be prepared by the
remodeler, designer or
architect before the contact
is written.

Finally, ask about the
remodeler's workmen's
compensation and general
liability insurance—policies
that protect you against suits
if an accident occurs during
construction. Also find out
about guarantees and
warranty protection.

Consumers can obtain a
new form of warranty
protection from remodelers
participating in the NAHB
Remodeler Limited
Warranty Program. Devel-
oped by NAHB's
National Remodeler's Coun-
cil, the warranty provides a
guarantee on workmanship
and materials for one year
from the date of substantial
job completion. The program
is administered by local
remodeler councils of NAHB
and offered to the public only
through their builder/rem-
odelers.

Experienced remodelers
provide a variety of
professional services. By
hiring a professional
remodeler, homeowners can
avoid the headaches that
often go along with almost
any remodeling project.

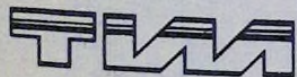
